NEW JERSEY SCHOOLS DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY BOARD OF DIRECTORS TELECONFERENCE MEETING WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 7, 2016

A teleconference meeting of the Board of Directors of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority (SDA or the Authority) was held on Wednesday, September 7, 2016 at 9:00 A.M. at the offices of the Authority at 32 East Front Street, Trenton, New Jersey.

being a quorum of the Board. Mr. Luckie, Ms. Hassett and Mr. Nixon participated in the meeting in person.

At the Chairman's request, Charles McKenna, chief executive officer; Jason Ballard, chief of staff; Andrew Yosha, executive vice president; Jane F. Kelly, vice president and assistant secretary; Donald Guarriello, vice president and chief financial officer; Raymond Arcario, vice president; Albert Barnes, chief counsel; Ritchard Sherman, managing director, Gregory Voronov, managing director; Thomas Schrum, director (by teleconference); and

Anthony Gilfillan, director, of the SDA participated in the meeting. Michael Collins of the Governor's Authorities Unit also participated in the meeting in person.

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman of the Board, Mr. Walsh, who requested that Ms. Kelly read the requisite notice of the meeting. Ms. Kelly announced that the meeting notice had been sent to the *Trenton Times* and *Star-Ledger* at least 48 hours prior to the meeting, and had been duly posted on the Secretary of State's bulletin board at the State House in Trenton, New Jersey.

Approval of Meeting Minutes

Mr. Walsh presented for consideration and approval the minutes of the Board's August 3, 2016 Open and Executive Session meetings. A copy of both meeting minutes and a resolution had been provided to the Members for review in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Luckie and seconded by Mr. Nixon, the August 3, 2016 Open and Executive Session meeting minutes were approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Resolution 3a/3b*.

Authority Matters CEO Report

Mr. McKenna began his report with an update on the Trenton Central HS project. He advised the Board that the design-builder, Terminal Construction, continues with the project's design services phase. He said that the stone work operation is complete and staff anticipates issuing a Notice to Proceed (NTP) for footings and foundations this month.

Mr. McKenna gave an update on projects in the Bridgeton School District. In regard to the Buckshutem Road ES project he said that, with the renovation work completed, the district was provided with a new media center and administration area. He added that, following the

installation of playground equipment, an application for a certificate of occupancy (CO) for the school will be submitted to Department of Community Affairs (DCA). He reported that the addition is complete for the Quarter Mile Lane ES project and that DCA issued a temporary certificate of occupancy (TCO) for the school last month. He added that renovation work on the existing school has begun.

Mr. McKenna said that, for Camden HS project, Design Ideas Group is concluding its pre-design phase services. He noted that while there is no item on today's agenda regarding the Camden HS project, management expects to have a recommendation to advance to the Board in October. With respect to the East Orange George Washington Carver ES project, he informed the Board that, on August 4, SDA issued a NTP to Site Enterprises, Inc. for demolition/early site preparation activities. He said that a demolition/early site plan kick-off meeting was held on August 24 and the SDA Design Studio continues to advance the design of the new school.

Turning to projects in the Elizabeth School District, Mr. McKenna said that a TCO was issued for the Academic HS project and the district has taken possession of the building. He noted that Chairman Walsh recently toured the building which will be a great addition to the Elizabeth School District's schools. In regard to the Elizabeth New ES project, he reported that footings and foundations work is complete and other major site-work activities continue to progress well. He said that steel erection work continues and staff anticipates its completion by mid-September.

Mr. McKenna reported that footings and foundations work is ongoing for the Garfield James Madison ES No. 10 project. He said that construction work continues to progress well on the Gloucester ES/MS project. In regard to the Harrison New ES project, he informed the Board

that a procurement for design-build services was advertised in July and price and technical proposals are due September 27.

With respect to the Irvington Madison Avenue ES project, Mr. McKenna said that building demolition is complete and site work is nearing completion. He advised the Board that staff advertised for design-build services the previous month (August) and held the pre-bid meeting on August 30. He said that price and technical proposals are due October 25.

Mr. McKenna then provided an update on projects in the Keansburg School District. He reported that the TCO was issued for the Joseph C. Caruso ES project and that the district has taken possession of the building. He noted that a ribbon cutting event was held the previous day on the first day that students attended their new school. He said that everything was working well and the district was pleased with the new facility. In regard to the Port Monmouth Road ES project, he reported that the design consultant continues work on pre-design phase services. He said that the school is vacant and destructive testing is now being performed.

Turning to projects in the Jersey City School District, Mr. McKenna reported that a TCO was issued for the Jersey City PS 20 project and that the district has taken possession of the building. He noted that this school is opening today. With respect to the Jersey City ES No. 3 project, he said that building enclosure, interior finishes and site work are all progressing well. He said that this school either will open in January 2017 or the following September at the district's option.

Mr. McKenna said that, for the Millville HS addition and renovation project, staff anticipates advertising for design-build services this month.

With respect to the New Brunswick Paul Robeson ES project, Mr. McKenna reported that the DCA released the demolition and footings and foundations plans. He said that a NTP for

selective demolition of the existing building was issued the previous month (August). He noted that abatement and site remediation activities are ongoing.

Mr. McKenna then provided an update on projects in the Newark School District. He said that all punch list items for the Elliott Street ES project have been completed and staff anticipates completion of the punch list at the Oliver Street ES within the next few weeks. He said that students are occupying the school and advised the Board that students from the South Street ES will be occupying the old Oliver Street ES building during construction of their new school. In regard to the South Street ES project, he advised Board that design-builder Ernest Bock & Sons (EBS) is actively working on the final design phase. He said that footings, foundations, and underground utility work is ongoing.

Turning to projects in the Orange School District, Mr. McKenna said that staff issued a NTP last month to the design consultant for schematic design phase services for the Cleveland ES project. In regard to the Orange HS project, he reported that additional investigation activities are ongoing to validate site conditions.

Mr. McKenna advised the Board that the design-builder has completed the footings and foundations design package for the Passaic Leonard Place ES project and submitted it to DCA for review. He said that, on August 8, staff issued a NTP to Epic Management, Inc. (Epic) for construction management (CM) services. He noted that the kick-off meeting is scheduled for this coming Friday (September 9).

In continuing, Mr. McKenna gave an update on projects in the Paterson School District. He said that, in regard to the Marshall Street ES project, the TCO was issued in June and the district has taken possession of the building. He reported that the DCA issued the TCO for the Paterson PS 16 project on August 4 and the district has taken possession of this building as well.

Mr. McKenna noted that, including the Paterson Catholic HS (PCHS) which was purchased and made available, Paterson has recently received three new school facilities from the SDA. He updated the Board regarding the status of the charter school that had previously been located in the PCHS building.

Mr. McKenna then reported that a working group kick-off meeting for design was held on August 22 for the Pemberton Denbo Crichton ES project.

With respect to the Perth Amboy Seaman Avenue ES project, Mr. McKenna reported that an initial project meeting was held last month with the design-builder, Epic, and that design phase services are underway. He informed the Board that price and technical proposals for CM services were received the previous month (August) and staff anticipates making a recommendation of award to the Board in October.

Mr. McKenna reported that a TCO was issued on August 26 for the Phillipsburg HS project and the district has taken possession of the building. He noted that Ms. Lemelle recently participated in a tour of the new school facility. With respect to the Vineland New MS project, he said that design-builder EBS continues with the design services phase and has mobilized to perform site clearing and grading. He added that EBS submitted footings, foundations, and structural steel plans to DCA for review. Referencing the Vineland HS project, Mr. McKenna noted that asbestos has been removed as part of this renovation project and the school is safe for occupancy.

Mr. McKenna advised the Board that asbestos abatement activities are underway for the West New York Harry L. Bain PS No. 6 project renovation project. He then provided a brief update regarding activities ongoing at the Trenton Hedgepeth-Williams emergent project. He said that work will be ongoing there nights and weekends going forward.

Turning to ongoing procurement activity, Mr. McKenna said that, in addition to the award for Network, Hardware and Software Support Services that management will be discussing and recommending later in the meeting, other activity currently underway includes procurements for design-build services for the Harrison New ES and Irvington New Madison Avenue ES projects; and CM services for the Perth Amboy Seaman Avenue ES project.

Reporting on events, outreach and other SDA activities, Mr. McKenna advised the Board that, on August 3, SDA held an event to highlight the demolition work for the Madison Avenue ES project in Irvington. He said that, on August 9, staff held a groundbreaking event to celebrate the start of construction for the new James Madison ES in Garfield. He advised the Board that, on August 10, he attended a Vineland School Board meeting to discuss the status of the emergent project there. He added that, on August 16, staff held a community meeting in East Orange to discuss the George Washington Carver ES project.

Mr. McKenna reminded the Board that, last month (August), staff arranged for the Members to visit a couple of the schools that SDA is opening this week. He thanked the Chairman for joining staff to tour the Academic HS project in Elizabeth and Loren Lemelle for joining staff at the Phillipsburg HS project.

Mr. McKenna said that, the previous day, SDA staff had held a ribbon cutting ceremony in Keansburg for the new Joseph C. Caruso ES. He noted that it was the students' first day of school and served as a great way to kick off a month of celebrating the opening of 7 new or renovated schools.

Mr. McKenna reported that, last week, staff provided the Board with a list of upcoming September ribbon cutting ceremonies. He expressed his hope that the Members' schedules will permit them to join staff at one or more of these upcoming events.

In concluding his CEO report, Mr. McKenna reminded the Board that SDA will be holding a groundbreaking ceremony for the new South Street ES this Friday (September 9).

At the conclusion of his formal report and referencing detailed materials that had been prepared for the Board's review, Mr. McKenna provided the Members with an overview of the six new projects and one renovation project that the Authority is delivering as of September 2016. Specifically, he advised the Board that, this fall, the SDA is providing 8,483 new seats to New Jersey's students throughout the state. He said that this reflects a total State investment of \$549 million. He provided additional detail for each of the seven SDA projects as follows: Bridgeton Buckshutem Road ES, Elizabeth Academic HS/Frank J. Cicarell Academy, Jersey City Public School No. 20, Keansburg Joseph C. Caruso ES, Newark Elliott Street School, Newark Oliver Street School, Paterson Dr. Hani Awadallah ES, Paterson Public School No. 16 and Phillipsburg HS.

Audit Committee

Mr. Walsh asked Mr. Nixon to provide the report of the Audit Committee. Mr. Nixon advised the Board that the Audit Committee met on August 15, 2016. He said that the Committee was provided with the July 2016 New Funding Allocation and Capital Plan Report. He advised that there were no changes in commitments in the 2008 and 2011 Capital Plan Emergent Projects Reserve balances. He reported that there was a \$500,000 decrease in the Unforeseen Events Reserve balance following Board approval of the revised final project charter for the Trenton Central HS. He explained that the decrease reflected the award amount for construction management services and associated contingency. Mr. Nixon advised that there was a \$300,000 increase in the Planning Reserve balance for the Perth Amboy New Seaman Avenue ES project due to the Board's approval of the final project charter, based upon the award

value of the design-build engagement. He then advised the Board that the Program Reserve for the Regular Operating Districts (RODs) experienced a \$100,000 decrease in commitments during the reporting period due to a reduction in state share for grant projects nearing completion.

Mr. Nixon then presented the proposed contract award for Network, Hardware and Software Support Services (the Services) which had been considered and advanced by the Committee. He advised the Members that the Services performed under the proposed contract are required to avoid critical systems failures that lead to excessive network or system outages. He explained that the SDA competitively procured these Services in 2006, 2008 and 2013 and that it is now necessary to again award a contract to ensure that the Authority has continued support available. Mr. Nixon said that a competitive procurement process to obtain the Services was advertised on June 28, 2016. He advised the Board that management recommends award of a contract for the Services to Vinci Systems, Inc. He reported that the total negotiated compensation for the three-year agreement will not exceed \$1,000,000. He noted that the term may be extended for one additional year at the sole discretion of the SDA. Mr. Nixon said that the Committee recommends that the Board approve the contract award to Vinci Systems, Inc. for Network, Hardware and Software Support Services.

A resolution pertaining to this matter had been provided to the Board in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Luckie and seconded by Ms. Hassett, the Network, Hardware and Software Support Services Contract was approved with the Board's unanimous vote in favor of *Resolution 5a*.

Mr. Nixon then discussed the 2016 budget re-forecast which had been presented to the Committee by management. He said that management had reported that the re-forecasted budget is down \$1.5 million as compared to the approved 2016 annual budget. He explained that the

reduced spending projections are primarily attributable to fewer full time employees resulting in salary and benefit cost savings of \$1.3 million.

Mr. Nixon then discussed the July 2016 Monthly Financial Report which had been shared with the Committee by management. He said that Year-to-Date Authority Operating Expenses (Actual vs. Budget), at \$11.3 million, are down \$2 million as compared to the operating budget for the corresponding period. He explained that this variance is largely attributable to lower salary and benefit costs.

In continuing, Mr. Nixon said that Year-to-Date School Facilities Project Expenditures (Actual vs. Forecast), at \$221.2 million, are \$19.2 million lower as compared to the capital spending forecast for the corresponding period. He noted this variance is due to lower than anticipated expenditures in construction work (\$12.4 million), property acquisitions (\$2.2 million), furniture, equipment and technology (\$2.9 million), and other related project costs (\$1.7 million). Mr. Nixon then reported that project expenditures (Actual vs. Prior Year Actual) have decreased by \$27.6 million as compared to the corresponding prior year. He advised that the year-over-year variance is attributable to increased construction related activity (\$10.8 million) and school furniture, equipment and technology (\$11.1 million). He advised the Board that this variance is offset by decreased spending for grant activity (\$14.1 million), property acquisition-e.g. the 2015 Paterson Catholic property acquisition (\$30 million), and project insurance-e.g. the 2015 down payment for the OCIP renewal agreement for project insurance (\$4.9 million).

In concluding, Mr. Nixon reported that, at the current time, 75.7% of the funds authorized for SDA Districts have been disbursed. Additionally, he said that, since program inception, 96% of all SDA disbursements relate to school facilities projects and 4% relate to operating expenses. He said that the estimated value of active school facilities projects is approximately \$2.2 billion.

School Review Committee

Preliminary Project Charter – Plainfield Public School District – New Woodland Elementary School

Mr. Walsh asked Ms. Hassett to provide the report of the School Review Committee. Ms. Hassett said that the SDA School Review Committee met on August 15, 2016 at which time management presented a preliminary project charter for the New Woodland ES project in the Plainfield Public School District. She reported that the Department of Education's (DOE) 2013 Educational Facilities Needs Assessment identified Facilities Efficiency Standard (FES) compliance needs in the Plainfield Public School District. She said that specifically identified was localized overcrowding in the district's K to 5 grade levels along with facilities with classrooms that do not meet FES requirements and facilities providing less square feet per student than is prescribed. She informed the Board that following initial discussions between the district and SDA staff, two addition/renovation projects at the district's Woodland and/or Cook Elementary Schools were proposed as the solution to address these needs. Ms. Hassett said that, with Board approval, SDA staff then began validation activities which included a review of the district's Long Range Facilities Plan and identification of the existing and proposed school facilities included in that plan. She explained that a working group (the district, DOE and SDA) examined and validated current district needs and discussed the proposed elementary school project(s)--assessing current and projected district enrollments and existing district educational capacity. She informed the Board that this evaluation confirmed the district-wide overcrowding and FES compliance needs and localized overcrowding in the district's K to 5 grade levels. She said that an evaluation of the schedule and the logistics of undertaking two addition and renovation projects identified the potential complexities of phasing the projects, as well as the need for temporary space to house the student population during construction of each project. She explained that, after evaluating the options to address the district's needs and after discussion with the district and DOE, SDA management recommends advancement of one new approximately 121,000 square foot replacement school to educate 756 students in grades K to 5. Ms. Hassett explained that advancement of one new school project, as opposed to two addition/renovation projects, would significantly address the district's needs while avoiding the additional cost associated with undertaking the two projects. She advised the Board that it would also provide a modern educational environment better suited to delivering the district's educational programs and eliminate 1) the unforeseen conditions and uncertainty inherent in renovation projects and 2) the existing educational adequacy limitations associated with the existing older facilities. She noted that advancing one project would allow for project delivery approximately one year earlier than proceeding with two addition/renovation projects.

A resolution pertaining to this matter had been provided to the Board in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas and seconded by Mr. Luckie, the preliminary project charter for the New Woodland ES project in the Plainfield Public School District was approved with the Board's unanimous vote in favor of *Resolution 6a*.

Public Comments

The Chairman then opened the Public Comments portion of the Board Meeting. Ms. Kelly asked Mr. Jerell Blakeley of the Healthy Schools Now Coalition to address the Board.

Mr. Blakeley introduced himself as the Campaign Organizer for the Healthy Schools Now Campaign. He inquired as to the scope of the domestic water line piping that is being replaced at the Trenton Hedgepeth-Williams School (School). Mr. McKenna explained that the pipes requiring replacement are the copper pipes located in the older buildings on the site, i.e. not

pipes located in the newer (circa. 1960s) addition section on the site. He said that SDA will complete the work in October. Mr. Blakely asked if work will be ongoing while students are in the building. Mr. McKenna assured Mr. Blakely that work would only proceed on nights and weekends when students are not occupying the building. Mr. Blakely then inquired about an article in the Trentonian newspaper pertaining to asbestos abatement at the School. Mr. McKenna noted the routine presence of asbestos in older buildings and explained the asbestos abatement permitting and implementation process. He said that air monitoring equipment continues to be utilized on site and that no issues have been reported to date. He said that the consultant report that is prepared will be provided to the district. Mr. Blakeley requested a copy as well. Mr. Blakeley then inquired as to why the School's teachers met off-site the previous week instead of at the School. Mr. McKenna explained that the decision for the teachers to meet elsewhere was not due to any air quality related concerns but, rather, due to the "mess" typically associated with ongoing construction activities. Mr. Arcario then reiterated that no piping replacement is being conducted in the newer section of the buildings.

RE: Camden School District – Camden High School

INTRODUCTION

At the March 7, 2012 SDA Board Meeting, the Members approved the Authority's 2012 Capital Plan. That Plan identified a project to address facilities conditions deficiencies at Camden High School.

On August 5, 2015, the Members approved the award of a contract for Design Consultant Services to Design Ideas Group Architecture + Planning, LLC (DIG) for the Camden High School Project. Based upon that approval, DIG was authorized to proceed with Predesign Phase services.

We are writing to advise the Members of the findings of the Predesign Phase and to present to the Members the attached Preliminary Project Charter, created by Program Operations staff, which provides project advancement details including estimated total costs for project completion. Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended March 7, 2012, Preliminary Project Charters require approval by the Members of the Authority.

BACKGROUND

Constructed between 1916 and 1970, the Camden High School is a 300,000 square foot facility currently educating approximately 700 students in Grades 9 to 12. Following approval of the SDA's Capital Plan, a Working Group comprised of District, DOE and SDA staff was convened to review and validate the conditions deficiencies and to identify project scope items necessary to be addressed at Camden HS. This validation process included a review of existing facility conditions needs as well as discussion of District-wide high school enrollments and high school program needs.

Based upon this validation of needs, the Working Group recognized that an evaluation and development of options would require a more detailed assessment of the condition of the existing facility, additional program development and additional preliminary predevelopment activities. It was the Working Group's final recommendations to engage a Design Consultant to conclusively evaluate the existing conditions and identify and evaluate appropriate potential options to address programmatic needs at the Camden High School facility.

Predesign Phase

On September 11, 2015, pursuant to approval by the Members on August 5, 2015, NJSDA issued to Design Ideas Group Architecture + Planning, LLC (DIG) a Notice to Proceed specifically focused on Predesign Services for a negotiated value of \$1,189,870, inclusive of \$900,000 in allowances.

The purpose of the Predesign phase was to develop and analyze options to enable identification of a project that would most effectively and efficiently address facility conditions needs. To support effective analysis of the options, DIG was required to undertake a detailed facility conditions assessment.

DIG was also required to develop conceptual renovation options for addressing identified facility conditions needs and, to the extent feasible, for addressing educational program needs based upon a renovation space program developed by NJDOE in conjunction with the District's Long Range Facilities Plan (LRFP). That space program, which anticipates consolidation of other existing high school programs at the Camden High School campus, calls for educating 1,200 students in four small learning communities of 300 students each.

Preliminary studies confirmed that a complete renovation of the existing Camden High School facility would not be cost effective. Therefore, the SDA directed DIG to develop and evaluate options which included demolition and replacement of existing facilities with new construction and DIG detailed several options pursuant to this approach.

Concurrent with these activities by DIG, SDA Executive Leadership directed SDA Staff to develop a conceptual scope and projected costs for demolition of the entire existing Camden High School facility and its replacement with a new school facility. SDA programmatic standards and cost models were utilized in the development of the new construction approach.

Options Evaluation

SDA Executive Leadership is recommending advancement of a new replacement facility for the following reasons:

- A new school facility will fully address educational program requirements whereas a renovation project would not;
- A new school facility will better address facilities conditions needs over the extended life cycle of the facility;
- The cost of a project to renovate the entire existing facility is greater than the cost of delivering a new facility;
- Construction of a new school facility would allow for a Design-Build project delivery which will result in earlier delivery of the facility to the District.

In addition, construction of a new school facility would allow for the implementation of the NJSDA Kit of Parts and full compliance with all NJSDA Materials and System Standards.

RECOMMENDED PROJECT SCOPE

The project scope for a New Camden High School is anticipated to include the following elements:

- Demolition of the existing Camden High School facility which is anticipated to be undertaken as an Early Site Package (ESP)
- Construction of an approximately 242,000 square foot school facility educating 1,200 students in grades 9-12
- Related site development work

Project Delivery Recommendations:

It is recommended that this project be advanced utilizing in-house design staff through Schematic Design and that bridging documents be prepared to support a Design-Build delivery process. In-House Design activities will include a review of current District enrollment projections and capacity needs in

conjunction with the District and NJDOE in order to validate the required capacity of the New Camden High School facility.

We recognize the importance of this review and that its conclusion may serve to refine the Project Scope.

By providing a new replacement high school for the Camden School District, the need to address the facility condition deficiencies at the existing Camden HS will be eliminated.

Advancing the project as recommended above will signify the end of DIG's engagement for the project.

PROJECT BUDGET

The project budget which has been developed is reflective of the recommendation for Design-Build project delivery. The estimated cost of \$133 million for the project, reflected in the Preliminary Project Charter, is inclusive of all prior expenditures related to Pre-Design Services performed by DIG, as well as estimated future costs necessary for advancement of the current project scope. The estimated costs are based upon the application of planning estimates to the current anticipated project scope.

RECOMMENDATION

The Members are requested to approve the Preliminary Project Charter for the Camden School District's New Camden High School project. In so doing, the Board is providing the Authority with approval to:

- 1. Proceed with in-house design activities.
- 2. Procure necessary professional and construction services in relationship to this project.

The Operating Authority will govern the award of all professional services and construction contracts and the Board's notification of the use of contingency monies.

Resolution

WHEREAS, the Operating Authority of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority (SDA or the Authority) requires that the Members of the Authority approve Preliminary Project Charters; and

WHEREAS, constructed between 1916 and 1970, the Camden High School in the Camden School District (district) is a 300,000 square foot facility currently educating approximately 700 students in Grades 9 through 12; and

WHEREAS, in March 2012, the Members of the Authority (Members) approved the SDA's 2012 Capital Plan, identifying a project to address facilities conditions deficiencies at the Camden High School (Project); and

WHEREAS, following approval of the SDA's Capital Plan, a Working Group comprised of District, DOE and SDA staff was convened to review and validate the Camden HS conditions deficiencies and to identify project scope items necessary to be addressed there, with such validation to include a review of existing facility conditions needs as well as a discussion of district-wide high school enrollments and high school program needs; and

WHEREAS, based upon this validation of needs, the Working Group determined that an evaluation and development of options would require a more detailed assessment of the facility's condition along with additional program development and preliminary predevelopment activities, and recommended the hiring of a design consultant for such purposes; and

WHEREAS, in August 2015, the Members approved the award of a contract for design consultant services to Design Ideas Group Architecture + Planning, LLC (DIG) and DIG was subsequently authorized to proceed with pre-design phase services for the Project; and

WHEREAS, when preliminary studies confirmed that a complete renovation of the existing Camden High School facility would not be cost effective, SDA directed DIG to develop and evaluate options which included demolition and replacement of existing facilities with new construction; and

WHEREAS, concurrent with these activities by DIG, SDA executive leadership directed SDA staff to develop a conceptual scope and projected costs for demolition of the entire existing Camden High School facility and its replacement with a new school facility; and

WHEREAS, SDA executive leadership is recommending advancement of a new replacement facility on the basis that a new school facility will fully address educational program requirements whereas a renovation project would not; that a new school facility will better address facilities conditions needs over the extended life cycle of the facility; that the cost of a project to renovate the entire existing facility is greater than the cost of delivering a new facility and; that construction of a new school facility would allow for a design-build project delivery which will result in earlier delivery of the facility to the district; and

WHEREAS, the findings of the pre-design phase, project background, and details regarding the proposed project scope and project budget are set forth in detail in the memorandum presented to the Board on this date and incorporated herein with a recommendation for approval of the project's preliminary project charter as presented.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Members of the Authority hereby authorize and approve the proposed Preliminary Project Charter for the Camden School District's New Camden High School project and, in so doing, authorize management to proceed with in-house design activities and procure necessary professional and construction services in relation to this project.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the SDA Operating Authority will govern the award of all professional services and construction contracts and Board notification of the use of contingency monies.

INTRODUCTION

I am writing to recommend approval by the Members of the Authority of the award of a contract for Construction Management (CM) Services. This contract is for services to manage the design-build construction of the New Seaman Avenue Elementary School in the Perth Amboy School District.

Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended March 7, 2012, Board approval is required for the award of consultant contracts greater than \$100,000. Funding for this engagement is available within the Project Budget, in accordance with the Final Project Charter approved by the Members on July 6, 2016.

BACKGROUND

The Seaman Avenue Elementary School will be an approximately 128,000 square foot facility to educate approximately 724 students in grades K through 5 in the Perth Amboy School District.

On July 6, 2016, the Members of the Authority approved the Final Project Charter and the award of a Design-Build Construction contract to Epic Management, Inc. in the amount of \$43,570,000.

On August 15, 2016, the Notice to Proceed with Design Phase Services was issued to Epic Management, Inc.

PROCUREMENT PROCESS

This package for CM Services was advertised as a "Price and Other Factors" solicitation beginning on July 19, 2016 on the NJSDA website, NJ State website, and in selected newspapers for interested firms to participate in the bidding process. In addition, the advertisement was distributed to those firms that are prequalified in the area of Construction Management (P029) by both the Department of Treasury-Division of Property Management and Construction and the NJSDA. For this procurement, price was weighted as 40% of the overall weight, and all non-price factors had a combined weight of 60%.

A Selection Committee consisting of five (5) NJSDA staff members and one (1) alternate was established.

Firms interested in submitting a proposal were required to send an e-mail giving Notice of Intent to Participate (NOI) by August 2, 2016. NOIs were received from sixteen (16) prequalified construction management firms. Responsive proposals were received from nine (9) firms by August 23, 2016. Qualifications and Technical Proposals were evaluated by the Selection Committee. Evaluations were based upon the information provided by the firms in response to the RFQ/RFP for this project. The committee members evaluated the Qualifications and Technical Proposals for Construction Management Services separately based on the following criteria:

- Firm's CM Experience on Similarly Sophisticated Projects
- Staffing Proposal
- Key Team Members' Experience on Similarly Sophisticated Projects

Each Selection Committee member evaluated each Qualifications and Technical Proposal, assigning a raw score for each criterion on a scale of 0 to 10 as follows:

- Outstanding (9-10): depth and quality of response offers significant advantages.
- Superior (7-8): exceeds RFQ/RFP requirements with no deficiencies.
- Sufficient (5-6): meets RFQ/RFP requirements with no significant deficiencies.
- Minimal (3-4): meets RFQ/RFP requirements but contains some significant deficiencies.
- Marginal (1-2): comprehends intent of RFQ/RFP but contains many significant deficiencies.
- Unsatisfactory (0): requirements not addressed and lack of detail precludes adequate evaluation.

Weighting factors were applied to each of the Selection Committee member's raw scores for each criterion to arrive at a total weighted score as indicated in Table 1 below:

For each firm's Qualifications and Technical Proposal, the individual criteria scores awarded by a particular Selection Committee member were added together to calculate a score for that Qualifications and Technical Proposal. The maximum score for a Qualifications and Technical Proposal is 100. All of the scores awarded by the Selection Committee members to a particular firm's Qualifications and Technical Proposal were added together and averaged to arrive at a Final Qualifications and Technical Proposal Score for each firm. The responsive firms, their scores and ranks are listed in Table 2 below:

The RFQ/RFP stipulated that a shortlist of the six (6) highest-ranked firms would be determined based on the Final Qualifications and Technical Proposal Scores. The shortlisted firms participated in interviews with the Selection Committee on September 13, 2016. The interviews allowed the firms to expand and detail their firm and team experience with respect to NJSDA requirements for construction management services. The Selection Committee interviewed each of the shortlisted firms and evaluated each firm on Interview Criteria and Weighting Factors that were the same as those used in the evaluation of the Qualifications and Technical Proposals, as detailed above.

The individual criteria scores awarded by a particular Selection Committee member were added together to calculate an Interview Score for that firm. The maximum Interview Score is 100. All of the Interview Scores awarded to a particular firm by the Selection Committee members were added together and averaged to arrive at a Final Interview Score for each firm. The shortlisted firms, their scores and ranks are listed in Table 3 below:

The Final Interview Score for each shortlisted firm was added to the Final Qualifications and Technical Proposal Score for such firm, and the two scores were averaged to arrive at a Non-Price Score for each shortlisted firm. The maximum Non-Price Score is 100. The shortlisted firms, their scores and ranks are listed in Table 4 below:

Once all the Non-Price Scores for all shortlisted firms were calculated, the NJSDA opened the sealed Price Proposals and reviewed them for responsiveness. The Price Proposals were publicly opened on September 15, 2016 and the bids were read aloud as required by law.

The lowest responsive Price Proposal was awarded the maximum number of points for the price component, which is 100. All other Price Proposals were awarded points based on the percentage that each proposal exceeded the lowest bid.

The results of the NJSDA's review of the Price Proposals are listed in Table 5 below:

After the Price Scores were determined for all shortlisted firms, the Price Scores were adjusted by a weighting factor of 40%. The Non-Price Scores for "Other Factors" criteria were adjusted by a weighting factor of 60%. The Price Score and Non-Price Score for each shortlisted firm were added together for a Final Combined Score. The maximum Final Combined Score is 100. The Final Combined Scores and Final Rankings are listed in Table 6 below:

The bid submitted by Greyhawk was less than the NJSDA estimate. INTRODUCTION

I am writing to recommend approval by the Members of a MOU between the NJSDA and NJDOE to support activities necessary for the development of a new Long Range Facilities Plan (LRFP) System. Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended March 7, 2012, Memoranda of Understanding require approval by the Members of the Authority.

BACKGROUND

The LRFP System, initially developed in 2005, is a web-based system of hardware and database software designed to collect, manage and maintain LRFP data for all school districts throughout the state, inclusive of the SDA Districts. The System is jointly used by the NJSDA and NJDOE: it provides critical data necessary to support NJSDA Capital Plan development for SDA Districts as well as NJDOE evaluations of proposed school facilities projects and it facilitates required exchanges of data between NJDOE and NJSDA regarding potential projects and District- and State-wide matters.

The Current LRFP System, which was originally intended to have a project application component, has received no upgrades or modifications since its original development, resulting in significant remaining needs in terms of user interface, data access, reporting, document storage, and LRFP and project coordination. In addition, changes to educational laws and regulations, review standards, and school facilities funding since the design of the 2005 system have further increased the need for an improved LRFP system with an integrated project application component.

A new LRFP System is being developed by NJDOE, with much of the framework and programming completed. Planned to be fully completed by December 2017, the new system will alleviate the existing system's limitations and will support consistency and accuracy of data, coordinated and efficient processes, and improved reporting.

PURPOSE OF THE MOU

In order to complete the project on schedule, NJDOE has recognized the need for additional staff support in the form of two (2) contractor positions for one (1) full year. With oversight provided by

fulltime, permanent NJDOE staff, the temporary staff will perform remaining programming and development tasks as well as system testing. Pursuant to the terms of the MOU, the NJSDA will provide funding for the contractor positions: two (2) full time equivalent programmers for one (1) full year.

MOU BUDGET

The need associated with each programmer position is for a full year (2,000 hours each) @ \$75.00 per hour, for a cost to the NJSDA of \$150,000 per position, i.e., for a total NJSDA funding commitment of \$300,000.

The staffing assignment is projected to begin in October, 2016 and conclude at the end of December, 2017. Calendar year funding needs are \$75,000 for the remainder of 2016 (representing 1,000 hours) and \$225,000 for 2017 (representing 3,000 hours).

Funding to support the Calendar Year 2016 costs, although not specifically included in the NJSDA 2016 operating budget, would be made available within the budget by reallocating funds from other budget line items; funding for the Calendar Year 2017 costs will be included within the NJSDA 2017 operating budget to be submitted for review and consideration by the Members later this year.

RECOMMENDATION

The Members are requested to approve the MOU between the NJSDA and the NJDOE for funding of two (2) contractor positions for one (1) full year at a total cost of \$300,000 to support the remaining development and completion of the new LRFP System being undertaken by the NJDOE. MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE NEW JERSEY SCHOOLS DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY AND THE NEW JERSEY DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION FOR FY 2017 LONG RANGE FACILITY PLAN AND PROJECT APPLICATION SYSTEM

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is made this ___ day of _____, 2016, by and between the NEW JERSEY SCHOOLS DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY (the "NJSDA"), located at 32 East Front Street, P.O. Box 991, Trenton, New Jersey 08625, and the NEW JERSEY DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION ("NJDOE"), located at 100 River View Plaza, P.O. Box 500, Trenton, New Jersey 08625.

WHEREAS, the Educational Facilities Construction and Financing Act (the "Act"), <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 18A:7G-1 to 48, as amended, was enacted to address inadequacies in the quality, utility and safety of public school facilities and to meet the constitutional requirement for a thorough and efficient system of free public schools in "SDA Districts" throughout the State of New Jersey, as that term is defined in the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Act provides, among other things, that the NJSDA is responsible for constructing school facilities within the SDA Districts; and

WHEREAS, the Act requires each SDA District to prepare and submit for NJDOE approval a Long Range Facilities Plan ("LRFP") at least once every five (5) years; and

WHEREAS, the NJDOE collects and maintains information related to the LRFP for each SDA District; and

WHEREAS, the Act provides that, for each school facilities project proposed by an SDA District, the NJDOE is responsible to undertake and provide the NJSDA with the NJDOE's evaluation and approval of the project for educational eligibility, adequacy and efficacy such that the NJSDA can implement its mandates and responsibilities under the Act; and

WHEREAS, implementation of the NJSDA mandates, duties and responsibilities for school construction activities remains dependent upon NJDOE evaluation and approval of school facilities projects for educational eligibility, adequacy and efficacy; and

WHEREAS, the Act requires that the NJDOE and the NJSDA exchange a variety of data including, but not limited to, pre-development approvals and final eligible cost recommendations, and that project level determinations be linked to the LRFP; and

WHEREAS, in 2004, the NJSDA procured from VFA, Incorporated ("VFA") a web-based system of hardware and database software for joint use by the NJSDA and the NJDOE designed to collect, manage and maintain LRFP data for each SDA District, to support NJDOE evaluations of proposed school facilities projects and to facilitate required exchanges of data between the NJDOE and the NJSDA (the "Current LRFP System"); and

WHEREAS, the Current LRFP System, consisting of a web-based user interface and an Oracle database, was developed in 2005; and

WHEREAS, changes to educational laws and regulations, review standards, and school facilities funding since the design of the 2005 system have further increased the need for an updated LRFP system with an integrated project application component (the "New LRFP System"); and

WHEREAS, the NJSDA and NJDOE have reached an agreement regarding funding for two contractor positions to provide work product for the NJDOE's Office of School Facilities and Finance (OSFF) in conjunction with the NJDOE's Office of Information Technology (OIT); and

WHEREAS, the two positions will work 100% of the contracting time on developing, producing, and testing the New LRFP System;

NOW, THEREFORE, the NJSDA and NJDOE do hereby agree to the following:

1. <u>Purpose of the MOU.</u> The purpose of this MOU is to document the mutual understanding of the parties regarding the funding for two contractor positions to provide work product for the NJDOE's OSFF in conjunction with the NJDOE's OIT to work 100% of the contracting time on developing, producing, and testing the New LRFP System during the duration of this MOU, as stated in Section 3(f) below.

2. Consideration.

- a. The scope of the work to be provided and the responsibilities of the respective parties under this MOU are set forth in Attachment 1 hereto, which is fully made part hereof as if set forth in detail herein.
- b. Funds will be provided directly by the NJSDA to support activities to develop the New LRFP System, as outlined in this MOU and Attachment 1 hereto.
- c. Unless expressly provided for herein, the terms and conditions of this MOU shall not supersede, replace, alter or amend the terms and conditions of any other Memoranda of Understanding or Memoranda of Agreement by and between the NJSDA and the NJDOE.

3. General Provisions.

- a. <u>Performance Standards</u>. NJDOE shall oversee and manage all services required under this MOU that are necessary to accomplish the objectives set forth herein.
- b. <u>Termination</u>. This MOU may be terminated at any time by either party upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party. In the event of such termination, the NJSDA and NJDOE shall enter into separate written agreement that addresses such issues as may arise as a result of the termination.

- c. NJSDA and NJDOE shall, at all times, comply with all Federal, State and local laws, ordinances, regulations and circulars that are in any manner applicable to the work performed by NJSDA, its agents, subcontractors and employees pursuant to this MOU.
- d. <u>Disclosure of Information</u>. The parties to this MOU acknowledge that they will be sharing government records which may be protected from disclosure to third parties under <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 47:1A-1 et seq., the New Jersey Open Public Records Act ("OPRA"). That is, certain shared government records and/or information contained within those records may fall within one of the enumerated exceptions to the "readily accessible for inspection, copying or examination by citizens of this State" rule set forth within OPRA. In the event that either party receives a request from a third party for access to a shared government record, the party to whom the request has been submitted shall respond to the request in accordance with the provisions of OPRA and shall provide notice within 3 business day of receipt to the other party, of both the request for access and the disposition of that request.
- e. <u>Amendment.</u> This MOU is being entered into for the sole purpose of evidencing the mutual understanding and intention of the parties. It may be amended, modified or supplemented at any time by mutual consent and in writing signed by the parties or their designees.
- f. <u>Effective Date and Duration</u>. This MOU shall be effective upon execution by both parties. The obligation of the NJSDA to provide any funding as required under the terms of this MOU shall commence on October 1, 2016 and shall expire on December 31, 2017 or once the funds are expended, whichever is earlier. The duration of the MOU, may be extended by mutual consent of NJDOE and the NJSDA, solely as provided for in Attachment 1 hereto.
- g. <u>Notices.</u> Any notice given under this MOU shall be via written communication directed by one party to the other party at the following respective addresses:

NJDOE may not assign this MOU to another party except to the extent such assignment may be to another department, agency or authority of the State of New Jersey.

ATTACHMENT 1 | Work Scope for LRFP and Project Application Reporting System

- 1. The purpose of this project is to develop a new web based system to support the submission and review of Long Range Facility Plans ("LRFP") and school facilities project applications. The new system will provide a mechanism for all New Jersey school districts to communicate LRFP and school facilities projects, as well as critical facilities data, to the New Jersey Department of Education ("NJDOE") for their review and approval. The NJDOE and other government agencies will also use the system to review specific district information, determine state funding eligibility, and assess statewide school facility needs. System components will include a web based application and database, document storage, automated reports, and submission, approval, and construction tracking.
- 2. NJDOE Office of Information Technology ("OIT") will collaborate with the NJDOE's Office of School Facilities and Finance (OSFF) in overseeing the project. The OIT will provide project management and database development, as well as access, to ensure that the work product is in line with NJDOE standards and can be properly maintained after the development cycle. All future maintenance will be provided by OIT staff, in accordance with NJDOE's existing arrangements with OIT. OSFF will provide all specifications and work parameters in addition to testing and assist in day-to-day oversight of work progress.
- 3. NJDOE will utilize current full time permanent staff positions to oversee and continue development alongside these temporary contractors. Work has been ongoing on this project for several years with much of the framework and substantial programming already completed. The additional contractors provided for herein will allow for timely completion of the project.
- 4. If a contractor brought in for this project, as provided for herein, is deemed unable to perform necessary duties, that contractor will be relieved and replaced by a more suitable candidate from contracting agency (with NJDOE staff making final determinations for both initial hire and any potential replacements).
- 5. This agreement provides for the engagement of two full time equivalent contractors for one full year (2,000 hours each)by the New Jersey Schools Development Authority ("NJSDA"). The funding for the engagement of these contractors shall be borne directly by the NJSDA, pursuant to the terms and limitations set forth herein. If deemed necessary by the NJDOE to complete the project, additional programming hours may be purchased at the NJDOE's sole expense. No further funding through the NJSDA beyond that included in this agreement will be provided.
- 6. The cost of this agreement is as follows:

Contractors:

a. Programmer 1 for 2,000 hours (1 year) @ \$75/hr = \$150,000 b. Programmer 2 for 2,000 hours (1 year) @ \$75/hr = \$150,000 Maximum NJSDA cost = \$300,000

Vendor Services staff continues to participate at mandatory pre-bid and pre-construction meetings to instruct and inform bidders regarding SDA's SBE goals, policies and procedures, including:

- Small Business Enterprise subcontracting goal of 25% of all contracts
- County workforce goals for minorities and females
- Detailed process procedures to monitor and track the progress made toward these goals throughout the life cycle of each project

At these meetings, vendors are strongly encouraged to identify and hire minority-owned and womenowned firms, as well as locally-based enterprises, for diverse business participation on all school building projects. Additional outreach strategies are discussed and utilized.

SMALL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (SBE) COMPLIANCE MONITORING

The SDA regularly exceeds the State-mandated 25% SBE goal. The total SDA contract dollars awarded through July 31, 2016 was \$36,029,257. The figures below demonstrate compliance with this requirement.

The total contract dollars awarded to all SBE contractors was \$18,827,216 (including minorities and women). This represents 52.26% of all SDA contracts.

SDA Celebrates the Opening of Seven New or Renovated Schools Across New Jersey







The SDA opened six new and one renovated schools to students this September. These new and renovated facilities will provide 6,619 additional seats for students throughout New Jersey. The SDA celebrated with local school districts at ceremonial ribbon cuttings held throughout the month.

The seven completed school projects represent a state investment of more than \$432.7 million. The schools include two new high schools (Phillipsburg High School and Elizabeth High School- Frank J. Cicarell Academy); four new elementary schools (Jersey City Public School #20, Keansburg Caruso Elementary School, Paterson Dr. Hani Awadallah School and Paterson School #16); and one addition/renovation (Bridgeton Buckshutem Road School).

SDA Officials Break Ground for New South Street Elementary School in Newark



On September 9, SDA CEO Charles McKenna joined Newark School District leaders to break ground for the new South Street Elementary School.

The new South Street Elementary School will be an approximately 103,000 square foot facility designed to accommodate 657 students in grades Pre-

kindergarten through eight. The project includes a separate parking area adjacent to the new facility. Once complete, the school will include 29 general classrooms, two science labs, six small group instruction

SUBJECT: Monthly Financial Report - August 2016

The Office of the Chief Financial Officer is providing the attached monthly financial report to the Members of the Authority for their information. Included on pages 1 and 2 of this report is a "Financial Summary" of the Authority's activities for the year. On pages 3 and 4 of the report is a summary of the Authority's operating expenditures. Page 5 contains a breakdown of the Authority's headcount information by department/division. The basic financial statements follow on pages 6 and 7.

Year-to-Date Authority Operating Expenses (Actual vs. Budget)

For August 2016 year to date, Authority operating expenses, **\$12.8 million**, are **down \$2.2 million as** compared to the operating budget for the *corresponding period*. The deviation of actual expenses versus budget is due to:

- Lower salary & benefit costs **\$1.8M.** The Authority is currently 26 FTEs under budget. This variance is offset by the year to date allocation of payroll expense to project cost that is lower than projected, **(\$471K)**;
- Year to date lower spending for MIS expenses \$268K, and general office and facilities \$208K.

Year-to-Date Authority Operating Expenses (Actual vs. Prior Year Actual)

For August 2016 year to date, Authority operating expenses, **\$12.8 million**, are **\$382K** higher as compared to the corresponding prior year.

Year-to-Date School Facilities Project Expenditures (Actual vs. Forecast)

For August 2016 year to date, project expenditures, \$256.4 million, are lower by \$16.8 million as compared to the capital spending forecast for the corresponding period. The variance is due to lower than anticipated expenditures in construction work \$13.6M, property acquisitions \$2.7M, grant activity 1.3M and project insurance \$637K. This variance is offset by an increased spending in furniture, equipment and technology \$1.5M.

Year-to-Date School Facilities Project Expenditures (Actual vs. Prior Year Actual)

For August 2016 year to date, project expenditures, \$256.4 million, have decreased by \$24 million as compared to the corresponding prior year. This variance is due to increased spending in; construction activity \$8.2M; and school furniture, equipment & technology \$17.9M (related to the multiple school openings in August and September). This spending increase is offset by reduced spending for grant activity \$14.9M, property acquisitions (2015 purchase of Paterson Catholic) \$29.8M, project insurance (2015 down payment for the OCIP renewal agreement) \$6M and legal & claims resolution services \$503K.

Other

Since program inception, 76% of the funds authorized for the SDA Districts have been disbursed. Additionally, since program inception 96% of all SDA disbursements relate to school facilities projects and 4% relate to operating expense.

The estimated value of active school facilities projects is approximately \$2.2B.

New Jersey Schools Development Authority Overview of Financial Position August 31, 2016

The information contained in this monthly financial report is for the period as of, and for the year-to-date ending, August 31, 2016.

▶ Overall Cash and Cash Equivalents have decreased by \$263.1 million to \$354.5 million, as follows:

- ▶ **Prepaid Expenses** total \$499,273 as follows:
 - Prepaid insurance of \$177,527
 - Prepaid rents of \$119,705 for the Authority's leased office space in Trenton and Newark.
 - Prepaid MIS maintenance service contracts of \$177,035.
 - Other prepaids of \$25,006.
- ► Capital Assets total \$731,387 (net of accumulated depreciation of \$6,660,599), consisting of leasehold improvements (SDA offices), and capitalized software, equipment, furniture and fixtures in support of SDA operations. Depreciation on capital assets is generally calculated using the straight-line method over the life of each asset. For the year to date, Capital Expenditures are \$78,518 and Depreciation Expense is \$114,003.
- ► **Accrued Liabilities** total \$121.6 million, as follows:
 - Accrued project costs of \$33.8 million consisting of unpaid invoices (\$12 million); and retainage (\$21.8 million).
 - Accrued net pension liability of \$58.4 million.
 - Pollution remediation obligations (PRO) under GASB 49 net to \$5.2 million (PRO liability \$7.1 million, offset by expected cost recoveries of \$1.9 million).
 - Estimated liability for loss contingencies totaling \$2.6 million (contractor claims \$2.6 million).
 - Payroll related liabilities of \$1.8 million.
 - Post-employment benefits obligation of \$19.7 million.
 - Other accrued liabilities of \$0.1 million.
- ▶ **Deposits** total \$4.2 million, as follows:
 - \$4 million is held for local share agreements (pass-through item).
- ► The Authority's **Net Position** at month end is \$237 million.

▶ School Facilities Construction Bond / Note Proceeds & Project Expenditures

- During the current year to date, the SDA has received \$0 million bond and note proceeds. The total amount of proceeds received since program inception is \$10.105 billion.
