A meeting of the Board of Directors of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority ("SDA", "NJSDA" or "the Authority) was held on Wednesday, May 1, 2013 at 9:00 AM at the offices of the Authority at One West State Street, Trenton, New Jersey.

being a quorum of the Board. Ms. Lemelle, Mr. Lewis-Powder, Mr. Perez, Mr. Capelli and Mr. Piaia participated in the meeting via teleconference.

At the Chairman's request, Marc Larkins, chief executive officer; Jason Ballard, chief of staff; Jane Kelly, vice president and assistant secretary; Andrew Yosha, vice president; Donald Guarriello, vice president and chief financial officer; Albert Barnes, acting chief counsel; Manuel

Da Silva, program director; Corrado Minervini, program director; James Adams, program director; and Sean Murphy, director, of the SDA participated in the meeting. Nicole Crifo of the Governor's Authorities Unit also participated in the meeting by teleconference.

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman of the Board, Mr. Walsh. Mr. Walsh requested that Ms. Kelly read the requisite notice of the meeting. Ms. Kelly announced that the meeting notice had been sent to the *Trenton Times* and *Star-Ledger* at least 48 hours prior to the meeting, and that a meeting notice had been duly posted on the Secretary of State's bulletin board at the State House in Trenton, New Jersey.

Approval of Meeting Minutes

Mr. Walsh then presented the minutes of the Open and Executive Session meetings of the Board held April 3, 2013 for consideration and approval. A copy of the minutes and resolutions presented had been provided to the Members for review in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas, and seconded by Ms. Hassett, the Open and Executive Session meeting minutes were approved by the Board upon its vote in favor of the resolutions attached hereto as *Exhibit 3a & 3b*.

Authority Matters

CEO Report

Mr. Walsh asked Mr. Larkins to provide the report of the CEO. Mr. Larkins reported that the SDA was involved in several public events over the last month. He reported that the SDA had graduated a class of seventeen (17) firms from its Small Minority and Women Owned Business Enterprises (SMWBE) program, noting that, in the three (3) years that the program has been in place, the list of graduating firms totals forty (40) SMWBEs. He said that the program has been very successful. He reported that, as part of SDA's efforts to encourage relationships

between the graduate SWMBEs and general contractors, general contractors (GCs) were invited to participate in the graduation event affording excellent networking opportunities. Mr. Larkins advised the Members that he had appeared before the Assembly Budget Committee on April 11. He said that questions were raised regarding specific SDA projects and SDA funding. Mr. Larkins said that he will be appearing before the Senate Budget Committee shortly. In continuing, Mr. Larkins reported that, on April 22, SDA staff participated in "Earth Day" in the Neptune School District along with the State Department of Environmental Protection (DEP).

With regard to SDA project activity, Mr. Larkins reported that there are several emergent and Capital Project awards and procurements on today's meeting agenda for consideration. He said that the SDA advertised a design contract award for the Trenton Central High School project (TCHS). He said that, upon the approval of the award, activity will proceed on the project. Mr. Larkins said that the SDA has open advertisements for the ES #3 and PS #20 Elementary Schools in the Jersey City School District. He added that the SDA has also advertised for the demolition of the old H.B. Wilson Elementary School in the Camden School District.

Mr. Larkins reported that, in the coming months, the SDA will be advertising a design/build contract for PS #16 Elementary School in the Paterson School District and two (2) addition/renovation projects in the Bridgeton School District, as well as for a new Caruso Elementary School (Caruso) in the Keansburg School District.

Next, Mr. Larkins reported that there are two adjustments to today's agenda. He explained that the two (2) Rule Readoptions (Rules) that were to be considered are now being tabled due to the need for minor adjustments. He said that the Rules will come before the Members for consideration at the appropriate time, and if needed, a special Board meeting will be scheduled. Mr. Larkins said that Agenda Item 6bv, the Marshall Street Elementary School

matter, will require discussion in the Executive Session of today's Board meeting due to protest issues and so will proceed in that fashion.

Lastly, Mr. Larkins reminded the Members that their Financial Disclosure Statements (FDS) are required to be filed by May 15, 2013. He said that if Financial Disclosure Statements are not filed at the designated time, \$50 per day fines will be imposed. He offered the Members the assistance of SDA staff in this process if needed.

School Review Committee Report

Change Orders/Amendments – 1) Tricon Enterprises, Inc.; 2) Patock Construction Co., Inc. Mr. Luckie advised the Members that the School Review Committee (Committee) met on April 15, 2013 and discussed various issues. He reported that the Committee recommends that the Board approve a change order to Tricon Enterprises for the Joseph C. Caruso Elementary

School (Caruso School) in the Keansburg School District in the amount of \$30,495.98. He said that the change order is for the abatement and disposal of additional asbestos contaminated material found during the demolition of the building. Mr. Adams added that the contractor has completed the demolition work and that the project is currently in the administrative closeout phase.

A resolution pertaining to the approval of change order #6 for the Caruso School project had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Mr. Egan, and seconded by Mr. Vargas, the change order was approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6a1*.

Mr. Luckie then reported that the Committee recommends that the Board approve a change order to Patock Construction Co., Inc. (Patock) for the Elizabeth Academic High School project in the Elizabeth School District in the aggregate amount of \$879,525. The change order is associated with work items identified during the constructability review process. Mr. Minervini provided the Members with an overview of the project.

A resolution pertaining to the approval of change order #1 for Patock Construction Co., Inc. had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Mr. Vargas, and seconded by Mr. Nixon, the change order was approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6a2*.

Mr. Luckie then reported that the Committee had considered a release of funds from the program reserve, contract award and approval of final charter for Union Avenue Middle School (Union Avenue) in the Irvington School District for a roof repair or replacement, masonry repairs and lintel repairs or replacement emergent project. He reported that the Members are requested to approve the award of a construction contract in the amount of \$2,397,018 to Catcord

Construction Company, Inc. (Catcord); the release of \$3,126,332 from the program reserve to address the emergent project, and approval of the final charter for the emergent project. Mr. Murphy provided the Members with an overview of the project.

A resolution for approval of a release of funds from the program reserve, contract award to Catcord Construction Company, Inc. and final charter for Union Avenue in the Irvington School District for a roof repairs or replacement, masonry repairs and lintel repairs or replacement emergent project had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Mr. Vargas, and seconded by Mr. Nixon, the award, final charter and release of funds were approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6bi*.

Mr. Luckie then presented a memorandum regarding the release of funds from the program reserve, contract award and approval of the final charter for Chancellor Avenue School in the Irvington Public School District for a roof repairs or replacement, masonry repairs and lintel repairs or replacement emergent project. He reported that the Members are requested to approve the award of a construction contract in the not-to-exceed (NTE) amount of \$555,490 to The Bennett Company (Bennett), the release of \$804,253 from the program reserve to address the emergent project; and the final charter for emergent project. Mr. Murphy then provided the Members with an overview of the project.

A resolution pertaining to the release of funds from the program reserve, contract award to The Bennett Company and final charter for the Chancellor Avenue School in the Irvington School District for a roof repairs or replacement, masonry repairs and lintel repairs or replacement emergent project had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Ms. Hassett, and seconded by Ms. D'Autrechy, the

award, final charter and release of funds were approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6bii*.

Mr. Luckie then presented a memorandum regarding the release of funds from the program reserve, contract award and approval of the final charter for Passaic High School 12 (Passaic) in the Passaic City School District for a masonry repair, lintel replacement and window assembly and grade level drainage repairs emergent project. He reported that the Members are requested to approve the award of a construction contract in the Not To Exceed (NTE) amount of \$458,812 to Molba Construction (Molba), the release of \$669,339 from the Program Reserve to address the emergent project, and the final charter for emergent project. Mr. Murphy provided the Members with an overview of the project.

A resolution pertaining to the release of funds from the program reserve, contract award to Molba Construction and final charter for Passaic High School 12 in the Passaic School District for a masonry repair, lintel replacement and window assembly and grade level drainage repairs emergent project had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Mr. Piaia, and seconded by Mr. Vargas, the award, final charter and release of funds were approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6biii*.

Mr. Luckie then presented a memorandum regarding the release of funds from the program reserve, contract award and approval of the final charter for Salem High School in the Salem City School District for a partial roof replacement and repairs emergent project. He reported that the Members are requested to approve the award of a construction contract in the NTE amount of \$647,271 to Hall Construction Co., Inc. (Hall), the release of \$887,143 from the

program reserve, and the final charter for the emergent project. Mr. Murphy provided the Members with an overview of the project.

A resolution pertaining to the release of funds from the program reserve, contract award to Hall and final charter for the Salem High School in the Salem City School District for a partial roof replacement and repairs emergent project had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Mr. Vargas, and seconded by Ms. Hassett, the award, final charter and release of funds were approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6biv*.

Mr. Luckie then presented a memorandum regarding a contract award and approval of final charters for the Frank R. Conwell Public School 3 (PS3)/Middle School 4 (MS4) projects in the Jersey City School District in the amount of \$688,000 for corrective work. Mr. Murphy provided the Members with an overview of the projects.

A resolution pertaining to the contract award and approval of final charters for the Frank R. Conwell Public School 3 (PS3)/Middle School 4 (MS4) projects had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Mr. Egan, and seconded by Ms. D'Autrechy, the contract award and approval of final charters were approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6bvi*.

Mr. Luckie then reported that the Committee recommends that the Board approve the construction management services award to the firm with the highest Final Combined Score, STV Construction, Inc. (STV) for a total lump sum fee of \$1,522,607 for Construction Management Services for the new Marshall Street Elementary School (Marshall Street) in the Paterson Public School District. Mr. Murphy provided the Members with an overview of the project, noting that the package was advertised as a solicitation for price and other factors with

price weighted at 40% of the overall weight, and all non-price factors with a combined weight of 60%.

A resolution pertaining to the construction manager award for the Marshall Street project had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Mr. McNamara, and seconded by Mr. Vargas, the construction manager award to STV Construction, Inc. was approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6ci*.

Mr. Luckie then advised the Members that it is recommended that they approve an award to the firm with the highest Final Combined Score, Gilbane Building Company (Gilbane), for a total lump sum fee of \$1,102,736 for construction management services for the new PS No. 20 Elementary School (PS#20) in the Jersey City Public School District. Mr. Murphy provided the Members with an overview of the project. After discussion, Mr. Walsh suggested that the Board focus on the particulars of the review process going forward.

A resolution pertaining to the construction management services award for the PS#20 project had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Mr. Vargas, and seconded by Mr. Egan, the award to Gilbane Building Company was approved by the Board upon its vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6cii*.

Audit Committee Report

The Chairman then requested that Mr. Nixon provide the Board with the report of the Audit Committee. Mr. Nixon advised the Members that the Audit Committee met on April 15, 2013. He said that management had provided the Committee with the March 2013 New Funding Allocation and Capital Plan Update. He said that management reported no change in the

Unforeseen Events Reserve balance and an increase of \$15.3 million in the Planning Reserve balance. He reported a \$200,000 increase in the 2008 Capital Plan Emergent Projects Reserve balance and noted a \$4.4 million decrease in the 2011 Capital Plan Emergent Projects Reserve balance. Mr. Nixon advised that the reserve balance for the Regular Operating Districts ("RODs") increased by \$900,000.

Mr. Nixon then reported that management had discussed with the Committee two (2) completed recommendations. He advised that the allowance authorization form has been created in response to the SDA Design Consultant Allowance recommendation and its use has been implemented. He noted that the second completed recommendation relates to the SDA Design Consultant Amendments. He explained that staff has received direction with respect to the documentation of amendment activities, including completion of the necessary forms and their inclusion in the amendment files, with the main focus on improving the paperwork which facilitates tracking capabilities.

In continuing, Mr. Nixon said that Management presented a revised proposal for the statutorily mandated audits. He advised that the SDA, in consultation with the Office of the State Comptroller, has developed a model for auditing these projects. He advised that updates would be forthcoming. Mr. Nixon then noted that an assessment was presented to the Committee on acquisition and pre-development activity conducted in connection with an SDA Capital Project. He explained that the assessment determined that project funds were appropriately spent in accordance with contractual terms, SDA practices and New Jersey rules and regulations.

Mr. Nixon then reported that the Committee was provided with the March 2013 Monthly Financial Report with management advising that, as of March 2013, the Authority's operating

expenditures totaled \$9.7 million which is \$1.3 million lower than budget for the period. He said that this is an \$866,000 decrease from the corresponding period in the prior year. Mr. Nixon added that, as of March 2013 year to date, project expenditures, at \$35 million, are down \$3.8 million as compared to corresponding prior year; and down \$26.1 million in comparison to the 2013 Capital spending forecast. He said that the year-over-year variance is attributable to a decrease in grant activity (\$13.1 million), offset by increases in construction (\$5.7 million) and personnel expenses (\$3.6 million) now allocated to project costs and not operating expenses. Mr. Nixon reported that, since inception, 66.5% of the funds authorized for the SDA Districts have been disbursed. He advised that 96% of all SDA disbursements relate to school facilities projects and 4% relate to program administrative and general expenses. In conclusion, Mr. Nixon said that the estimated value of current school facilities project activity is approximately \$2.2 billion.

Reports

Mr. Walsh referenced the monthly reports and asked Mr. Ballard to update the Members regarding Project Closeouts. Mr. Ballard provided an update regarding the Project Closeout Status Report. He reported that five (5) Capital projects have been closed, one (1) Capital project has been transferred to the local district and six (6) additional emergent projects were closed. Mr. Ballard further reported that there has been much activity with regard to the demonstration projects. Mr. Ballard reported that he and Mr. Yosha received a copy of a recommendation for closeout of the Vineland demonstration project which is currently under review. He said that the project is anticipated for full closure in the coming months. Mr. Ballard said that the Trenton demonstration project will follow. Lastly, Mr. Ballard reported that the New Brunswick demonstration project will be the next project for closeout.

Public Comments

Mr. Walsh announced that, consistent with the Open Public Meetings Act, the Public Comments portion of the meeting would begin. He requested, whenever possible, that multiple individuals from the same organization or district come up together to offer comments. He advised that the public comment period is to afford citizens the opportunity to comment on matters pertinent to the Authority's business. He requested that those speaking hold their comments to between three (3) and five (5) minutes.

Referencing a list of those who had indicated an interest in providing public comment, Mr. Walsh then invited Minister Lee Ingram, to address the Members. Minister Ingram thanked the Members for the immediate attention that was granted with regard to the Trenton Central High School roof issue. He then shared photos with the Members. Minister Lee noted that while it is great to see work being performed at the high school, there continues to be the need for a brand new Trenton Central High School.

Next, Diana Crowder, Certified Industrial Hygienist and consultant with the New Jersey Work Environment Council (NJWEC) spoke regarding the human element of how old and damaged schools impact the health of students and administrative and teaching staffs. She explained that she provides industrial hygiene technical assistance to the members of the New Jersey Education Association (NJEA). Ms. Crowder provided examples of her work which include performing walkthroughs and inspections of schools, air sampling, interpretation of air sampling results, educational seminars and conferences to educate staff on health and safety hazards in their schools and the prevention of such exposures. She shared a list of hazardous conditions and their potential health impacts with the Members.

Next, Georgia Koenig, TCHS graduate and representative of Urban Promise Trenton spoke on behalf of the TCHS project. She said that she had brought a few students with her so that they could witness the commitment and determination that a number of their fellow residents have regarding the need for improvements at their high school. Ms. Koenig noted the deplorable conditions of the high school. She said that the physical condition of the building does not demonstrate that a priority is placed on education. Ms. Koenig added that she was happy to hear that some progress is being made with regard to fixing the roof, but that there is still a long way to go. She begged the Members to do the right thing and modernize the school.

Next, teacher Cheryl Skeete of AFT New Jersey invited the Members to come out and visit some of the schools in the Newark School District. She reiterated some of Ms. Crowder's remarks regarding the health impacts of being in a classroom with mold and other disease related issues. She said that she is aware that processes have to be followed in moving forward with projects. She noted that some things are better off not being fixed but, rather, should be newly constructed because patching only puts a band aid on bad elements like asbestos and mold. Ms. Skeete reiterated the need for the Members to come visit some of the schools and see the conditions for themselves.

Next, Linda Reid spoke on behalf of the Paterson schools. She was accompanied to the podium by other Paterson representatives and shared photos of the Marshall & Hazel Elementary School (Marshall Street) project site with the Board. She also provided a chart to the Members listing all of the Paterson schools that are 100 years old and older. She also invited the Members to attend an event celebrating the 126th year of School #14. She said that several organizations will be in attendance and that the event will be held on May 2 at 11:00 a.m. Ms. Reid noted that the last time that School #14 was mentioned for advancement was in 2005. She said that School

#14 is a death trap and noted that if a fire were to break out, someone would get hurt. She reiterated that all the Members are welcome to attend the event for School #14 and noted that she is putting School #14 on her watch list along with the Marshall Street School.

Lastly, Emerson Simmons, concerned citizen of Trenton, addressed the Members. He noted that in 1998-99 he was a member of Trenton's first five-year (5) facility plan group. He said that, soon after, when Governor Whitman was in office, she put the school program in place. Mr. Simmons said that he also served on TCHS' committee where a plan was put in place and a promise was made to put more than \$120 million into TCHS for renovations. He said that approximately \$2 million was spent on the actual plan and no one has mentioned the status of the \$120 million for TCHS. Mr. Simmons said that for ten (10) years, TCHS was told that the SDA would not build a new school and then the SDA said that it would provide a new school, even though a committee came up with a less expensive renovation plan. He said that the SDA had a meeting last year and said that they were not going to do that either. Mr. Simmons said that he has attended meetings as part of a committee over the last four (4) months with the understanding that the committee was a renovation committee, only to find out later that it was a committee to fix eighteen (18) to thirty (30) issues at the high school. Mr. Emerson reminded the Members that he spoke about having windows fixed at last month's meeting and that a representative from the SDA noted that anything the SDA fixes, the district is responsible for bringing up to code. He said that what used to be emergent projects have now become emergency projects which are left to the district to fix. After further comment, Mr. Simmons said that urban districts do not have the money to fix emergency projects, so the buildings will continue to deteriorate. In conclusion, Mr. Simmons said that instead of putting a roof on a rotting building, a new school should be built. He also said that the new buildings that have

recently been built are now having issues and if the SDA wants to do something right for the children, they should stop taking short cuts and cheap ways to build and properly build a school. He said that even if it means only building three (3) or four (4) well-built schools.

Following the Public Comments portion of the meeting, Mr. Walsh asked for a motion to adjourn into Executive Session. He and Ms. Kelly explained that, in Executive Session, the Board will be discussing a proposed lease extension in connection with the Joseph C. Caruso School project and an award of contract and charter approval for the Marshall Street Elementary School along with certain legal issues associated therewith.

At the Chairman's request, Ms. Haney provided the Members with an overview of the two rule proposals before the Board. First she discussed the Proposed Re-adoption with Amendments of N.J.A.C 19:38—Procedures for Low-Bid Procurement of Construction Contracts for School Facilities Projects (N.J.A.C. 19:38 Rules).

Next, at the Chairman's request, Ms. Haney discussed the Proposed Re-adoption with Amendments of N.J.A.C 19:38A--Procedures for Prequalification of Contractors and Professional Services Consultants for the New Jersey Schools Construction Program (N.J.A.C. 19:38A Rules). Both Rules and proposed technical amendments thereto (collectively "the Rules") were fully described in a memorandum that was previously distributed to the Members.

With respect to the two Rule proposals, Ms. Haney explained that the proposed amendments to the existing Rules are limited to technical changes. Specifically, she said, the technical amendments to both Rules change any references therein from "School Construction Corporation" to "Schools Development Authority" and update the statutory citations as needed. She informed the Members that the Rules are set to expire on May 15, 2013. Ms. Haney noted that approval of the Rules will allow the SDA to prevent expiration of the Rules and to maintain the effectiveness of the underlying rules. She reminded the Members that the Rules were

previously submitted to the April School Review Committee (SRC) with additional changes that have been omitted from the Rules before the Board in order to advance the Rules expeditiously.

Ms. Haney then opened the floor for questions and/or comments.

The Members then discussed a number of issues related to the prequalification process. Mr. McNamara questioned whether the project rating process continues to be used to ensure the quality and fitness of the participating bidders at the early stages. Ms. Haney answered in the affirmative and explained the various factors applied by the Authority to ensure that the bidding pool is comprised of capable and appropriate bidders.

Ms. Hassett questioned how contractor evaluations are utilized in the process. Ms. Haney and Mr. Larkins explained the interplay between a bidder's submission of its largest previous project and the reference score criteria. Mr. Larkins indicated that while both rule proposals before the Board make technical changes only, additional and more substantive changes may be presented at a later date for Board consideration.

Mr. Perez inquired as to the impact if a contractor submits a bid inconsistent with the request for proposals. Ms. Haney explained the options available to the Authority to address irregular bids that have been submitted considering the nature (material or non-material) of the irregularity.

Mr. Maloney inquired as to the applicability of the N.J.A.C. 19:38A Rules to particular categories of projects. Ms. Haney and Mr. Larkins generally described which Authority rules are available for application to which types of projects and the process utilized in making determinations in this regard.

Mr. Larkins asked the Members to review the N.J.A.C. 19:38A Rule amendment materials that originally had been submitted to the SRC for review and to consider them a

starting point for a future discussion regarding potential additional changes to the prequalification rules to ensure that a robust prequalification process is maintained.

The Board and staff then generally discussed issues associated with the prequalification renewal process, project rating limits and the debarment process. Mr. Larkins noted the high standard associated with efforts to debar a contractor and described the factors relevant to such determinations.

2013 Financial Statement Audit

Pursuant to Governor James E. McGreevey's Executive Order No. 122 ("EO 122") and Governor Jon S. Corzine's Executive Order No. 37, the Board of Directors of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority (the "Authority") by and through the Board's Audit Committee¹ ("Audit Committee²), selected Ernst & Young LLP (E&Y), in September 2009 to provide independent auditor services. The scope of services set forth in the agreement provides that the consultant conduct an annual audit of the Authority's financial statements and shall review such audited financial statements with the Authority's management and the Audit Committee. Additionally, as set forth in the agreement, the independent auditor shall review with the Audit Committee the annual management letter discussing, among other things, any audit issues or internal control weaknesses identified during the audit.

The initial term of the agreement is for a period of three years, covering the 2009 through 2011 calendar year audits; the agreement also provides for, at the sole option of the Authority, two one-year extensions covering the 2012 and 2013 audits. In June 2012, The Authority exercised the option for the 2012 financial statement audit. It is now appropriate to consider extending the agreement for the option year 2013. In accordance with EO 122, the auditor selection process shall take place no less than once every five years and shall be based upon public, competitive bidding principles. Therefore, the exercise of option year 2013 is not contrary to EO 122 or the Authority's procurement rules and regulations.

¹ Pursuant to EO 122, the Audit Committee shall assist the Board in retaining an independent auditor to conduct an audit of the Authority's financial statements by making a recommendation to the Board after engaging in an auditor selection process. In order to ensure the independence of the auditor selection process, an evaluation committee, consisting of no less than three Board members, shall be established by the Board to conduct the solicitation and evaluation of eligible auditors. For the procurement of independent auditor services in the fall of 2009 there were three responsive bidders to the Authority's solicitation. In all cases, each of the bidders provided escalating annual lump sum fees over the term separate from their overall response to the RFP package. Based upon the evaluation committee's scoring, E&Y was the overall highest ranked firm; additionally, E&Y proposed the lowest total lump sum fees.

Background

Moral integrity reviews, which are required by New Jersey regulations adopted by the Authority, are performed for all vendors desiring to become prequalified to work on School Facilities Projects.

On October 5, 2011, the Board of Directors approved the current MOA for an initial 2-year term from July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2013, for an amount not to exceed \$500,000 per annum. According to paragraph 11 of the MOA, "the MOA may be extended annually thereafter by mutual written agreement of the Parties, subject to the availability of funding." For State Fiscal Year 2012, the Authority paid the NJSP \$297,740 for moral integrity investigative services; through the 2nd quarter of State Fiscal Year 2013, the Authority has paid to date \$163,750.

Recommendation

The Members are requested to approve an extension of the MOA with the NJSP for a one year period ending June 30, 2014 (State Fiscal Year 2014), for an additional cost not to exceed \$500,000.

INTRODUCTION:

I am writing to recommend approval of the release of funds from the Program Reserve maintained for emergent projects and emergency situations to address an emergent condition at the Captain James Lawrence Elementary School in Burlington City. This project will advance pursuant to NJSDA delegation for District management consistent with statutory and regulatory provisions. The release of funding requested is \$782,000.

Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010 as amended on March 7, 2012, Board approval is required for the release of funds from the Program Reserve for emergent projects or emergency situations exceeding \$500,000. The funding requested to address the emergent project at this school exceeds \$500,000.

BACKGROUND:

The Captain James Lawrence Elementary School, built in 1859, is a 46,772 square foot facility that educates approximately 181 students in grades Pre-K to 2. As a result of joint NJSDA and NJDOE site visits conducted in the Burlington City School District to review potential emergent conditions within the district, the NJDOE issued Pre-Construction Approval on July 18, 2012 for an emergent project to address conditions related to the failing roof system. Considerations supporting the decision to delegate included the District's successful prior management of a similar emergent project and recognition of the lack of complexity of this project.

After receipt of Pre-Construction Approval from the NJDOE, the NJSDA issued a grant offer to the District to allow for the advancement of the project. The District has engaged Fraytak Veisz Hopkins Duthie (FVHD) P.C, Architects-Planners to review the emergent condition and develop a scope of work to address the failing roof. Due to the age and deteriorated condition of the existing roof system, the architect's recommended scope calls for removal of the existing roof system and the installation of

approximately 35,000 square feet of new Ethylene Propylene Diene Monomer (EPDM) roofing. Based upon estimates provided by the District's design consultant that have been reviewed by the NJSDA, the cost of the project including appropriate contingency is estimated to be \$782,000:

INTRODUCTION

We are writing to recommend approval by the Members of the Authority of three related actions to address an emergent condition at the University Middle School in the Irvington Public Schools:

- 1. The release of funds from the NJSDA Program Reserve maintained for emergent projects;
- 2. The award of a construction contract; and
- 3. The Final Charter.

The recommended value for release from the Program Reserve is the not-to-exceed (N.T.E.) amount of \$3,641,797.00, a dollar value inclusive of the recommended N.T.E. construction contract value of \$2,816,095.00 and other project costs and contingency. The recommended Final Charter represents the project budget inclusive of N.T.E. dollar values for the award of construction as well as contingency (copy attached). As discussed below, the recommended actions represent N.T.E. values to support development and implementation of the most appropriate, efficient and timely action to address the emergent condition.

Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended on March 7, 2012, Board approval is required for the release of monies from the Program Reserve for emergent projects or emergency situations exceeding \$500,000.00. Further, the Operating Authority requires Board approval for the award of construction contracts greater than \$500,000.00. Both the construction award amount and the release of funds from the reserve exceed \$500,000.00.

BACKGROUND

The University Middle School, built in 1931 with an addition completed in 1993, is a 138,873 square foot facility educating 657 students in grades 6 through 8. As a result of site visits conducted by NJSDA and New Jersey Department of Education (NJDOE) in 2011 and 2012 to review potential emergent conditions within the district, the NJDOE issued a Pre-Construction Approval on July 18, 2012 for an emergent project to address conditions related to water infiltration, specifically related to the masonry, roof, and window lintels at this facility.

After receipt of the Pre-Construction Approval from NJDOE, the NJSDA received information provided from the Irvington Public School District to assist in the development of a scope of work appropriate to address the condition. After analyzing the information, the NJSDA performed additional site visits to determine the condition of the roof, masonry, and window lintels as it relates to the source of the water infiltration. Those site visits resulted in the scope detailed below.

PROCUREMENT PROCESS

The construction contract award recommended for this project results from utilization of the NJSDA General Construction Services Task Order Contract (GC Task Order).

At the August 3, 2011 Board Meeting, the Members of the Authority approved the use of the GC Task Order. The GC Task Order has been structured so that the Authority has a pool of contractors to perform certain work. Overall, no individual task order can exceed \$3 million and no individual firm can receive more than \$5 million of work per region during the duration of the pool. Bidders were required to select a region (North, South, or both) for job order assignments and accept the defined cost multiplier of 1.10, as decided by the Authority, for use in establishing compensation for those task order assignments to be performed, at least for the initial phases, on a time and materials basis. GC Task Order work may also be assigned on a lump sum basis after competitive bidding among Task Order Contractors.

This package will be awarded on a time and materials basis pursuant to the NJSDA's existing General Construction Services Task Order Contract.

On January 31, 2013, Procurement staff contacted The Bennett Company, the next firm on the contractor rotational list, and confirmed its interest in the project.

SCOPE OF WORK

On February 25, 2013, a site visit was held with The Bennett Company, to review the emergent condition and discuss appropriate action(s) to address the condition. NJSDA staff instructed The Bennett Company to engage a design consultant necessary for developing a proposal, cost estimate and schedule that recognizes an approach to first defining and then implementing appropriate action to address the emergent condition, as follows:

- Review the existing facility conditions and plans to evaluate potential appropriate solutions for repairs;
- Engage a Site Environmental Consultant to perform testing and sampling of the areas that would be impacted in order to determine whether to perform abatement efforts;
- Propose three (3) alternative solutions and cost analyses to remedy the Emergent Condition; and
- Deliver to NJSDA a Final Report, providing recommended corrective action and a construction cost proposal inclusive of the following services and deliverables:
 - o Perform abatement activities if required;
 - o Repair or replace portions of the roof to address water infiltration;
 - o Repair and repoint brick masonry parapets;
 - o Repair or replace up to 1,120 linear feet of window lintels contributing to water infiltration in the 1931 portion of the school; and
 - Provide plans, inclusive of modifications to the existing structure. Prepare documents to secure construction permits and prepare record set drawings/plans at the completion of the project.

On April 30, 2013, The Bennett Company provided the NJSDA with a cost estimate to complete the entirety of the work, inclusive of the assessment, report submission and implementation of the various solutions proposed to remedy the emergent condition. The above-mentioned assessment and deliverables when completed will enable NJSDA staff to evaluate and select the most appropriate solution, and scope of work to address the emergent project timely and efficiently.

The N.T.E. value of the recommended award represents The Bennett Company's cost proposal for the most extensive solution presented to address the condition: roofing replacement and required abatement activities, masonry repairs, and replacement of 1,120 linear feet of window lintels. Upon completion of the selected design solution, the NJSDA shall review and validate the final projected cost and schedule for the scope of work. This review shall result in a determination to either advance the project on a time and material basis, or to establish a fixed cost for the scope of work defined in the construction documents.

Contract Management Division (CMD) and Program Operations reviewed The Bennett Company's cost proposal for this most extensive solution, in the amount of \$2,816,095.00, and determined it was reasonable for the elements included in the Scope of Work. The Program Operations Deputy Director, Program Operations Director, and CMD Director recommend that Procurement proceed with the issuance of a task order to The Bennett Company.

FINAL BUDGET

Based on The Bennett Company's proposal, the construction cost to address the emergent project is a N.T.E. value of \$2,816,095.00. The total funding, including design costs and construction contingency, is estimated at a N.T.E. value of \$3,641,797.00.

INTRODUCTION

I am writing to recommend approval by the Members of the Authority of the award of a contract for Construction Management (CM) Services. This contract is for services to manage the design-build construction of the new Elliott Street Elementary School located in the Newark School District.

Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended March 7, 2012, Board approval is required for the award of consultant contracts greater than \$100,000. Funding for this engagement is available within the Project Budget, in accordance with the most recent Project Charter approved by the Members on April 3, 2013.

BACKGROUND

The Elliott Street Elementary School project will provide an approximately 138,000 square-foot facility designed to educate 848 students in grades Pre-K through Eight.

The funding for a replacement for the Elliott Street E.S. was allocated in 2007 after a lightning strike rendered the original Elliot Street E.S. unusable. Other decisions made at the time included amending an engagement with Einhorn Yaffee Prescott Architecture & Engineering (EYP) such that a design and related services originally purchased for a replacement for the Ann Street School would instead be applied to the Elliot Street E.S. On January 13, 2009, the SDA initiated a solicitation for Design-Build services for a replacement facility, utilizing design documents prepared by EYP who were engaged as the bridging architect for the anticipated Design-Build engagement. The solicitation for Design-Build services for the project was held in abeyance pending a challenge to that methodology for SDA project delivery brought before the Appellate Division of the New Jersey Superior Court. The solicitation was ultimately cancelled to enable the SDA to conform to procedural requirements after the Appellate Division confirmed the SDA's authority to utilize a Design-Build project delivery method.

In the period since the 2009 Design-Build solicitation, two relevant initiatives occurred: 1) the joint DOE/SDA statewide prioritization to ensure advancement of highest priority projects; and 2) SDA establishment of design standards for efficient, consistent project advancement. To ensure that advancement of the Elliott Street E.S. replacement remained appropriate, the need for the project was evaluated according to the criteria applied during the 2010 statewide review. That evaluation confirmed the educational priority represented by the Elliott Street E.S. replacement project. NJSDA staff undertook a review and validation of the project's existing schematic design, finding opportunities to improve efficiency and better conform the design to current NJSDA materials and systems standards. Further assessment revealed the suitability of the NJSDA developed "Kit of Parts" for this project. The project's schematic design based on the NJSDA-developed "Kit of Parts" for the school facility is complete. The Elliott Street Elementary School project was approved to advance under the Authority's 2012 Capital Plan at the March 7, 2012 NJSDA Board Meeting.

The Project Charter includes \$15 million in local share funds, representing the approximate amount of insurance proceeds expected to be received by Newark Public Schools after the original Elliott Street E S was rendered unusable. The Project Charter is also inclusive of \$859,000 in Prior Design Services. This amount represents the cost of bridging design services from the original Architect, EYP. The amount included is the entirety of the contract value, which includes costs for work not performed, and for which the SDA anticipates a credit from EYP. It is anticipated that the amount of that credit amendment will require Board approval.

The Design-Build Construction engagement was approved by the Members of the Authority on April 3, 2013.

PROCUREMENT PROCESS

This package was advertised as a "Price and Other Factors" solicitation beginning on March 6, 2013 on the NJSDA website and on the State of New Jersey Business Opportunities website. In addition, the advertisement was distributed to those firms that are pre-qualified in the area of Construction Management (P029) by both the Department of Treasury-Division of Property Management and Construction and the NJSDA. For this procurement, price was weighted as 40% of the overall weight, and all non-price factors had a combined weight of 60%.

A Selection Committee consisting of three NJSDA staff members was established.

Firms interested in submitting a proposal were required to send an e-mail giving Notice of Intent to Participate (NOI) by March 14, 2013. NOIs were received from thirteen (13) prequalified construction management firms. Responsive proposals were received from ten (10) firms by March 28, 2013. Technical Proposals were evaluated by the Selection Committee. Evaluations were based upon the information provided by the firms in response to the RFQ/RFP for this project. The three committee members evaluated the Technical Proposals for Construction Management Services separately based on the following criteria:

- Firm's CM Experience on Similar Projects
- Staffing Proposal
- Key Team Members' Experience on Similar Projects
- Approach to Project

Each Selection Committee member evaluated each Technical Proposal, assigning a raw score for each criterion on a scale of 0 to 10 as follows:

• Outstanding (9-10): depth and quality of response offers significant advantages.

- Superior (7-8): exceeds RFQ/RFP requirements with no deficiencies.
- Sufficient (5-6): meets RFQ/RFP requirements with no significant deficiencies.
- Minimal (3-4): meets RFQ/RFP requirements but contains some significant deficiencies.
- Marginal (1-2): comprehends intent of RFQ/RFP but contains many significant deficiencies.
- Unsatisfactory (0): requirements not addressed and lack of detail precludes adequate evaluation.

Weighting factors were applied to each of the Selection Committee member's raw scores for each criterion to arrive at a total weighted score as follows:

Staffing Proposal	3.0	30

For each firm's Technical Proposal, the individual criteria scores awarded by a particular Selection Committee member were added together to calculate a score for that Technical Proposal. The maximum score for a Technical Proposal is 100. All of the scores awarded by the Selection Committee members to a particular firm's Technical Proposal were added together and averaged to arrive at a Final Technical Proposal Score for each firm. The responsive firms, their scores and ranks are listed in Table 1 below:

A shortlist of the six (6) highest-ranked firms was determined based on the Final Technical Proposal Scores. The shortlisted firms participated in interviews with the Selection Committee on April 17, 2013. The interviews allowed the firms to expand and detail their firm and team experience with respect to NJSDA requirements for construction management services. The Selection Committee interviewed each of the shortlisted firms and evaluated each firm on Interview Criteria and Weighting Factors that were the same as those used in the evaluation of the Technical Proposals, as detailed above.

The individual criteria scores awarded by a particular Selection Committee member were added together to calculate an Interview Score for that firm. The maximum Interview Score is 100. All of the Interview Scores awarded to a particular firm by the Selection Committee members were added together and averaged

to arrive at a Final Interview Score for each firm. The shortlisted firms, their scores and ranks are listed in Table 2 below:

The Final Interview Score for each shortlisted firm was added to the Final Technical Proposal Score for such firm, and the two scores were averaged to arrive at a Non-Price Score for each shortlisted firm. Once all the Non-Price Scores for all shortlisted firms were calculated, the NJSDA opened the sealed Price Proposals and reviewed them for responsiveness.

The lowest responsive Price Proposal was awarded the maximum number of points for the price component, which is 100. All other Price Proposals were awarded points based on the percentage that each proposal exceeded the lowest bid.

The results of the NJSDA's review of the Price Proposals are listed in Table 4 below:

INTRODUCTION

I am writing to recommend approval by the Members of the Authority of the award of a contract in the amount of \$1,072,444 to Silverlands Services, Inc. for the Demolition of the old H.B. Wilson Elementary School in the Camden City School District. The work consists of the abatement of all regulated materials and the demolition of all buildings, structures and improvements within the property limits, including all bituminous material. Once all demolition is completed, the site will be graded to match the existing grade and will be topped with topsoil and grass seed.

Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended on March 7, 2012, Board approval is required for the award of construction contracts greater than \$500,000. Funding for the contract will be made available within the Project Charter Budget, to be revised in accordance with the award recommendation being made and dependent upon Board action on that recommendation.

BACKGROUND

The H.B. Wilson Elementary School (H.B. Wilson ES) project consisted of the construction of a new 89,332-square-foot, two-story community-based facility educating 540 students in grades Pre-K through 6 in the Camden City School District, as well as the demolition of the old H.B. Wilson ES. The new school was occupied on September 8, 2009. The Certificate of Occupancy for this school was issued on April 9, 2012.

The old school was built in 1919. It is located in the City of Camden at 855 Woodland Avenue. The 1.35 acre site contains a 58,135 square foot three story school building, over a partial basement, and three outbuildings. The majority of the remaining property is covered by asphalt. Two of the out-buildings, located in the northeast corner of the property, contain historic pumps previously used by the City of Camden to distribute city water.

This demolition project will consist of the abatement of all regulated materials and the demolition of all buildings, structures and improvements within the property limits, including all bituminous material. After all demolition is completed, the site will be graded to match the existing grade, and will be topped with topsoil and grass seed.

PROCUREMENT PROCESS

This package was advertised on March 27, 2013 on the SDA website, NJ State website, and in selected newspapers for interested firms to participate in the bidding process.

A mandatory pre-bid conference was held on April 9, 2013.

Project Rating Proposals were received on April 15, 2013. Bidders were evaluated based on the largest of four projects completed in the past seven years, safety records as well as reference checks. Based on evaluation of the information submitted, ten (10) bidders received a Project Rating Limit.

Requests for Information (RFIs) were received on April 15, 2013. The addendum containing the responses to the RFIs was issued to the bidders on April 19, 2013.

Price Proposals were received on May 7, 2013. The Price Proposals were publicly opened and the lump sum base bids were read aloud as required by law.

Following the public bid opening, the NJSDA performed a review of the Price Proposals to determine the responsiveness of each bidder to the solicitation. The review determined that six (6) bidders were responsive. The results of the review are listed below:

In order to understand the differential between the CCE and the bid price and to ensure the contractor's Price Proposal was inclusive of all scope elements, a conference was conducted on May 8, 2013 with Procurement, Program Operations, Contract Management Division, the Design Consultant and Silverlands Services, Inc. to review the bid. After discussion, it was determined that some aspects of the bid were higher and others lower than the CCE, and that the major differentials between the CCE and the bid price were due to:

- The contractor's ownership of all the necessary heavy construction related equipment, the use of
 a local recycling plant to lower transportation costs for hauling debris materials and reduced

 lower building demolition costs.
- The subcontractor's ability to use mechanical methods in lieu of a manual removal process for the abatement of flooring tiles and mastic materials during the asbestos abatement portion of work.

At the time of review, Silverlands Services, Inc. confirmed that its Price Proposal is inclusive of all scope elements contained in the Contract Documents. The Program Operations Deputy Director, the Program Operations Director, the Contract Management Director and the Design Consultant recommend award of the project to Silverlands Services, Inc.

INTRODUCTION

We are writing to recommend approval by the Members of the Authority of the award of a contract in the amount of \$33,487,500 to Dobco, Inc.¹ for Design-Build services for the New Elementary School No. 3 in the Jersey City Public School District. The Design-Build Team will complete the design for the facility utilizing SDA-developed documents and will also provide construction and construction administration services, including securing of all required permits and approvals, for a new three story, Pre-K through grade Five school facility. The form of contract for this engagement is a Design-Build contract with the general contractor as the lead and with relevant trades and design disciplines serving in sub-contractor and sub-consultant roles.

We are also recommending approval by the Members of the attached Final Project Charter representing the project budget inclusive of dollar values for the award of the design-build package.

Pursuant to the SDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended March 7, 2012, Board approval is required for the award of construction contracts greater than \$500,000 and for the approval of the Final Project Charter.

BACKGROUND

The New Elementary School No. 3 project will provide a new 123,394 square-foot facility designed to educate 778 students in grades Pre-K through grade Five.

The New Elementary School No. 3 project was approved to advance under the Authority's 2011 Capital Plan at the March 2, 2011 NJSDA Board Meeting. The project's history included an engagement in 2003 for design services as well as completion of site acquisition activities in 2006. NJSDA staff undertook a review and validation of the project's design efforts from the 2003 engagement, inclusive of design

documents relative to site development and environmental considerations, to ensure conformance with the current required approach. Further assessment revealed the suitability of the NJSDA-developed "Kit of Parts" for this project, and the NJSDA thereafter issued a termination for convenience of the 2003 design engagement. The review also determined that project cost and schedule efficiencies would be supported by a two phase project advancement process: Phase I: Early Site Preparation; and Phase II: Design-Build services for the New Elementary School No. 3.

Phase I of the New Elementary School No. 3 project required the NJSDA to demolish all subsurface footings, foundations and slabs, as well as excavation removal and disposal of unsuitable soil. The Notice to Proceed (NTP) for Phase I (Early Site Package) work was issued on October 21, 2012. The work was self-managed by NJSDA and was substantially completed on March 31, 2013.

The Phase II Design-Build engagement was advertised on February 25, 2013.

A Construction Management firm (CM) will be engaged to manage the Design-Build phase of the New Elementary School No. 3 and these services are currently being procured.

PROCUREMENT PROCESS

This package for Phase II was advertised as a design-build solicitation on February 25, 2013 on the SDA website, NJ State website, and in selected newspapers for interested firms to participate in the bidding process. For this procurement, "Price" was weighted as more important than all "Other Factors," with price equaling 60% of the overall weight, and all non-price factors having a combined weight of 40%.

A mandatory pre-bid conference was held on March 12, 2013.

In accordance with regulations, the SDA employed a two-step process for this procurement. The first step required interested bidders to submit a Project Rating Proposal, which was used by the SDA to determine each bidder's Project Rating Limit, or maximum amount that a bidder may bid, for the project. Project Rating Proposals were received on March 22, 2013. Bidders were evaluated based on the largest of four projects completed in the past seven years, safety records as well as reference checks. Based on evaluation of the information submitted, ten (10) bidders received a Project Rating Limit.

The Project Rating Limits resulting from the Project Rating Evaluations are listed in Table 1 below:

Bidder Questions were received until April 3, 2013. Addenda responses to Bidder Questions were issued to the bidders on April 17 and April 24, 2013.

The second step of the response required bidders to simultaneously submit a Technical Proposal and a sealed Price Proposal. Technical and Price Proposals were received on May 7, 2013 from seven (7) bidders. The Technical Proposal provided information regarding the bidder's past experience and qualifications as well as the bidder's overall approach to the project and to the Design portion of the project. Interviews were held with each of the seven (7) Design-Build teams at SDA offices in Trenton on May 15 and May 16, 2013, affording members of the Selection Committee an opportunity to obtain any additional information from each team as needed to complete their evaluations of the Technical Proposals.

Members of the Selection Committee, comprised of two (2) SDA Program Operations representatives and one (1) Jersey City School District representative, were responsible for independently evaluating and scoring the Technical Proposal submittals with respect to the non-price evaluation criteria. The proposals were evaluated by the Selection Committee members based on the following criteria:

- Design-Builder's experience on similar projects
- Experience of Design-Builder's Design Consultant on similar projects
- Design-Builder's prior affirmative action experience
- Approach to Project
- Approach to Schedule
- Approach to LEED requirements

Each Selection Committee member evaluated each Technical Proposal, assigning a raw score for each criterion on a scale of 0 to 10 as follows:

- 9 10 points outstanding response offers significant advantages.
- 7 8 points superior response exceeds requirements with no deficiencies.
- 5 6 points sufficient response meets the requirements with no significant deficiencies.
- 3 4 points minimal response meets the requirements but contains some significant deficiencies.
- 1 2 points marginal response comprehends requirements, but contains many significant deficiencies.
- 0 points unsatisfactory response requirements not addressed and lack of detail precludes adequate evaluation.

Weighting factors were then applied to each of the Selection Committee member's raw scores for each criterion to arrive at a total weighted score as follows in Table 2 below:

For each Technical Proposal, the individual criteria scores awarded by a particular Selection Committee member were added together to calculate a Total Non-Price score for that Technical Proposal. The maximum total non-price score is 100. All of the Total Non-Price scores awarded to a Technical Proposal by the Selection Committee members were added together and averaged to arrive at a final non-price score for each Technical Proposal.

The results of the Selection Committee's review of the Technical Proposals are listed in Table 3 below:

Once all the Technical Proposals were scored, the Authority opened the sealed Price Proposals and reviewed them for responsiveness. The Price Proposals were publicly opened on May 17, 2013 and the bids were read aloud as required by law.

The lowest responsive Price Proposal was awarded the maximum number of points for the price component, which is 100. All other Price Proposals were awarded points based on the percentage that each proposal exceeded the lowest bid.

The results of the SDA's review of the Price Proposals are listed in Table 4 below:

The highest ranked bidder was Dobco, Inc.

The bid submitted by Dobco, Inc. was below the CCE. In order to understand the differential between the CCE and the bid price and to ensure the contractor's Price Proposal was inclusive of all scope elements, a conference was conducted on May 20, 2013 with Procurement, Program Operations, Contract Management Division and Dobco, Inc. to review the bid. The discussion identified variances between the CCE and price proposal in several areas, with the majority of the overall variance representing costs related to masonry, plumbing, HVAC, foundation and site work. At the time of review, Dobco, Inc. confirmed that its price proposal is inclusive of all scope elements contained in the Contract Documents.

The Program Operations Deputy Director, the Program Operations Director, the Contract Management Deputy Director and the Contract Management Director recommend award of the project to Dobco, Inc.

FINAL PROJECT CHARTER

The attached Final Project Charter represents the project budget inclusive of actual dollar values for the award of the Design-Build contract, pre-development expenses, prior engaged design services, as well as SDA staff design and project management costs and estimated costs for the CM services currently being procured as well as future project scope elements such as FF&E, technology, and appropriate contingencies.

Two emergent construction projects were verified to be compliant with SBE requirements by the Contractor Compliance Coordinator.

Vendor Services staff continues to participate at mandatory pre-bid and pre-construction meetings to instruct and inform bidders regarding SDA's SBE goals, policies and procedures, including:

- Small Business Enterprise subcontracting goal of 25% of all contracts
- County workforce goals for minorities and females
- Detailed process procedures to monitor and track the progress made toward these goals throughout the life cycle of each project

At these meetings, general contractors are strongly encouraged to identify and hire minority-owned and womenowned firms, as well as locally-based enterprises, for diverse business participation on all school building projects. Additional outreach strategies are discussed and utilized.

Christie Administration Awards \$80 Million Construction Contract for New Phillipsburg High School Project



CEO Marc Larkins joined Phillipsburg School District Superintendent George Chando to announce the award of an \$80 million construction contract for the new Phillipsburg High School. The award represents one of the largest single construction awards in the state and signifies the advancement of this project, a significant step that no other administration has been able to achieve.

The announcement was made atop the 122-acre hilltop site in Lopatcong where the future school will be built. The new facility will be a 330,021 square-foot building designed to accommodate 1,846 students in grades nine through twelve.

Christie Administration Announces Completion of Emergent Project in Newark



CEO Marc Larkins joined Assemblyman Albert Coutinho and Newark Public Schools officials in celebrating the completion of the first emergent repair project both designed and managed by SDA staff at the Wilson Avenue Elementary School.

The need for this project arose following significant damage sustained during

Hurricane Irene in 2011. The completed work included the replacement of 133 original wood frame windows with new aluminum windows, repointing of all masonry joints, replacement of damaged bricks and stones, painting of masonry, replacement of missing roof shingles and repair of roof underlayment. Construction began in August 2012 and was performed in the evening hours so as not to interfere with the school's daily routine.

The Office of the Chief Financial Officer is providing the attached monthly financial report to the Members of the Authority for their information. Included on pages 1 and 2 of this report is a "Financial Summary" of the Authority's activities for the year. On pages 3 and 4 of the report is a summary of the Authority's operating expenditures and headcount information. Page 3A contains an itemized breakdown of personnel costs that have been allocated to school facilities project costs from program general and administrative ("Operating") expense. The basic financial statement and cash flow report follow.

Authority Operating Expenses "before" Allocation of Employee Costs to Project Costs (Actual vs. Budget)

For April 2013 year to date, Authority operating expenses, **\$12.4 million**, are **down \$1.5 million** as compared to the budget for the corresponding period. The deviation of actual expenses versus budget is mainly due to:

- Personnel expense (i.e., full-time and temporary employee salaries and benefits, business travel, automobile, parking and training and professional development expenses) has a positive variance (\$1.1M) because the Authority is currently 13 FTEs under budget;
- MIS spending for system hardware and maintenance as well as the Long Range Facility Plan Database has yet to occur as anticipated (\$257K).

Authority Operating Expenses "before" Allocation of Employee Costs to Project Costs (Actual vs. Prior Year)

For April 2013 year to date, Authority operating expenses, **\$12.4 million**, are **down \$739K** as compared to the corresponding prior year. The decrease in the year-over-year expense is due to:

• Personnel cost - 4 fewer FTEs as well as a year-over-year reduction to our pension contribution, \$510K.

School Facilities Project Expenditures "after" Allocation of Employee Costs to Project Costs

For April 2013 year to date, project expenditures, \$53.6 million, are <u>up \$3.6M</u> as compared to corresponding prior year; and <u>down \$29.5M</u> in comparison to the 2013 capital spending forecast. The year-over-year variance is attributable to increases in construction cost (\$13.4M), and personnel expenses allocated to school facilities project costs (this is the first year) from Operating expense (\$5M), offset by a decrease in grant activity \$3.6M and other project related cost, \$11.2M.

Other

Since program inception, 66.5% of the funds authorized for the SDA Districts have been disbursed. Additionally, since program inception 96% of all SDA disbursements relate to school facilities projects and 4% relate to Operating expense.

The estimated value of active school facilities projects is approximately \$2.2B.
