NEW JERSEY SCHOOLS DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 5, 2012

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority ("SDA", "NJSDA" or "the Authority") was held on Wednesday, December 5, 2012 at 9:00 A.M. at the offices of the Authority at One West State Street, Trenton, New Jersey.

being a quorum of the Board. Mr. Vargas, Mr. Maloney, Mr. Piaia, Mr. Petrino and Mr. Lewis-Powder participated in the meeting via telephone conference.

At the Chairman's request, Marc Larkins, chief executive officer; Jason Ballard, chief of staff; Jane Kelly, vice president & assistant secretary; Andrew Yosha, vice president; Donald Guarriello, vice president and chief financial officer; Albert Barnes, acting chief counsel; Corrado Minervini, director; and Sean Murphy, director, of the SDA

participated in the meeting. Brett Tanzman of the Governor's Authorities Unit also participated in the meeting by teleconference.

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman of the Board, Mr. Walsh. Mr. Walsh requested that Ms. Singleton, assistant to the assistant secretary, read the requisite notice of the meeting. Ms. Singleton announced that the meeting notice had been sent to the *Trenton Times* and *Star-Ledger* at least 48 hours prior to the meeting, and that a meeting notice had been duly posted on the Secretary of State's bulletin board at the State House in Trenton, New Jersey.

Approval of Meeting Minutes

Mr. Walsh then presented the minutes of the Open Session meeting of the Board held November 7, 2012 for consideration and approval. A copy of the minutes and resolution presented were provided to the Members for review in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. McNamara, and seconded by Ms. Hassett, with Mr. Luckie abstaining, the November 7, 2012 Open Session meeting minutes were approved by the Board upon its vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 3a*.

Authority Matters

CEO Report

Mr. Walsh asked Mr. Larkins to provide the report of the CEO. Mr. Larkins reminded the Members that the Oliver Street Elementary School ("Oliver Street") project in the Newark School District was advertised on November 29 and that all proposals are due on January 23, 2013, with a few weeks turnaround for bid opening. He noted that the project is a design/build project. Mr. Larkins thanked SDA director Ritchard Sherman and his Design Studio staff for their hard work in this effort.

Next, Mr. Larkins reported that the SDA is anticipating advertisement in December for a design/build project for the Elliott Street Elementary School ("Elliott Street project") in the Newark School District. He noted that this is a replacement school for a school that was struck by lightning and burned down. Mr. Larkins noted that he would further update the Members regarding a litigation matter pertaining to the Elliott Street project as the meeting moves into this morning's Executive Session.

Next, Mr. Larkins reported that the SDA is looking to advance the Paterson Marshall & Hazel Elementary School project ("Marshall"), which is a traditional design-bid-build school. He said that the project schedule had been impacted as the result of the recent SuperStorm Sandy ("the Storm"), noting that the schedule may be pushed back to the early part of 2013.

In continuing, Mr. Larkins reported that proposals for the Phillipsburg High School project ("Phillipsburg project") are due on December 13. He said that, at the request of interested contractors, the submission schedule was pushed back one (1) week.

Mr. Larkins then reported that the SDA is anticipating receipt of proposals for the design/build project for the New Henry Street Elementary School project ("Henry Street project") in the Passaic School District. He said that this is for construction of a replacement school.

Next, Mr. Larkins provided the Members with an update regarding the Authority's procurements. He reported that the SDA has been active this year with procurements for the Capital Program and will continue to be active into the first half of 2013. Mr. Larkins said that the SDA advertised for the design consultant architects pool

in order to advance the emergent projects and other capital improvement projects across the Authority. He said that the architect pool should be in place the early part of 2013.

Mr. Larkins next reported that SDA staff attended a couple of business community events. He said that SDA attended a regularly scheduled meeting with the Association of School Business Officials ("ASBO") on November 16; and last week SDA staff presented projected activity for 2013 at the Construction Forecast seminar hosted annually by the Alliance for Action. Mr. Larkins reported that, at both events, the SDA received unsolicited positive feedback regarding the work of the Authority.

Next, Mr. Larkins reported that SDA participated in the Governor's Season of Service event at the Lowes Store in Howell, New Jersey. He said that the event involved a partnership between Lowes and Boston Market to distribute food items to those in need due to Super Storm Sandy.

Lastly, Mr. Larkins reported that the SDA is proud to present the 2013 SDA Budget in today's meeting. He said that the budget will put the Authority on a path to more accurately report expenses in terms of what it actually costs to run the organization and to advance its projects.

Chairman's Report

Mr. Walsh asked that SDA staff develop an overall summary of the Capital Projects from the original list, along with the projects that were added and provide the Members with a status update of where the projects are on the list and where the projects potentially will be in 2013. He said that he is interested in the volume of all of the projects and noted that there should be dollar amounts included so that the Members know the total project costs versus where the SDA is with overhead. Mr. Walsh

suggested that the report be provided to the Members in January 2013 and again mid-way through the year. He said that the reporting mechanism can be further discussed at the December SRC meeting. Ms. Hassett added that there is a paragraph in the 2013 Budget memorandum that summarizes the breadth of the portfolio and noted that the paragraph was very helpful.

Audit Committee Report

Mr. Walsh then asked for the report of the Audit Committee. Mr. Nixon advised the Members that the Committee met on November 19, 2012. He said that, as part of the October 2012 New Funding Allocation and Capital Program update, management had reported a \$400,000 increase in commitments in the Unforeseen Events Reserve. He noted that there was no change in the Planning Reserve. He reported a \$300,000 decrease in commitments in the 2008 Capital Plan Emergent Projects Reserve ("CPEPR") and a \$100,000 increase in commitments in the 2011 CPEPR. He informed the Members that the reserve balance for the Regular Operating Districts ("RODs") increased by \$2.1 million due entirely to a reduction in state share for projects nearing completion. He also reported that there were no additional grants offered in the current reporting period.

Mr. Nixon then provided the status of audit reports. He said that management had advised the Committee that staff is currently analyzing results of a survey regarding the use of Primavera prior to beginning a Compliance Review of Primavera. He reported that staff had presented the results of the Prompt Payment Audit which indicated a very low probability of Prompt Payment penalty exposure for the Authority. He noted that the

excellent results were related to management's establishment of a Centralized Payment Unit ("CPU") which has increased efficiencies.

Mr. Nixon then presented the 2013 Operating Budget ("Budget") that had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. He noted that the Budget had been discussed in detail at the Committee's October and November meetings and at the November 7 Board Meeting. He reported that the Audit Committee had unanimously agreed to advance the Budget to the full Board with a recommendation for approval. Mr. Larkins provided additional details regarding the Authority's operating expenses. Mr. Vargas asked Mr. Larkins to address the fact that merit raises, salary and/or cost of living increases for staff do not appear in the Budget. Mr. Larkins explained that across the State increases have been flat. He advised that for approximately the last five (5) years, SDA employees have had no salary increases. He further explained that, in addition to no increases in salary, SDA employees have been asked to contribute more to health care costs and, to a large extent, to pay for their parking which was previously covered by the state. Mr. Larkins spoke about the dedication of the Authority's employees who are being asked to do more for less pay adding that he is hopeful that eventually the employees will be rewarded and compensated for their hard work. There ensued a brief discussion regarding the reporting of expenses exclusive and inclusive of costs charged to school facilities projects. Ms. Hassett praised staff for providing a high level of detail in the Budget. She noted that the Budget marks the end of the PMF era and stated that the 2013 budget is the appropriate way to attribute and track costs. She further noted the longevity of many members of SDA staff and acknowledged their dedication in these challenging economic times. Mr. Walsh asked if there were any further questions or

comments regarding the Budget. Hearing none, Mr. Walsh called for a vote to approve the 2013 Operating Budget.

The resolution pertaining to the proposed 2013 Operating Budget had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Upon a motion by Mr. Nixon and seconded by Mr. McNamara, the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 5a*, was unanimously approved by the Board.

In continuing, Mr. Nixon then reported that management had provided the Committee with the October 2012 Monthly Financial Report. He said that, as of October 2012, the Authority's operating expenditures were at \$29.2 million, which is \$4.2 million lower than budget for the period and a \$2.3 million decrease from the corresponding period in the prior year. He advised the Board that school facilities project expenditures total \$149 million, which is \$7 million higher than spending for the corresponding prior year period due largely to an increase in grant activity offset by a decrease in construction work and related project costs. He said that, since inception, 96% of all SDA disbursements relate to school facilities projects and 4% relate to program administrative and general expenses. Mr. Nixon then advised that of the current year operating expenses of \$29.2 million, approximately \$13.1 million of personnel costs can be attributed to school facilities projects. He reported that the estimated value of current school facilities project activity is approximately \$2.2 billion.

In conclusion, Mr. Nixon reported that Ernst & Young ("E&Y") had discussed with the Committee the SDA 2012 Audit Plan ("Audit"). He advised that E&Y outlined areas of emphasis and the thought process utilized in development of the Audit. He said that E&Y discussed the financial reporting in accordance with the requirements of the

General Accounting Standards Board ("GASB"). He advised that the Committee met privately with E&Y at the conclusion of the meeting to discuss Authority matters in accordance with Executive Order 122.

School Review Committee Report

Change Orders/Amendments

Ernest Bock & Sons, Inc.

Mr. Walsh asked Ms. Hassett to provide the report of the School Review Committee ("SRC"). Ms. Hassett reported that the Committee met on November 19, 2012 and discussed various issues. She reported that the Committee was provided with a proposed change order (#109) for additional work in the amount of \$265,000 and also a resolving change order (#110) in the amount of \$127,425.58 for Ernest Bock & Sons, Inc. ("Bock") for the Victor Mravlag Elementary School No. 21 project in the Elizabeth School District. A memorandum providing the background and details of the recommended change orders was provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Ms. Hassett offered the Members an overview of the project and the issues involved.

Following discussion, a resolution for approval of Change Order #109 in the amount of \$265,000.00 and Resolving Change Order #110 in the amount of \$127,425.58 for Bock (Contract No. EL-0016-C03) for the Victor Mravlag Elementary School No. 21 in the Elizabeth School District had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Mr. McNamara, and seconded by Mr. Luckie, the change order and resolving change order were approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6a1*.

Delegation Authority Award

NT-0003-C02 - Phillipsburg - Phillipsburg High School - Construction of New High School

Ms. Hassett reported that the Committee was provided with a recommendation for approval of delegated authority for a construction award and final charter for the Phillipsburg High School ("Phillipsburg") project in the Phillipsburg School District. She said that Mr. Larkins reported earlier in his CEO report that the technical proposals, which were previously due on December 6, have been granted an extension and are now due on December 13. He said that bids will be opened on December 20. Ms. Hassett explained that, in order to meet the timeframe for the construction schedule, the Members are being asked to delegate authority to Mr. Larkins (CEO), Ms. Hassett (SRC Acting Chair) and Mr. Walsh (Board Chairman) to approve the award provided it is within 110% of the cost construction estimate ("CCE") of \$87 million. She noted that the final budget charter in the amount of \$134 million is also recommended for approval. Mr. Larkins said that prior to award a teleconference will be scheduled to advise the Members once the presumptive awardee is identified.

A resolution for the Phillipsburg project approving a delegation of authority to the Chief Executive Officer, the Chairman of the Board of Directors and the Acting Chair of the School Review Committee to award a contract consistent with the memorandum presented to the Board and approving a final charter had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Mr. McNamara, and seconded by Mr. Egan, the delegated authority and final charter were unanimously approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6bi*.

Approval of Award: PW1204 - Professional Staffing Services

Referencing the memorandum previously provided to the Board, Ms. Hassett then discussed the recommendation for approval of an award for professional staffing services. She explained that the proposed contract award includes seven (7) firms to assist the Authority with supplementary staffing needs. Ms. Hassett noted that the contract is for two (2) years with an option for the SDA to extend it for an additional year. She said that the compensation for the engagements will not exceed \$1.8 million in the aggregate for the initial two (2) year term and not exceed \$2.7 million if the option to extend for an additional year is exercised. Ms. Hassett noted the listing of the seven (7) firms in the memorandum.

A resolution pertaining to an approval of award for the recommended firms for professional staffing services had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Nixon, and seconded by Ms. Hassett, the award for professional staffing services was approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6ci*.

Reports

Ms. Hassett reported that Mr. Ballard had provided the Committee with a brief update regarding the status of project closeouts. Mr. Ballard reported that the Department of Transportation work has been completed with regard to the New Brunswick demonstration project. He said that the work was completed seven (7) to nine (9) days ahead of schedule and is anticipated to be advanced for final close out moving forward.

Ms. Hassett noted that the Committee also considered two litigation settlement items that will be discussed in Executive Session.

Public Comments

Mr. Walsh announced that the Public Comments portion of the meeting would begin. He then asked if there were any members of the public present who wished to address the Board.

Reverend Eddie Torres introduced himself as a resident of Camden, New Jersey. He said that he was glad that the Phillipsburg High School project was on today's agenda as it is a school that was the subject of litigation and, as a settlement, the school is now being built. He added that the Phillipsburg parents stood up and spoke about the building of that school and, as a result, the SDA is building that school. Mr. Larkins said that while he did not concur with Rev. Torres' characterization, he agreed that the Phillipsburg parents were supportive of a high school and that the Phillipsburg School is being advanced. Rev. Torres said that he found this ironic because he is addressing the Members today about the Lanning Square ("LSS") replacement school in Camden. He advised the Members that he had attended the Camden School Board meeting held last week and wanted to report to the SDA Board with regards to the Urban Hope Act ("UHA") in his community. He said that Camden appears to be the only city getting UHA Schools. He described what he believed to be a conflict of interest on the part of one board member who abstained from voting on UHA matters until the recent vote on the Knowledge Is Power Program ("KIPP") project. He reported that the KIPP project was a project which involved building five (5) schools. He said that the KIPP project mirrored Camden's proposal to the Authority when money was available but which was

rejected because of cost. He asked if the SDA has received any litigation or attorney information from concerned parents that are suing with regard to the LSS project and stated that he is currently pursuing a \$10 million lawsuit with the Board of Education, the Attorney General, the Mayor of Camden and the Camden School Board because they stopped democracy in the city of Camden. He opined that if the public does not vote for the members of the school board, the public has no say and no democracy. He said that Camden is fighting for the LSS project as it was the first school on the list. He accused the SDA of holding the Camden community hostage. Rev. Torres said that he is Puerto Rican and provided some background regarding his family's history in the community, noting that his mother had worked at LSS until it was shut down. He stated that this is a textbook gentrification plan for how to destroy a community. Rev. Torres then discussed individuals and political influences that were destroying the community by having the school declared unsafe and not replacing it, adding that without a school in an area no one puts investment dollars in that area and people begin to live like rats. He said that the streets have become unsafe and this has caused a mass exodus from the Lanning Square area. Rev. Torres then stated that Cooper Hospital is buying up the now depressed property in the area.

Rev. Torres said that the SDA has held his community hostage by not building the replacement school. He said that Camden sued for \$6 billion dollars and not one shovel was put in the ground before all that money was spent. He said that the Governor took the LSS off the list and the SDA killed the community. He then said that, with regard to the flawed process on the UHA, he had spoken to the aforementioned board member at the last school board meeting regarding her abstention. He said that her abstention put

KIPP into a deadlock with a four (4) to four (4) vote. He then explained that in order to bring that proposal back to the board all the proposals that were rejected should be brought back, not just the one. He said that he thinks there was some sort of payoff because those board members who voted it down changed their vote completely and it passed unanimously. Mr. Walsh asked Rev. Torres what he hoped to accomplish by addressing the Members today. Rev. Torres said he would like to have a meeting with the SDA before he files his lawsuit. In conclusion, he stated that the affirmative vote on KIPP at the last school board meeting cannot happen because the whole process is flawed.

Mr. Walsh thanked Rev. Torres for his remarks and asked if there were any other members of the public present who wished to address the Board. Hearing none, upon motion and with unanimous consent, the meeting was adjourned to executive session.

INTRODUCTION

Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended on March 7, 2012, Board approval is required for goods and services contracts awarded pursuant to a sole source exemption from advertising under NJAC 19:38D-6.2(a)1. A sole source procurement is necessary when only one vendor is capable of or available to provide the goods or services at the time they are required.

BACKGROUND

The Design Studio evaluated building and construction specification documentation solutions. The result of their evaluation is that MasterSpec® provides design and specification professionals a comprehensive, carefully researched, and technically correct building and construction specifications and background research information.

This request is for the purchase of a site license for ARCOM's MasterSpec® Specifications Systems software for program wide use by the NJSDA. This purchase is to include the "Comprehensive Complete Basic Package" with their Linx database to simplify searching and retrieval of specification data.

The Design Studio will be the primary user of the ARCOM software; however, the software will be available program wide for use by other NJSDA staff. The MasterSpec® software will provide crucial information for the development of the NJSDA Materials and Systems Standards, development of program wide LEED and Commissioning Protocol, and to support all aspects of the In-house NJSDA Design effort.

The bundled software and database package includes: Architectural/Structural/Civil and Mechanical/Plumbing/Electrical Engineering Specifications and supporting documentation in an editable and database format. The cost for the bundled software and database package is \$4,790

for the initial year (ARCOM offers discounts for both multi-year engagements as well as for AIA Members). The annual renewal/update cost is \$2,150/year.

The initial annual cost for this software purchase is provided for in the Authority's 2013 Operating Budget; likewise, the annual cost for subsequent software license renewals will be requested in future operating budgets submitted to the Board, as applicable.

SOLE SOURCE JUSTIFICATION

ARCOM has verified that they are the sole source provider of MasterSpec® Specifications Systems, a product of the AIA (American Institute of Architects). A copy of ARCOM's sole source letter is attached. MasterSpec® building and construction specifications, is the most widely used master guide specification system in the industry. The MasterSpec® Specifications System is considered the preeminent industry standard for building and construction specifications by the Architecture and related Engineering professions. MasterSpec® organizational structure is based upon the Construction Specifications Institute's MasterFormat® system.

RECOMMENDATION

Pursuant to regulations, we are seeking the Board's approval to waive advertisement of this procurement and award a contract to ARCOM based on the sole source exemption set forth at NJAC 19:38D-6.2(a)1. The Authority is also seeking the Board's approval to renew the software license annually without further Board approval so long as ARCOM remains the sole source provider and the cost remains below the threshold requiring Board approval in accordance with the NJSDA Operating Authority. In accordance with standard practice prior to upgrade or renewal, the Authority will evaluate the continued need for MasterSpec® and that the MasterSpec® product remains the preeminent industry standard for building and construction specification documentation.

WHEREAS, the basis for this sole source procurement, comprehensive details as to its intended use by SDA staff, information as to MasterSpec® Specifications Systems' sole source provider status and information as to price are set forth in the materials presented to the Board on this date and incorporated herein; and

WHEREAS, the Chief Executive Officer of the SDA has certified that the circumstances of this procurement warrant application of the sole source exemption set forth in Section 16c of EO #37.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that, consistent with the sole source exemption set forth in NJAC 19:38D-6.2(a)1, the Members of the Authority hereby authorize and approve a waiver of advertisement of this procurement and award a contract to ARCOM for the goods and services described in detail in the materials presented to the Board on this date.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Members of the Authority further authorize and approve the renewal of the software license annually without further Board approval so long as ARCOM remains the sole source provider and the cost remains below the threshold requiring Board approval in accordance with the NJSDA Operating Authority.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, this resolution shall take effect immediately, but no action authorized herein shall have force and effect until 10 days, Saturdays, Sundays and public holidays excepted, after a copy of the minutes of the Authority meeting at which this resolution was adopted has been delivered to the Governor for his approval, unless during such 10 day period, the Governor shall approve same, in which case such action shall become effective upon such approval.

INTRODUCTION

We are writing to recommend approval by the Members of the Authority of the award of a contract in the amount of \$757,000.00 to Sunnyfield Corporation and approval of the charter for this project (copy attached). We are further requesting the release of funds from the NJSDA Program Reserve maintained for emergent projects in the amount of \$1,102,593.00 to address the emergent condition at the Ridge Street Elementary School in the Newark Public Schools (NPS) as approved by the Department of Education (DOE), consistent with the charter.

Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended on March 7, 2012, Board approval is required for the release of monies from the Program Reserve for emergent projects or emergency situations exceeding \$500,000. Further, the Operating Authority requires Board approval for the award of construction contracts greater than \$500,000. Both the construction award amount and the release of funds from the reserve exceed \$500,000.

BACKGROUND

The Ridge Street Elementary School, built in 1887, is a 50,231 square foot facility educating 875 students in grades Kindergarten through 8. As a result of site visits conducted by NJSDA and DOE in 2011 and 2012 to review potential emergent conditions within the district, the DOE issued a Pre-Construction Approval on April

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18, 2012 for an emergent project to address conditions related to the replacement of the boilers and all ancillary equipment at the facility. On May 15, 2012, the NJSDA issued a Task Order assignment to LAN Associates Engineering, Planning, Architecture, Surveying, Inc. under an existing Task Order Contract to perform Environmental Services inclusive of the following:

- Identification and Investigation of the environmental condition;
- Collection of samples and performance of required testing;
- Design and Construction Administration Services related to environmental abatement activities; and
- Third party monitoring related to environmental abatement activities.

Based upon the above-mentioned site visits and investigative assessment, staff has developed the following scope of work to address the condition:

- Removal of the 2 boilers and all associated boiler controls, pumps, piping, breeching and electrical components. A complete abatement of the asbestos containing materials and the mercury light switches is to be performed with this work, within the confines of the boiler room; and
- Provide and install two (2) new, factory-tested, sectional gas-fired cast iron boilers, including new burners, trim and all required ancillary systems for generating steam and the installation of a natural gas line to serve the new boilers. The boilers shall be connected to and integrated within the existing steam distribution system and shall include documents and supplementary items necessary to ensure proper installation and operation; and
- Provide room layout plans, sizing the boiler system's ancillary equipment inclusive of water treatment, water feed and condensate tanks, pumps and sizing of the electrical system. Prepare documents to secure construction permits and prepare record set drawings/plans at the completion of the project.

PROCUREMENT PROCESS

This package was advertised beginning on November 21, 2012 on the NJSDA website, NJ State website and in selected newspapers for interested firms registered as Small Business Enterprises (SBE) to participate in the bidding process.

A mandatory pre-bid conference was held on November 29, 2012.

Project Rating Proposals were received on December 5, 2012. Bidders were evaluated based on the largest of four projects completed in the past seven years, safety records as well as reference checks. Based on evaluation of the information submitted, four (4) bidders received a Project Rating Limit.

Requests for Information (RFIs) were received by December 4, 2012. The addendum containing the responses to the RFIs were issued to the bidders on December 10, 2012.

Price Proposals were received on December 20, 2012. The Price Proposals were publicly opened and the lump sum base bids were read aloud as required by law.

Following the public bid opening, the NJSDA performed a review of the Price Proposals to determine the responsiveness of each bidder to the solicitation. The review determined that two (2) bidders were responsive. The results of the review are listed below:

Contractor	Bid Amount	Comments
Sunnyfield Corporation	\$757,000.00	Qualified and responsive bidder.
Amco Enterprises, Inc.	\$796,000.00	Qualified and responsive bidder.

The responsive low bidder was Sunnyfield Corporation.

The bid submitted by Sunnyfield Corporation was 3.44% above the CCE. In order to understand the differential between the CCE and the bid price and to ensure the contractor's Price Proposal was inclusive of all scope elements, a conference was conducted on December 21, 2012 with Procurement, Program Operations, and Sunnyfield Corporation to review the bid. After discussion that also included the Contract Management Division, it was determined that some aspects of the bid were higher and others lower than the CCE, and that the major differentials between the CCE and the bid price were due to:

- The Contractor's pricing for electrical work and pipe insulation is higher than the NJSDA estimate.
- The Contractor's value for general conditions costs are lower than the NJSDA estimate.

At the time of review, Sunnyfield Corporation confirmed that its Price Proposal is inclusive of all scope elements contained in the Contract Documents. The Program Operations Director and the Contract Management Director recommend award of the project to Sunnyfield Corporation.

FINAL BUDGET

Based on Sunnyfield Corporation's bid, the construction cost to address the emergent project is \$757,000.00. The total funding, including pre-design, assessments, architect fees and construction contingency, is estimated at \$1,102,593.00.00

SCHEDULE

Construction is anticipated to begin late spring 2013, planned such that the abatement of the asbestos containing materials and the mercury light switches is to be completed while the school is vacant, during the summer months. The schedule recognizes the purchase of long-lead items and includes an overall construction duration of 85 calendar days. Final completion is anticipated to be reached in November, 2013, shortly after the start of the heating season. The school facility is currently being served with one (1) temporary boiler, leased by the district, which shall remain in place until the new boilers are operational and fully functioning.

INTRODUCTION

We are writing to request that the Members of the Authority approve the delegation of authority to the Chief Executive Officer, the Chairman of the Board and the Chair of the School Review Committee to award contracts to twenty firms for Design Consultant Services that will provide viable, cost effective solutions for projects throughout the NJSDA Districts involving emergent facilities conditions, capital improvement needs, or other limited scope tasks. Through these twenty engagements resulting from a competitive procurement process, the NJSDA will have available a pool of Design Consultants from which to assign Task Orders on an as-needed basis for time-sensitive, limited-scope projects (i.e., design for renovation of existing school facilities, repair of emergent conditions, but not complete design of new school facilities projects) requiring predesign, design and/or construction administration services. Each of the twenty contracts will individually have a not-to-exceed amount of \$3,000,000 for the three year term: the Term of each Agreement shall extend for a period of three years or until all obligations of the Design Consultant to deliver services pursuant to any existing Task Order have been performed to the satisfaction of the Authority, whichever is later.

We are also requesting that the Members of the Authority approve the issuance of individual Task Order assignments by staff under this engagement to allow for expeditious advancement of projects to address emergent conditions at school facilities, capital improvement projects, and other NJSDA design needs with the exception of complete design of new facilities (such as predesign feasibility studies or post-construction correction of defective conditions).

Task Orders may be awarded pursuant to several methods:

- 1) Rotational assignment to pool members; or
- Advertisement to all pool members, for task order award based on competitive selection of proposal most advantageous to the NJSDA based upon considerations of cost, efficiency and approach; or
- 3) Solicitation of proposals from up to six randomly selected pool participants, for task order award to proposal most advantageous to the NJSDA based upon considerations of cost, efficiency and approach.

Further we are requesting that the Members approve the delegation of authority to NJSDA staff and the Chief Executive Officer to execute individual Project Planning Charters for the projects for which design services will be assigned through these task orders. Assignments under this engagement are anticipated to include emergent projects with construction costs that may range from \$50,000 up to \$3 million per school facility, capital improvement projects with construction costs potentially greater than \$3 million per school facility, and other types of projects with cost levels similar to emergent projects. Fees for any given Task Order assignment will be based upon established hourly rates, as determined by the NJSDA and as set forth in the RFP, or as a lump-sum fee consistent with the established hourly rates.

PROCUREMENT PROCESS

In accordance with NJSDA regulations, the NJSDA employed a single-step process for this procurement. The RFP was advertised beginning on November 20, 2012 on the NJSDA website and on the State of New Jersey Business Opportunities website.

The solicitation required interested firms to submit a Technical Proposal. Technical Proposals were received on December 14, 2012 from forty-eight (48) firms. The Technical Proposal provided information regarding the firm's past experience and qualifications as well as the firm's approach to certain core tasks, budgeting and scheduling.

A Selection Committee consisting of three NJSDA staff members will evaluate the responses to the RFP. The evaluations will be based upon the information provided by the firms in response to the RFP for this engagement. The three committee members will independently evaluate the responses submitted for Design Consultant Services based on the following criteria:

- Team Design Consultant Experience
- Team Approach to Pre-Design Investigation and Development of Cost Effective Alternatives
- Team Approach to Control Budget and Schedule

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Each Selection Committee member will evaluate each Technical Proposal with respect to each criterion on a scale of 0 to 10 as follows:

- Outstanding (9-10): depth and quality of response offers significant advantages.
- Superior (7-8): exceeds RFP requirements with no deficiencies.
- Sufficient (5-6): meets RFP requirements with no significant deficiencies.
- Minimal (3-4): meets RFP requirements but contains some significant deficiencies.
- Marginal (1-2): comprehends intent of RFP but contains many significant deficiencies.
- Unsatisfactory (0): requirements not addressed and lack of detail precludes adequate evaluation.

Weighting factors will then be applied to each of the Selection Committee member evaluations to arrive at a total weighted score as follows:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, this resolution shall take effect immediately, but no action authorized herein shall have force and effect until 10 days, Saturdays, Sundays and public holidays excepted, after a copy of the minutes of the Authority meeting at which this resolution was adopted has been delivered to the Governor for his approval, unless during such 10 day period, the Governor shall approve same, in which case such action shall become effective upon such approval.

Project Approvals:

Two emergent construction projects were verified to be compliant with SBE requirements by the Contractor Compliance Coordinator.

Vendor Services staff continues to participate at mandatory pre-bid and pre-construction meetings to instruct and inform bidders regarding SDA's SBE goals, policies and procedures, including:

- Small Business Enterprise subcontracting goal of 25% of all contracts
- County workforce goals for minorities and females
- Detailed process procedures to monitor and track the progress made toward these goals throughout the life cycle of each project

At these meetings, general contractors are strongly encouraged to identify and hire minority-owned and womenowned firms, as well as locally-based enterprises, for diverse business participation on all school building projects. Additional outreach strategies are discussed and utilized.

SMALL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (SBE) COMPLIANCE MONITORING

The SDA regularly exceeds the State-mandated 25% SBE goal. The figures below demonstrate compliance with this requirement.

Program orientation will commence February 12 and sessions will run through April 9, 2013 with a "Graduation" ceremony scheduled for the following week. The SMWBE Contractor Training Program enables small, minority and women-owned businesses to gain valuable knowledge on how to do business with the SDA. Participants receive instruction from SDA staff and subject matter experts on bidding, estimating, scheduling, budgeting, accounting, bonding and marketing.

SDA Highlights Recent Project Activity

The SDA issued press releases throughout the month of December to highlight recent project advancement. A press release was issued for an advertisement for a new facility to replace the Oliver Street Elementary School in Newark. A press release was also issued to announce the start of emergent repairs at the West Side High School in Newark.

Authority Distributes ROD Grant Press Release

The SDA has continued executing state grants across New Jersey through its Regular Operating District (ROD) grant program, furthering the Governor's commitment to providing the state's children with modern and efficient schools.

In December, the SDA distributed a press release for two grants executed for Burlington County Special Services School District with a total state share of \$675,049.

SUBJECT: Monthly Financial Report – November 2012

The Office of the Chief Financial Officer is providing the attached monthly financial report to the Members of the Authority for their information. Included on pages 1 and 2 of this report is a "Financial Summary" of the Authority's activities for the year. On pages 3 and 4 of the report is a summary of the Authority's operating expenditures and headcount information. The basic financial statements and cash flow report follow.

Authority Operating Expenses (Actual vs. Budget)

For the November 2012 year to date period, Authority operating expenses total \$31.7 million which is **\$4.8 Million lower** than budget for the corresponding period. The variation of actual expenses versus budget is mainly due to:

- <u>Personnel Expense</u> has a **\$3.5M** positive variance because the Authority is currently 20 FTEs under budget;
- <u>Contract and Professional Outside Services</u>, **\$244K**, Spending has yet to occur as anticipated for; interagency DAG legal fees, and MIS/Project Service consulting fees,
- <u>Management Information System</u>, **\$904K**, anticipated expenditures for the DOE Long Range Facility Project, through November 2012, is \$1.1M, while actual spending is only \$250K.

Authority Operating Expenses (Actual vs. Prior Year)

For the November 2012 year to date period, Authority operating expenses (\$31.7 million) have **decreased \$2.6M** as compared to the corresponding prior year. The decrease in expenses year-over-year is due to:

• <u>Personnel Expense</u> has a **\$3.2M** positive variance due to; 17 fewer FTEs. Partially offsetting the positive variance is an increase in MIS spending \$250K for the DOE Long Range Facility Project, and \$195K for system hardware purchases.

School Facilities Project Expenditures (Actual vs. Prior Year)

For the November 2012 year to date period, project expenditures total \$160 million which is **\$2 million higher** than the spending for the corresponding prior year. The variance is associated with a \$21M increase in grant activity, offset by a \$19M decrease in construction work and related project cost.

Other

Since program inception, 66% of the funds authorized for the SDA Districts have been disbursed. Additionally, since inception 96% of all SDA disbursements relate to school facilities projects and 4% relate to program general and administrative expense.

Included in the program general and administrative expense is an estimate of \$14.8M in personnel costs that can be attributable to school facilities projects.

The estimated *value* of current school facilities project activity is approximately \$2.2B.
