# NEW JERSEY SCHOOLS DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

### WEDNESDAY, JUNE 5, 2013

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority ("SDA" or "the Authority) was held on Wednesday, June 5, 2013 at 9:00 AM at the offices of the Authority at One West State Street, Trenton, New Jersey.

Participating were:

being a quorum of the Board. Mr. Egan, Ms. Lemelle, Mr. Lewis-Powder and Mr. Piaia participated in the meeting via teleconference.

At the Chairman's request, Marc Larkins, chief executive officer; Jason Ballard, chief of staff; Jane Kelly, vice president and assistant secretary; Andrew Yosha, vice president; Donald Guarriello, vice president and chief financial officer; Albert Barnes, acting chief counsel; Manuel Da Silva, program director; Corrado Minervini, program director; James Adams, program director; Aidita Milsted, program director; Sean Murphy, director; and Sherman Cole, controller

of the SDA participated in the meeting. Amy Herbold of the Governor's Authorities Unit also participated in the meeting.

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman of the Board, Mr. Walsh. Mr. Walsh requested that Ms. Kelly read the requisite notice of the meeting. Ms. Kelly announced that the meeting notice had been sent to the *Trenton Times* and *Star-Ledger* at least 48 hours prior to the meeting, and had been duly posted on the Secretary of State's bulletin board at the State House in Trenton, New Jersey.

#### Approval of Meeting Minutes

Mr. Walsh then presented for consideration and approval the minutes of the Open and Executive Session meetings of the Board held May 1, 2013 and of the Special Board Open Session Meeting Minutes of May 10, 2013. A copy of the minutes and resolutions presented had been provided to the Members for review in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas, seconded by Ms. D'Autrechy, and with Mr. Nixon abstaining from the vote only insofar as it pertained to the May 10, 2013 Special Board Meeting due to his absence therefrom, the Open and Executive Session meeting minutes of May 1, 2013 and the Open Session Meeting Minutes of May 10, 2013 were approved, by the Board upon its vote in favor of the resolutions attached hereto as *Exhibit 3a, 3b. & 3c.* 

#### Authority Matters

# **CEO** Report

The Chairman then asked Mr. Larkins to provide his CEO report to the Board. Mr. Larkins said that, during the past month, Authority staff participated in a couple of public events. He said that SDA appeared before the Senate Budget Committee along with the State

Department of Education and responded to questions about the work of the Authority. He said that SDA anticipates releasing its latest biannual report in mid-June which will provide another opportunity to publicly outline the Authority's work.

In terms of other events, Mr. Larkins reported that SDA participated in an event held at the Wilson Avenue School in Newark to recognize success with that project. He reminded the Members that this school facility experienced water infiltration problems following Hurricane Irene. He said that this project, designed and managed in-house, was expeditiously completed and serves as an example of a new approach by the Authority that worked extremely well.

In continuing, Mr. Larkins reported that a final Certificate of Occupancy has been obtained for the new Colin Powell Elementary School in the Union City School District. He said that the school had opened in September with a temporary Certificate of Occupancy, noting that the Authority now is poised to proceed to final completion and close out of the project. He then discussed successful completion of the PS No. 6 project in the Paterson School District which involved the replacement of over 400 windows. He said that this project as well is a testament to the hard work of SDA staff as it was designed, managed and brought to expeditious completion. Mr. Larkins said that SDA also participated in a beam signing at the Long Branch Catrambone school facility. He said that construction on this project is proceeding well. He also discussed the progress of the New Brunswick Redshaw project, noting that steel is now being erected at the project site.

Mr. Larkins then discussed upcoming SDA awards. He said that an advertisement for design for exterior building work (Phase I) has been issued for the Trenton Central High School project. He added that SDA received 15 proposals in the process. He said that evaluations will be

conducted over the next month and staff then will return to the Board with a recommendation for its consideration.

Mr. Larkins said that the design firm working on the Jersey City PS No. 20 project was impacted by Hurricane Sandy resulting in a slight delay in the schedule. However, he noted that proposals are anticipated on July 2 with an expectation that staff will bring a recommendation to the Board in August. He said that a new design build procurement for two projects in Bridgeton was advertised on May 31. He said that this is an addition/renovation project which will substitute for a project initially identified in the 2011 Capital Plan. He said that SDA also anticipates an award for another project in southern New Jersey in the near future along with advertisements for the design-build package for the Keansburg Caruso school project and Paterson PS No. 16. Mr. Larkins then advised that, consistent with a notice that was forwarded to the Members the previous day, Board Agenda Item No. 5b. will not be advancing at today's meeting. In conclusion, Mr. Larkins noted that the Authority is making significant progress and that many projects are moving into construction. He noted the issuance of a Notice to Proceed (NTP) for the Elizabeth Academic High School project. He said that an NTP is also anticipated soon for the Passaic Henry Street project. In response to an inquiry, Mr. Larkins noted that an NTP will be issuing and the constructability phase will be proceeding shortly for the Phillipsburg High School Project. Mr. Walsh then asked that an update be provided at a later point in time regarding the Trenton Central High School project and that a walk-through be arranged for those who would like to participate. He also asked that, at the next School Review Committee meeting (SRC), staff provide an update on the Authority's General Contractor Task Order contracts (GC Task Order).

#### Audit Committee Report

The Chairman then requested that Mr. Nixon provide the report of the Audit Committee. Mr. Nixon advised the Members that the Audit Committee met on May 20, 2013. He said that management had provided the Committee with the April 2013 New Funding Allocation and Capital Plan Update. He said that management reported a decrease of \$11.1 million in the Unforeseen Events Reserve balance and no change in the Planning Reserve balance. He reported a \$100,000 increase in the 2008 Capital Plan Emergent Projects Reserve balance and a \$6.1 million decrease in the 2011 Capital Plan Emergent Projects Reserve balance.

Mr. Nixon then advised the Members that the Committee is recommending that the Board approve a one year contract extension for Ernst & Young for independent auditor services. He noted that this second and final one year extension, at a cost of \$95,700, would cover the Authority's 2013 financial statement audit. He advised that a new procurement for independent auditor services will be conducted by the Audit Committee in 2014. Mr. Nixon then asked that the Members approve the Ernst & Young contract extension as proposed by the Committee. Mr. Walsh asked if there were any questions. There were none.

A resolution pertaining to the Ernst & Young contract extension for the 2013 Financial Statement Audit had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Mr. McNamara and seconded by Mr. Vargas, the Ernst & Young contract extension was approved by the Board upon its vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 5a*.

Mr. Nixon then reported that management had discussed with the Committee one (1) completed audit recommendation. He said that the SDA Invoice Approval of Contracts, PMF

Architectural and Professional Services approval process has been changed with the result that CMD no longer approves payment of an invoice, but instead makes a recommendation to program operations for approval of the invoice. He advised that the Committee also was provided an update by management on Contract Close-out; Policies and Procedures and Lessons Learned/Best Practices.

In continuing, Mr. Nixon said that management had provided the Committee with the results of a statutorily required audit on a Section 15 Grant focusing on processes and procedures. He said that the audit looked at documentation supporting execution of the grant and the disbursement of funds from September 2003 through August 2012. He advised that the audit determined that the state funds were expended in accordance with the grant agreement, applicable laws and regulations.

Mr. Nixon then reported that the Committee was provided with the April 2013 Monthly Financial Report with management advising that, as of April 2013, the Authority's operating expenditures totaled \$12.4 million which is \$1.5 million lower than budget for the period. He said that this is a \$739,000 decrease from the corresponding period in the prior year. Mr. Nixon added that, as of April 2013 year to date, project expenditures, at \$53.6 million, are up \$3.6 million as compared to the corresponding prior year; and down \$29.5 million compared to the 2013 Capital spending forecast. He said that the year-over-year variance is attributable to an increase in construction costs (\$13.4 million) and personnel expenses (\$5 million) which are now allocated to project costs and not operating expenses as in previous years. He said that this is offset by a decrease in grant activity (\$3.6 million) and other project related costs (\$11.2 million). Mr. Nixon reported that, since inception, 66.5% of the funds authorized for the SDA Districts have been disbursed. He advised that 96% of all SDA disbursements relate to school facilities projects and 4% relate to program administrative and general expenses. In conclusion, Mr. Nixon said that the estimated value of current school facilities project activity is approximately \$2.2 billion. Mr. Vargas inquired about the \$739,000 decrease in operating expenditures. Mr. Cole explained that the decrease was mainly attributable to fewer full time employees (FTEs). Mr. Larkins noted that the Authority has had some resignations that were not anticipated which have offset new hirers. Mr. Yosha then discussed recent job offers and acceptances that have occurred for Program Operations staff positions.

### School Review Committee Report

1) Release of Funds from Program Reserve-Burlington City School District – Captain James Lawrence Elementary School – Emergent Project – Roof Replacement; 2) Release of Funds from Program Reserve, Award of Contract and Approval of Final Charter – Irvington Public Schools – University Middle School – Emergent Project – Roof Repairs or Replacement, Masonry Repairs and Lintel Replacement or Repairs; 3) Release of Funds from Program Reserve, Award of Contract and Approval of Final Charter – Salem City School District – Salem Middle School – Emergent Project – Roof Repairs or Replacement, Masonry Repairs, and Lintel Repairs or Replacement; 4) Construction Manager Award – Newark School District – Elliott Street Elementary School – Construction Management Services; 5) Construction Award – Camden School District – H. B. Wilson Elementary School – Demolition; 6) Design-Build Award and Approval of Final Project Charter – Jersey City School District – New Elementary School No. 3

Mr. McNamara advised the Members that the School Review Committee (Committee) met on May 20, 2013 and discussed various issues. He reported that the Committee recommends that the Board approve the release of funds from the program reserve in the amount of \$782,000 for an emergent project roof replacement for the Captain James Lawrence Elementary School (Lawrence ES) in the Burlington School District. He noted that an architect has been retained and a scope of work is forthcoming.

A resolution for approval of a release of funds from the program reserve for Lawrence ES had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a

Mr. McNamara then reported that the Committee recommends that the Board approve the release of funds from the program reserve in the amount of \$3,641,797.00, a contract award to The Bennett Company (Bennett) in the amount of \$2,816,095.00 and approval of the final charter for the University Middle School project (UMS) in the Irvington School District for an emergent project for roof repairs or replacement, masonry repairs and lintel repairs or replacement. He noted that the award is a time-and-materials task order.

Mr. Walsh inquired as to the potential for costs exceeding the task order contract limit of \$3 million. Mr. DaSilva explained that the contract cost is under \$3 million, noting that the costs presented were a worst case scenario. He said that he is hopeful that the project will be completed under budget. After discussion, Mr. Yosha said that there will be updates provided to the SRC on all the general construction task order engagements. Mr. Vargas asked how and when funds are released from the program reserve. Mr. Larkins explained the procedure noting that project personnel expenses are now allocated to project costs and not operating expenses in an effort to better reflect the actual cost of delivering a project.

A resolution pertaining to the approval of the release of funds from the program reserve, contract award to Bennett and approval of the final charter for UMS had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Mr. Walsh, and seconded by Ms. Hassett, the recommendation was approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6ali*.

Mr. McNamara then reported that the Committee had considered a release of funds from the program reserve, contract award and approval of final charter for Salem Middle School

(Salem MS) in the Salem City School District for an emergent project for a roof repair or replacement, masonry repairs and lintel repairs or replacement. He said that the Members are requested to approve the award of a construction contract in the amount of \$1,230,364.00 to Wu & Associates, Inc. (WA), the release of \$1,618,348.00 from the program reserve to address the emergent project, and approval of the final charter.

A resolution for approval of the release of funds from the program reserve, contract award to WA and final charter for Salem had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Mr. Nixon and seconded by Mr. Walsh, the award, final charter and release of funds were approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6aiii*.

Mr. McNamara then presented the Committee's recommendation regarding a construction manager award for the Elliott Street Elementary School project (Elliott Street) in the Newark School District. He reported that the Members are requested to approve the award of contract to the Gilbane Building Company (Gilbane) for a total lump sum fee of \$1,031,178 for construction management services. He noted that the procurement price was weighted at 40% and non-price factors were weighted at 60%. Mr. Murphy then provided the Members with an overview of the project. Mr. Walsh noted that the processes and procedures in place are working well and requested that staff provide an update/analysis on design-build projects at a future SRC meeting.

A resolution pertaining to the contract award to Gilbane for construction manager services for the Elliott Street project had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Mr. McNamara, and seconded by Ms. Hassett,

the award was approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6aiv*.

Mr. McNamara then presented a memorandum regarding the demolition of the H.B. Wilson Elementary School (H.B. Wilson ES) in the Camden School District. He reported that the Members are requested to approve the contract award to Silverlands Service, Inc. (Sliverlands) in the amount of \$1,072,444. He noted that the bid was approximately 30% below the CCE. Mr. Murphy then provided the Members with an overview of the project. He explained that a conference was conducted in order to understand the differential between the CCE and the bid price. He explained that the differential is due to the contractor's ownership of heavy equipment, use of local recycling and disposal fees along with the subcontractor's ability to use mechanical methods in lieu of a manual removal process for abatement. After discussion, Ms. Milsted advised that an in-house environmental review took place noting that the SDA has received written confirmation regarding the agreed upon abatement process and procedures. Mr. Larkins said that there are always unforeseen events in connection with demolition projects, advising that there is a contingency in place for those events should they occur.

A resolution pertaining to the contract award for H.B. Wilson ES had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Ms. Hassett, and seconded by Ms. D'Autrechy, the award was approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6v*.

Mr. McNamara then discussed the Committee's recommendation of a design-build award for the New Elementary School No. 3 (ES No. 3) in the Jersey City School District. He reported that the Members are requested to approve the contract award to Dobco, Inc. (Dobco) in the amount of \$33,487,500 and the final charter for construction of ES No. 3. Mr. Murphy provided A resolution pertaining to the design-build award to Dobco for ES No. 3 had been provided to the Members in advance of the meeting. Following discussion, upon a motion by Mr. Vargas, and seconded by Mr. McNamara, the design-build award was approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Exhibit 6bvi*.

#### Reports

Mr. Walsh referenced the monthly reports and asked Mr. Ballard to update the Members regarding Project Closeouts. Mr. Ballard provided an update regarding the Project Closeout Status Report. He reported that four (4) Capital projects have been closed, and three (3) additional emergent projects were closed. Mr. Ballard further reported that the Authority had received a check for \$188,000.00 in regards to an environmental settlement. He said that an additional settlement is pending in another litigation matter.

The Chairman, Mr. Walsh, then announced that the Public Comments portion of the meeting would begin. Mr. Walsh asked if there were any members of the public who wished to address the Board. Hearing none, Mr. Walsh then asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting. Upon motion and with unanimous consent, the meeting was adjourned.

# **INTRODUCTION**

At the March 7, 2012 NJSDA Board Meeting, the Members approved the Authority's 2012 Capital Plan. That Plan identified an Elizabeth elementary school grade level project addressing high priority educational needs that required further discussion with the District. Working with representatives of the Elizabeth School District and the New Jersey Department of Education (DOE), SDA staff has reviewed and validated District needs. We are writing to advise the Members of the results of that validation performed by SDA staff, and to provide detail of recommended action for advancement of the above-identified project.

We are also writing to recommend approval by the Members of the attached Preliminary Project Charter, created by Program Operations staff, which details project advancement recommendations including estimated project costs and schedules for project completion. Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended March 7, 2012, Preliminary Project Charters require approval by the Members of the Authority.

# BACKGROUND

Based upon the DOE's 2010 Educational Facility Needs Assessment (EFNA), which identified severe overcrowding in all grade levels of the Elizabeth Public School District, the NJSDA 2012 Capital Plan identified an Elizabeth elementary school grade level project for validation and advancement.

Following approval of the SDA 2012 Capital Plan, SDA staff commenced review and validation activities which included a review of the District's Long Range Facilities Plan (LRFP) and the identification of existing and proposed school facilities included in that plan. A Working Group comprised of District, DOE and SDA staff was convened to review and validate current District needs and to identify and evaluate alternative project scopes which might address those needs. The validation process began with a review of current and projected District enrollments and current District educational capacity. Given the extent and severity of the overcrowding at the elementary school grade level throughout the District as evidenced by DOE's 2010 EFNA, which indicated that the District lacked capacity for over 2,000 students in grades PK-8, the Working Group concluded that further evaluation of District capacity was unnecessary at this time.

Based upon this validation of needs, the Working Group proceeded to identify potential projects which might address these needs. This activity included a review of projects identified in the District's LRFP as well as consideration of the application of the SDA Kit of Parts. The Working Group concluded that all capacity-generating projects identified in the District's LRFP require land acquisition for advancement.

It was noted that a project for replacement of the William Halloran PS #22 with a new facility on the existing school's site was initiated in 2002 and advanced into the Construction Documents Phase, but was suspended in 2005. Review of this design, which was intended to accommodate a grade 2 to 8 magnet arts program, revealed that significant redesign would be necessary in order to align it with current SDA standards. In terms of site utilization, review of the project confirmed that a new school facility could be constructed on the site without demolishing the William Halloran PS #22 facility. For these reasons and as more fully discussed below, we recommend advancement of the project through the application of Kit of Parts project delivery which provides for a more efficient and timely project advancement than would occur through redesign of the 2005 design documents.

The Working Group agreed that immediate consideration be given to the utilization of District-owned property for construction of a new elementary school adjacent to the existing building. On-going Working Group discussions will continue in an effort to identify additional potential future projects to address District capacity needs.

Based on this recommendation, NJSDA staff proceeded with needed additional Pre-Development review and activities which included site environmental due diligence, geotechnical and utility investigations, consideration of the application of NJSDA standards, and preliminary project scope and budget development.

In March 2013, Brinkerhoff Environmental Services Inc. was engaged under the Site Environmental Consultant task order agreement to undertake preliminary site investigations within the portion of the site where new construction would take place.

Brinkerhoff's preliminary investigations have identified a number of site development challenges, including several potential areas of environmental concern, the presence of historic fill on the site and the potential presence of remnant building foundations. Brinkerhoff's study also identified an existing sanitary sewer easement which bisects the site. While these constraints will need to be addressed in further development of the site, they are not unusual to existing school sites and will not inhibit advancement of the project.

NJSDA staff has developed a preliminary project scope based on the application of standard programmatic models and has considered the application of Kit of Parts in project delivery. Based on that analysis, the following project is being recommended for advancement to address District overcrowding.

### Recommended Project Scope:

The recommended project scope calls for the construction of an approximately 133,000 SF new school facility to educate 860 students on the District-owned land adjacent to the existing Halloran PS #22 School in Elizabeth. The recommended project will utilize a standard SDA Kit of Parts programmatic model and design, which will be modified to accommodate the District's magnet arts program, and will be delivered through in-house design and a Design-Build construction contract. The project scope represented in the Preliminary Charter is based upon providing as much capacity as possible on the site, although site constraints may limit the size of the building and the number of students that can be accommodated. This will be resolved during the program concept phase of in-house design and the project scope may be modified to address the limitations of the site.

# PROJECT BUDGET

The estimated cost of \$54.8 million for the project is reflected in the attached Preliminary Project Charter. Total costs within the estimated project cost are not inclusive of expenditures incurred from a prior Halloran PS #22 ES project which called for the replacement of the Halloran PS #22 ES. Due to the level of overcrowding within the District it has been determined that both schools shall remain in operation on a shared site after completion of the New ES project.

#### PROJECT SCHEDULE

Based on the proposed Design-Build project delivery, occupancy of the project is projected for Fall 2017.

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

The Members are requested to approve the Preliminary Project Charter for the Elizabeth School District's New Elementary School. In so doing, the Board is providing the Authority with approval to:

- 1. Proceed with in-house design activities.
- 2. Procure necessary professional and construction services in relationship to this project.

#### Budget Variance Analysis:

2012 Capital Plan estimate is based upon the estimated project costs for the Halloran PS #22 ES project included in the statewide strategic plan. That project called for the building of a replacement school for 725 students and demolition of the existing school. **WHEREAS**, the Operating Authority of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority requires that the Members of the Authority approve Preliminary Project Charters; and

**WHEREAS**, the Working Group noted that a project for replacement of the William Halloran PS #22 with a new facility on the existing school's site had been initiated in 2002 and advanced into the construction documents phase, but was suspended in 2005; and

**WHEREAS**, review of the Halloran project design revealed that significant redesign would be necessary in order to align it with current SDA standards; and

**WHEREAS**, review of the project confirmed that a new school facility could be constructed on the site without demolishing the existing William Halloran PS #22 facility; and

**WHEREAS,** for reasons set forth in the memorandum presented to the Board on this date, advancement of a project (Project) through the application of Kit of Parts project delivery approach is recommended; and

**WHEREAS,** Pre-development activities for the Project, along with the recommended Project scope, budget and schedule are described in detail in the memorandum presented to the Board on this date and incorporated herein; and

**WHEREAS,** upon completion, the recommended Project shall be an approximately 133,000 SF new school facility to educate 860 students in grades Pre-K - 8 on the District-owned land adjacent to the existing Halloran PS #22 School in Elizabeth; and

**WHEREAS**, executive management and associated program staff recommend approval of the proposed Preliminary Project Charter for the new elementary school Project in the Elizabeth School District and advancement of the recommended design, procurement and related activities as reasonable, appropriate and in the best interest of the SDA and the state's taxpayers.

SUBJECT: Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Schools Development Authority (SDA) and the Higher Education Student Assistance Authority (HESAA) to effectuate the Governor's Industry Vocations Scholarship Program ("NJ-GIVS") pursuant to N.J.S.A. 52:38-7.

On June 25, 2013 at Burlington County Community College, Governor Christie announced authorization for a new Scholarship program entitled the Governor's Industry Vocations Scholarship Program ("NJ-GIVS").

# I. Background

At the inception of the school construction program in September 2001, the NJSCC (now NJSDA) entered into a Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") with the State Department of Labor and Workforce Development ("LWD") for the administration and implementation of a community outreach and training program in the construction trades for minorities and women. Training was provided for upgrading academic skills and an introduction to the construction industry was offered in order to facilitate competition for union apprenticeships. As per the agreement, the NJSCC/SDA was regularly invoiced by LWD and payments were made accordingly. Participation in the program administered by the LWD was limited to minorities and women residing in the former Abbott (now SDA) districts. The 2001 MOU between NJSDA and LWD was <u>not</u> required by law but was, rather, a voluntary effort by the agencies. However, in 2010, N.J.S.A. 52:38-7 statutorily mandated that:

"upon entering into any public works contract in excess of \$1,000,000 which is funded, in whole or in part, by funds of a public body, or any public works contract of any size which is funded, in whole or in part, by funds provided to the public body pursuant to the "American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009," Pub.L.111-5, the public body entering into the contract shall transfer an amount equal to one half of one percent (.5%) of the portion of the contract amount funded by funds of the public body, or provided to the public body.... To the Department of Labor and Workforce Development, except that any Statewide authority which enters into the contract and administers a program which meets the requirements of this section may retain all or a portion of the .5% share of the funds under the contract as is necessary for the operation of the program, but shall transfer to the department any portion of the funds not necessary for the program..."

#### N.J.S.A. 52:38-7 (2010) further provided that

"The department or authority shall use the transferred or retained funds to provide on-the-job or off-the-job outreach and training programs for minority group members and women in construction trade occupations or other occupations, including engineering and management occupations, utilized in the performance of public works contracts."

Following enactment of this law, the Authority explored ways to establish an exclusive program which would allow the Authority to exercise control over how the required funds were allocated in order to maximize its benefit. This memorandum describes how the SDA proposes to engage with

HESAA to develop and implement the Governor's initiative, NJ-GIVS, so that it will comport with the requirements of the 2010 statute. Following Governor Christie's announcement on June 25, 2013 authorizing the program, the funding and administration of NJ-GIVS is recommended and presented for Board consideration.

# II. Concept

NJ-GIVS will fill a void in state financial aid programs by making scholarships available to students pursuing non-degree certificate programs in construction/engineering related industries. Currently, state student financial aid programs only provide grants and scholarships to students in matriculated Associate or Baccalaureate degree programs. NJ-GIVS would fulfill the SDA's statutory mandate that construction related job training skills be provided to women and minorities.

# III. Joint Venture Principals

SDA and HESAA would be the two state agencies partnering to finance and administer the NJ-GIVS. Each agency's role, consistent with its core area of expertise, is outlined below.

**SDA** - SDA is an independent state authority and successor agency to the Schools Construction Corporation. In 1998, the New Jersey Supreme Court ruled in the Abbott v. Burke case that the State must provide 100 percent funding for all school renovation and construction projects in special-needs school districts. According to the Court, aging, unsafe and overcrowded buildings prevented children from receiving the "thorough and efficient" education required under the New Jersey Constitution. Hence, the SDA is charged with building schools in the state's 31 specialneeds districts. Under state law, SDA is required to set aside one half of one percent of contracts in excess of \$1 million for "on-the-job or off-the-job outreach and training programs for minority group members and women in the construction trade occupations or other occupations, including engineering and management occupations." SDA staff is recommending that the SDA partner with a sister state agency to create a scholarship program to utilize the set aside funds and encourage the entry of women and minorities into construction related professions. The SDA Communications Department will work closely with HESAA to monitor and evaluate the success of the program and develop strategies to market and attract students for participation. The SDA will also track and monitor the progress of the scholarship recipients in an effort to gauge the success of the program. SDA will further provide assistance to the recipients in any way possible as they seek to further their careers in the construction industry.

**HESAA** - Like SDA, HESAA is an independent state authority. HESAA is charged with administering the state's higher education need-based grants and merit scholarships. For example, HESAA administers the Tuition Aid Grant (TAG) program, the nation's most generous need-based undergraduate aid program. This current state fiscal year, HESAA will distribute approximately \$331 million to over 70,000 students attending New Jersey colleges or universities. HESAA also administers the part-time TAG for County College Students Program, a \$10.36 million program; the NJ STARS program, a \$7.8 million program; and the NJ STARS II program, a \$6 million program. Additionally, HESAA has bonding authority and annually sells bonds to finance the New Jersey College Loans to Assist State Students (NJCLASS) program. This current academic year, HESAA is lending approximately \$250 million through its NJCLASS program. Along with the state programs, HESAA has contracts with the U.S. Department of Education to administer a number of

federal student aid programs including, but not limited to, the Federal Family Education Loan Program and the John R. Justice Loan Redemption Program. In addition to administering financial aid programs, HESAA also has regulatory oversight over the college and university financial aid offices and conducts audits of those offices' functions to make certain the expenditure of funds comports with all statutory and regulatory requirements.

Given HESAA's core competency in administering grant, scholarship and loan programs and its expertise in both state and federal financial aid laws and regulations, HESAA is uniquely and appropriately positioned to partner with SDA on this project.

### IV. Governor's Targeted Skilled Professions Scholarship

This scholarship would provide funds for students interested in pursuing a trade related to the construction industry. From HESAA's perspective, there are a number of state based financial aid programs to assist students pursuing associate or baccalaureate degrees; however, not all students are college-bound. Many non-college-bound individuals are seeking educational resources to attain a skilled profession or trade and this scholarship would assist those individuals. In addition, HESAA reports that some individuals who have already earned a baccalaureate degree are turning to trade and vocational schools to obtain a skilled professional certification because they cannot find gainful employment with their bachelor's degree. Many of these individuals would qualify financially for the federal Pell grant; but because they already have a bachelor's degree, they are not eligible for Pell funding. They are not eligible for a TAG because TAG awards are limited to degree granting programs. Hence, the only assistance available to these individuals comes in the form of loans. Therefore, there is a significant need for a program which might provide assistance to these individuals in order to expand and adequately train the workforce in these professions.

**Geography** - Students from all counties and municipalities in New Jersey would be eligible to receive a NJ-GIVS scholarship. Consistent with other HESAA residency requirements, students must be bona fide New Jersey residents for a period of at least 12 months.

**Source/Amount of Funds** - SDA would designate to HESAA a specific amount of funds each year for the program. The range of funding as indicated in the attached MOU would be \$550,000 for the first year and an amount to be determined for each additional year. \$500,000 in scholarships would be made available to students and \$50,000 would be used for HESAA's costs to administer the program. HESAA would award the funds to eligible students on a "first come first served" basis. Students and schools would be advised that funds are limited.

**Identification of Students** - Students admitted to an approved institutional program will apply directly to HESAA for the scholarship.

**Amount of Scholarship** - The scholarship would cover the cost of tuition up to \$2,000 per year less any federal financial aid the student is eligible to receive. The scholarship would be renewable for one year. All scholarship awards will be made to the institutions. The institutions will, in turn, credit the students' accounts. No funds will be disbursed directly to students.

### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE NEW JERSEY SCHOOLS DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY AND THE NEW JERSEY HIGHER EDUCATION STUDENT ASSISTANCE AUTHORITY

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") made by and between the New Jersey Schools Development Authority ("SDA") and the New Jersey Higher Education Student Assistance Authority ("HESAA") sets forth the understanding of the parties with respect to the funding and administration of the Governor's Industry Vocations Scholarship Program ("NJ-GIVS"), a Scholarship Program for Women and Minorities, pursuant to which HESAA will administer NJ-GIVS, including the award and disbursement of scholarships, and SDA will provide funding and reimburse HESAA for the costs associated with administration of NJ-GIVS.

*WHEREAS*, SDA was created pursuant to <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 52:18A-235 to 251 (<u>P.L.</u> 2007, <u>c.</u> 137), among other things, to design and construct school facilities projects in the State of New Jersey pursuant to the Educational Facilities Construction and Financing Act, <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 18A:7G-1 <u>et seq</u>. (the "Act"); and

*WHEREAS*, regulations adopted by SDA and codified at <u>N.J.A.C.</u> 19:39-5.1, provide for, among other things, the application of school facilities project funding toward training for women and minority workers in life skills, pre-apprenticeship, and construction trades apprenticeship programs; and

*WHEREAS*, pursuant to <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 52:18A-240(b), SDA may allocate one-half of one percent of the annual value of its construction program to the financing of minority and women worker outreach and training programs pertinent to school facilities project construction; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 52:38-7 requires that "upon entering into any public works contract in excess of \$1,000,000 which is funded, in whole or in part, by funds of a public body, or any public works contract of any size which is funded, in whole or in part, by funds provided to the public body pursuant to the "American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009," Pub.L.111-5, the public body entering into the contract shall transfer an amount equal to one half of one percent (.5%) of the portion of the contract amount funded by funds of the public body, or provided to the public body.... to the Department of Labor and Workforce Development, *except* that any Statewide authority which enters into the contract and administers a program which meets the requirements of this section may retain all or a portion of the .5% share of the funds under the contract as is necessary for the operation of the program, but shall transfer to the department any portion of the funds not necessary for the program..."; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 52:38-7 further provides that "The department or authority shall use the transferred or retained funds to provide on-the-job or other outreach and training programs for minority group members and women in construction trade occupations or other occupations, including engineering and management occupations, utilized in the performance of public works contracts. . . . The department or authority shall use funds transferred or retained pursuant to this section to provide grants to implement such programs to consortia which include those community-based organization, faith-based organizations, labor organizations, employers, contractors and trade organizations, institutions of higher education, and schools and other local public agencies which the department or authority determines are best able to facilitate entry and success of minority group members and women into training and long-term trade and professional employment in the construction industry...."; and

*WHEREAS*, pursuant to <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 18A:71A-9, HESAA has the express statutory authority to foster further access to postsecondary education through scholarship programs in the State of New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, in furtherance of its statutory and regulatory obligations to establish minority and women outreach and training programs pertinent to school facilities projects throughout the State of New Jersey, Governor Christie announced on June 25, 2013 authorization for SDA to fund NJ-GIVS administered by HESAA designed to augment and enhance the pool of qualified minority and women workers in the construction trades available to work on school facilities projects;

*NOW, THEREFORE*, through this MOU, HESAA and SDA agree on the following terms and conditions to govern the funding, administration, implementation and oversight of NJ-GIVS:

### **SDA Responsibilities:**

- 1. For each school facilities project with a total cost equal to or greater than \$1 million that is the subject of one or more construction contracts entered into by SDA, SDA shall allocate one-half of one percent of the value of the facilities project to the financing of outreach and training, to include programs such as NJ-GIVS.
- 2. SDA shall monitor and evaluate HESAA's administration, implementation and funding of NJ-GIVS, including the budgets, programming, and funding of awardees based on quarterly reports provided by HESAA to SDA in accordance with paragraph 4, of this MOU under "HESAA Responsibilities".
- 3. Upon receipt of a complete and properly calculated HESAA invoice, accompanied by appropriate reports and other requested documentation, SDA will reimburse HESAA for all approved administrative and programmatic expenses in accordance with the Prompt Payment Act, N.J.S.A. 18A:52:32-1 et seq.
- 4. <u>HESAA Administrative Fee</u> SDA agrees to annually reimburse HESAA for fully-documented and actual expenses incurred in administering, implementing, and promoting NJ-GIVS, provided however, that such amounts shall not exceed a cap of the greater of \$50,000 or 10% of the total value of scholarships awarded during a particular fiscal year.

- 5. SDA shall work independently and jointly with HESAA to foster positive relationships with colleges and universities in the State of New Jersey aimed toward increasing the recruitment of women and minorities who receive scholarships into registered union apprenticeships or positions within the construction trades.
- 6. SDA reserves the right to create, manage, implement and fund other constructionrelated education, outreach and training programs under NJ-GIVS umbrella with or without the services of HESAA. SDA shall notify HESAA of such programs in order to avoid duplication of services.
- 7. Subject to the terms and conditions contained in this MOU, SDA agrees to compensate HESAA as indicated within this MOU. SDA will budget an amount not-to-exceed \$550,000 to cover all eligible costs for the Scholarship Program for the first year inclusive of both funds for the administrative fee and \$500,000 in scholarship funds; amounts available for each subsequent year will be determined by SDA in consultation with HESAA.

### **HESAA Responsibilities:**

- 1. HESAA shall initiate and implement NJ-GIVS, a statewide scholarship program for women and minorities, in order to assist participants in their effort to finance their post-secondary education in a construction related field or trade.
- 2. HESAA will support New Jersey's eligible higher education institutions in their efforts to conduct outreach and marketing throughout their student population, so as to promote NJ-GIVS for women and minorities pursuing secondary education in the appropriate construction related field and encourage their application to NJ-GIVS.
- 3. HESAA, in consultation with SDA, will develop and distribute a Notice of Scholarship Opportunity (NSO) for the provision of NJ-GIVS. This NSO may be amended, updated and reissued as needed. The NSO will outline and provide for, among other things, eligibility standards, application procedures, HESAA's evaluation and approval process for the awarding of scholarships, standards for performance, criteria upon which awardees will be evaluated, and the basis upon which scholarships may be revoked or terminated and the amount of funds available through NJ-GIVS.
- 4. HESAA will provide SDA with a complete and properly calculated invoice, accompanied by appropriate reports and other requested documentation supporting the specific costs associated with administering NJ-GIVS. Payments to HESAA under this MOU are limited to the total value of scholarships awarded and the Administrative Fee described in Paragraph 4 of SDA Responsibilities set forth above. No other expenses or charges will be compensable under this MOU unless specifically agreed to by both parties in advance and in writing.

- 5. HESAA will provide awardees and New Jersey's eligible higher education institutions with technical assistance and support as needed and provide adequate HESAA staff to manage and administer NJ-GIVS.
- 6. HESAA shall be responsible for developing disbursement procedures for awardees under NJ-GIVS prior to the commencement of NJ-GIVS. HESAA will establish a dedicated fund account on the State's accounting systems and will record all transactions associated with NJ-GIVS on that system which is subject to annual oversight and review by the State Auditor through the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report.
- 7. HESAA will ensure appropriate auditing is conducted as mandated by state law. HESAA will cooperate with any external audit of NJ-GIVS conducted by or on behalf of any authorized State entity.

### **Miscellaneous:**

<u>Interagency Communications</u> -- Regular and open communications between HESAA and SDA is crucial to the success of NJ-GIVS. Therefore:

- (a) HESAA and SDA shall make presentations regarding the status of NJ-GIVS to SDA's Board of Directors, as requested.
- (b) HESAA shall meet with SDA quarterly to update SDA on program activities.
- (c) HESAA shall immediately notify SDA of any and all concerns relevant to NJ-GIVS.

This MOU may be signed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be an original for all purposes, but all of which taken together shall constitute but one and the same MOU.

This MOU is being entered into for the sole purpose of evidencing mutual understanding and intention of the parties hereto. This MOU may be amended, modified, supplemented, superseded or terminated by the parties at any time through a writing executed by both parties. Any dispute concerning this MOU shall be submitted to Gabrielle Charette, Executive Director, or her designee, of the Higher Education Student Assistance Authority (HESAA) and Marc Larkins, Chief Executive Officer of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority (SDA), or his designee, for review and resolution.

This MOU is for the period of three (3) years commencing on July 23, 2013 and ending on July 23, 2016. The MOU may be renewed annually thereafter, subject to the availability of funds and the agreement of both parties. All terms and conditions of the MOU will continue to have the same force and effect unless otherwise adjusted and indicated in subsequent MOUs, MOU amendments and/or budget agreements. This MOU may be terminated by either party on sixty (60) days advance written notice to the other party. No adjustments to the amount of this MOU shall be made without written approval of HESAA and SDA.

Approval of Memorandum of Understanding Between the NJSDA and the Higher Education Student Assistance Authority (HESAA) to effectuate the Governor's Industry Vocations Scholarship Program (NJ-GIVS) pursuant to N.J.S.A. 52:38-7

### Resolution

**WHEREAS,** the Operating Authority of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority ("SDA" or "Authority") requires that the Members of the Authority approve the execution of Memoranda of Understanding (MOU) between the SDA and other state agencies; and

WHEREAS, interagency cooperation is permitted by N.J.S.A. 52:14-1 et seq.; and

**WHEREAS,** On June 25, 2013 Governor Christie announced authorization for a new Scholarship program entitled the Governor's Industry Vocations Scholarship Program ("NJ-GIVS"); and

**WHEREAS,** NJ-GIVS, consistent with N.J.S.A. 52:38-7, provides scholarships to provide training opportunities for women and minorities in order to maximize their participation in construction trade related occupations: and

**WHEREAS,** pursuant to N.J.S.A. 18A:71A-9, HESAA has the expressed statutory authority to foster further access to post-secondary education through scholarship programs in the State of New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) presented to the Board on this date which, upon approval, shall be fully executed by the SDA and the Higher Education Student Assistance Authority (HESAA), HESAA will administer the NJ-GIVS scholarship program in compliance with applicable law; and

**WHEREAS**, the scholarship program authorized by this MOU shall, consistent with its provisions, be effective for a period of three years, renewable yearly thereafter; and

**WHEREAS**, the MOU fully sets forth the respective responsibilities of the parties thereto along with applicable costs; and

**WHEREAS,** SDA executive management, associated program staff and SDA legal counsel have reviewed the proposed MOU and associated costs and determined that, as presented, it is justifiable, appropriate and in the best interest of the Authority and New Jersey's taxpayers; and

**WHEREAS,** SDA executive management recommends that the Members of the Authority approve the MOU between SDA and HESAA for establishment and implementation of the NJ-GIVS scholarship program as presented to the Board on this date.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Members of the Authority hereby authorize and approve the SDA's execution, along with the State Higher Education Student Assistance Authority (HESAA), of the Memorandum of Understanding establishing the NJ-GIVS scholarship program, which program shall be implemented consistent with the provisions of the Memorandum of Understanding and the memorandum presented to the Board on this date and incorporated herein.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that this resolution shall take effect immediately, but no action authorized herein shall have force and effect until 10 days, Saturdays, Sundays and public holidays excepted, after a copy of the minutes of the Authority meeting at which this resolution was adopted has been delivered to the Governor for his approval, unless during such 10 day period, the Governor shall approve same, in which case such action shall become effective upon such approval.

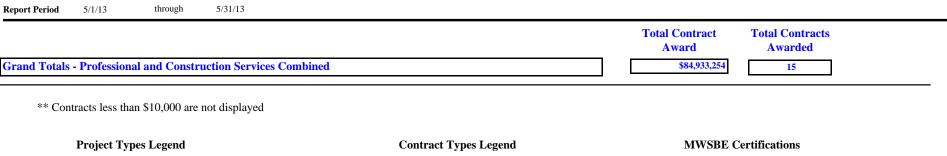

## SMALL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (SBE) COMPLIANCE REVIEW

### **Project Approvals:**

Five emergent construction projects were verified to be compliant with SBE requirements and two capital construction projects were verified to be compliant in the design phase.

Vendor Services staff continues to participate at mandatory pre-bid and pre-construction meetings to instruct and inform bidders regarding SDA's SBE goals, policies and procedures, including:

- Small Business Enterprise subcontracting goal of 25% of all contracts
- County workforce goals for minorities and females
- Detailed process procedures to monitor and track the progress made toward these goals throughout the life cycle of each project

At these meetings, general contractors are strongly encouraged to identify and hire minority-owned and womenowned firms, as well as locally-based enterprises, for diverse business participation on all school building projects. Additional outreach strategies are discussed and utilized.

## SMALL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (SBE) COMPLIANCE MONITORING

The SDA regularly exceeds the State-mandated 25% SBE goal. The figures below demonstrate compliance with this requirement.

This report summarizes the Regular Operating District Grant activity from inception to date and for the month of May 2013. Also included is a detailed list of grants executed and grants offered during the reporting period.

## Monthly Update:

- No grants were offered during the reporting period.
- 2 grants impacting 2 districts were executed during the reporting period representing \$24.2M in total project costs and state share of \$5.2M.
- 27 grants impacting 14 districts were closed out during the reporting period representing \$14.3M in total project costs and state share of \$5.7M.
- Since inception, over \$2.3B has been disbursed to over 500 regular operating districts through the grant program.
- Since inception \$2.8B in funding has been approved by the Department of Education and offered to regular operating districts through the grant program.

## Beam Signing Event in New Brunswick Celebrates Construction Progress



CEO Marc Larkins joined New Brunswick second grade students in a "beam signing" ceremony to highlight the progress of construction for the new A. Chester Redshaw Elementary School.

New Brunswick students, teachers and officials celebrated the ongoing construction of the facility by signing a steel beam that will be hoisted into place as a permanent part of the new 135,000

square-foot facility that will educate approximately 900 students in pre-kindergarten through fifth grades. Construction on the new facility began in March 2013 and its completion is anticipated in time for start of the September 2014 school year.

The Office of the Chief Financial Officer is providing the attached monthly financial report to the Members of the Authority for their information. Included on pages 1 and 2 of this report is a "Financial Summary" of the Authority's activities for the year. On pages 3 and 4 of the report is a summary of the Authority's operating expenditures and headcount information. Page 3A contains an itemized breakdown of personnel costs that have been allocated to school facilities project costs from program general and administrative ("Operating") expense. The basic financial statement and cash flow report follow.

## Authority Operating Expenses "before" Allocation of Employee Costs to Project Costs (Actual vs. Budget)

For May 2013 year to date, Authority operating expenses, **\$15 million**, are **down \$1.6 million** as compared to the budget for the corresponding period. The deviation of actual expenses versus budget is mainly due to:

- Personnel expense (i.e., full-time and temporary employee salaries and benefits, business travel, automobile, parking and training and professional development expenses) has a positive variance **(\$1.2M)** because the Authority is currently 14 FTEs under budget;
- MIS spending for system hardware and maintenance as well as the Long Range Facility Plan Database has yet to occur as anticipated **(\$335K)**.

## Authority Operating Expenses "before" Allocation of Employee Costs to Project Costs (Actual vs. Prior Year)

For May 2013 year to date, Authority operating expenses, **\$15 million**, are **<u>down</u></u> <b><u><b><u>\$946K</u>** as compared to the corresponding prior year. The decrease in the yearover-year expense is due to:</u>

• Personnel cost - 4 fewer FTEs as well as a year-over-year reduction to our pension contribution, \$510K.

## School Facilities Project Expenditures "after" Allocation of Employee Costs to Project Costs

For May 2013 year to date, project expenditures, **\$71.6 million**, are **<u>up \$4.5M</u>** as compared to corresponding prior year; and **<u>down \$32.8M</u>** in comparison to the 2013 capital spending forecast. The year-over-year variance is attributable to increases in construction cost **\$17.7M**, and personnel expenses allocated to school facilities project costs (this is the first year) from Operating expense **\$6.4M**, offset by a decrease in grant activity **\$8.6M** and other project related cost, **\$11M**.

## Other

Since program inception, 66.6% of the funds authorized for the SDA Districts have been disbursed. Additionally, since program inception 96% of all SDA disbursements relate to school facilities projects and 4% relate to Operating expense.

The estimated value of active school facilities projects is approximately \$2.2B.

- Prepaid security deposits of \$10,937 for the Authority's leased swing space.

- Capital Assets total \$.4 million (net of accumulated depreciation of \$13.5 million), consisting of leasehold improvements (SDA offices), capitalized software, equipment, furniture and fixtures in support of SDA operations. Depreciation on capital assets is calculated using the straight-line method over the life of each asset. For the year to date, Capital Expenditures are \$48,440 and Depreciation Expense is \$303,165.

#### ► Accrued Liabilities total \$114.7 million, as follows:

- Accrued project costs of \$17 million consisting of unpaid invoices (\$9.7 million); retainage (\$7.3 million).
- Pollution remediation obligations (PRO) under GASB 49 net to \$34.8 million (PRO liability \$36.6 million, offset by expected cost recoveries of \$1.8 million).
- Estimated liability for loss contingencies totaling \$48.4 million (contractor claims \$48.4 million).
