JUNE 7, 2017 OPEN SESSION

NEW JERSEY SCHOOLS DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING WEDNESDAY, JUNE 7, 2017

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority (SDA or the Authority) was held on Wednesday, June 7, 2017 at 9:00 A.M. at the offices of the Authority at 32 East Front Street, Trenton, New Jersey.

being a quorum of the Board. Mr. Egan, Ms. Lemelle, Mr. Piaia and Mr. Spadaccini participated in the meeting by teleconference.

At the Chairman's request, Charles McKenna, chief executive officer (by teleconference); Andrew Yosha, executive vice president; Jane F. Kelly, vice president and assistant secretary; Donald Guarriello, vice president and chief financial officer; Manuel Da Silva, vice president; Albert Barnes, chief counsel; Aidita Milsted, director; and Thomas Schrum, director of the SDA participated in the meeting. Labinot Berlajolli of the Governor's Authorities Unit also participated in the meeting.

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman of the Board, Mr. Walsh, who requested that Ms. Kelly read the requisite notice of the meeting. Ms. Kelly announced that the meeting notice had been sent to the *Trenton Times* and *Star-Ledger* at least 48 hours prior to the meeting, and had been duly posted on the Secretary of State's bulletin board at 33 West State Street in Trenton, New Jersey. Ms. Kelly then conducted a roll call and indicated that a quorum of the Members was present.

Approval of Meeting Minutes

Mr. Walsh presented for consideration and approval the minutes of the Board's May 3, 2017 Open and Executive Session meetings. A copy of both meetings' minutes and a resolution had been provided to the Members for review in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Luckie and seconded by Mr. Vargas, the May 3, 2017 Open and Executive Session meeting minutes were approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Resolution 3a/3b*.

Authority Matters

CEO Report

At the Chairman's request, Mr. Yosha provided the Members with the report of the CEO. He began the report with an update on the Trenton Central HS (TCHS) project. He reported that the design-builder has submitted final building design documents to the Department Community Affairs (DCA) and SDA staff is awaiting their release. He said that footings, foundations, structural steel, masonry, and under slab utility work is all ongoing.

Turning to projects in the Bridgeton School District, Mr. Yosha said that for the Buckshutem Road ES project, SDA staff had submitted an application for a certificate of

occupancy (CO) to DCA at the end of the previous month. With regard to the Quarter Mile Lane ES project, he reported that DCA had issued a temporary certificate of occupancy (TCO) the previous month and SDA staff expects to submit an application for a CO at the end of the current month.

With respect to the Camden HS project, Mr. Yosha informed the Members that the demolition package is being finalized for advertisement. For the East Orange George Washington Carver ES project, he said that a recommendation of award for design-build services is on the meeting agenda.

With regard to the Elizabeth New ES and the Garfield James Madison ES No. 10 projects, Mr. Yosha reported that all trades are progressing well. He said that for the Harrison New ES project, Brockwell & Carrington's preliminary design is under review by the SDA. He said that DCA issued demolition permits for three structures on adjoining sites and demolition activities are being scheduled. He added that a notice of award (NOA) for construction management (CM) services was issued the previous month.

Mr. Yosha advised the Members that for the Irvington Madison Avenue ES project, a NOA for CM services was issued the previous month and the design-builder continues with design phase services. He said that schematic design phase services are ongoing for the Keansburg Port Monmouth Road ES project. For the Jersey City ES No. 3 project, Mr. Yosha reported that SDA turned the school over to the district in April. He advised the Board that punch-list and closeout phase work is ongoing.

Next, Mr. Yosha informed the Members that for the Millville HS addition and renovation project, Hall Construction Inc. was issued a notice to proceed (NTP) with design phase services.

In regard to the New Brunswick Paul Robeson ES and Newark South Street ES projects, he said that masonry, HVAC, electrical and plumbing work is ongoing.

Mr. Yosha next gave an update on projects in the Orange School District. He reported that for the Cleveland ES project, design phase services are ongoing. He said that SDA staff issued a NTP for demolition services and associated site work to Yannuzzi Group earlier in the current week. He also advised the Board that design phase services are ongoing for the Orange HS project.

Mr. Yosha reported that steel erection is nearing completion for the Passaic Leonard Place ES project and that design package No. 2 is under review by the DCA. In regard to the Pemberton Denbo Crichton ES project, he informed the Members that demolition services for the school SDA is replacing will commence next month and that temporary space is being readied for the upcoming school year. He added that the SDA design studio continues development of the bridging design for the replacement school.

With respect to the Perth Amboy Seaman Avenue ES project, Mr. Yosha informed the Members that the design-builder continues with design phase services and has mobilized on-site. For the Vineland New MS project, he said that masonry, steel erection, roofing, electrical, plumbing, and HVAC work are all continuing and site paving and curbing work has commenced. In regard to the West New York Harry L. Bain PS No. 6 project, Mr. Yosha reported that phased turnover of the facility to the district has begun. He noted that turnover will be complete for a September reopening by the district.

Turning next to ongoing procurement activity, Mr. Yosha said that, later in the meeting, management would be presenting a design-build services award for the East Orange George Washington Carver ES project and construction services awards for emergent projects at the

Salem MS and Paterson Roberto Clemente ES. He said that other activity currently underway includes procurements for legal services, OCIP IV broker services, and business, real estate property & casualty insurance broker services.

Reporting on events, outreach and other SDA activities, Mr. Yosha informed the Members that SDA staff held beam-signing events on May 4 in Vineland for the new Lincoln Avenue MS project and on May 12 in Passaic City for the new Leonard Place ES project. Mr. Yosha also reported that Mr. McKenna and other SDA staff met with a representative of the "Healthy Schools Now" Coalition on May 9.

In concluding, Mr. Yosha, advised the Board that SDA staff will be holding a community meeting in Perth Amboy on June 13 to discuss the start of the Seaman Avenue ES project. He said that Communications staff is working to schedule an event in West New York to discuss the upcoming completion of the rehabilitation project at the Harry L. Bain School.

Audit Committee Report

At the request of the Chairman, Mr. Nixon provided the report of the Audit Committee. Mr. Nixon advised the Board that the Audit Committee met on May 15, 2017. He said that management had provided the Committee with the April 2017 New Funding Allocation and Capital Plan Update. He said that management had reported no changes in any of the SDA District reserve balances and that the reserve balance for the Regular Operating Districts ("RODs") increased by \$1.1 million during the reporting period due to reductions in state share for grant projects nearing completion.

Mr. Nixon then provided the April 2017 Monthly Financial Report. He advised that the Authority's operating expenses (Actual vs. Budget) for the year-to-date period totaled \$8 million, down \$910,000 as compared to the budget for the corresponding period. He explained that the

decrease is mainly attributable to lower salary and benefit costs. He said that school facilities project expenditures (Actual vs. Forecast) for the year-to-date period total \$131.1 million, \$20.6 million higher as compared to the capital spending forecast for the corresponding period. He explained that the variance is attributable to increased activity in construction work (\$2.5 million), school furniture, fixtures and equipment (\$5.2 million) and grants (\$16.9 million). He advised that this variance is offset by decreased spending in property acquisitions, insurance, legal claims and other project related costs. Mr. Nixon then reported that project expenditures (Actual vs. Prior Year Actual), at \$131.1 million, are \$9.1 million higher as compared to the corresponding prior year period. He explained that the variance is due to increased spending on grants (\$21 million) and school furniture, equipment & technology (\$2 million). He reported that this increase is offset by spending reductions in construction costs (\$11.3 million) and other project related costs (\$2.8 million).

In conclusion, Mr. Nixon advised the Board that, since program inception, approximately 78.1% of the funds allocated for SDA districts have been disbursed. Additionally, he said that 96% of all disbursements relate to school facilities projects, while 4% relate to operating expenses. He noted that the estimated value of current school facilities project activity is approximately \$2.2 billion.

School Review Committee

Design-Build Award and Approval of Final Project Charter – East Orange School District – George Washington Carver Elementary School; Release of Funds from Program Reserve, Award of Contract, and Approval of the Final Project Charter - Paterson School District – New Roberto Clemente Elementary School - Emergent Project - Modifications to the Electrical Supply, Electro/Mechanical Equipment and Other Corrective Work; Release of Funds from Program Reserve, Award of Contract, and Approval of the Final Project Charter – Salem City School District – Salem Middle School – Emergent Project - Ceiling Repair and/or Replacement

Mr. Walsh asked Mr. Luckie to provide the report of the School Review Committee. Mr. Luckie said that the Committee met on May 15, 2017. He said that the first matter for Board consideration involves a design-build award and final project charter in connection with the East Orange George Washington Carver ES project (the Project). He reported that, in January 2014, the Board approved an amendment to the Capital Plan Portfolio which authorized SDA to advance a project for the ES. He said that inclusion of this Project followed the Department of Education's (DOE) 2013 Educational Facilities Needs Assessment which identified Facilities Efficiency Standard compliance needs in the district. Mr. Luckie informed the Members that an SDA, DOE and district working group concluded that demolishing the vacant George Washington Carver ES and building a new educationally appropriate facility on the site would allow students currently housed in the district's Glenwood Avenue School to be relocated to the new facility. He added that the Project involves construction of an approximately 77,000 square foot facility on the district-owned site to educate approximately 470 students in grades Pre-K through 5. He said that following Board approval of the Project's preliminary charter, SDA staff developed schematic design documents that were approved by the district and DOE. He said that bridging documents were then developed to support procurement of a design-builder. Mr. Luckie advised the Members that the Authority advertised a package for design-build services on January 20, 2017 with "price" equaling 60% of the overall weight, and "all non-price factors" having a combined weight of 40%. He said that following the competitive procurement process, management is recommending award of a contract for design-build services in the amount of \$26,900,000 to Dobco, Inc. (Dobco) for the Project. He noted that, at the time of review, Dobco confirmed that its price proposal is inclusive of all scope elements contained in the contract documents. Mr. Luckie said that along with the contract award, management

recommends that the Board approve the Project's final charter which represents the project budget inclusive of dollar values for the award of the design-build package.

A resolution pertaining to this matter had been provided to the Board in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas and seconded by Mr. Nixon, the design-build award and final project charter for the East Orange George Washington Carver ES project were approved with the Board's unanimous vote in favor of *Resolution 6a*.

At the Chairman's request, Mr. Luckie discussed management's recommendation for a release of funds from the program reserve, contract award and final project charter for the Paterson New Roberto Clemente ES emergent project. He reported that the 109,000 square foot New Roberto Clemente Community School (the School) in the Paterson School District currently educates 682 students in grades 6 through 8. He noted that a CO for the School was issued on June 15, 2006. He said that, after conditions at the School were determined to constitute an emergent project and DOE approval was received, the district provided SDA staff with information needed to develop a scope of work to address the conditions. Mr. Luckie advised the Members that, after analyzing the information provided by the district, SDA staff performed additional site visits to assess the identified conditions which involve power abnormalities and delamination of the flooring and intumescent paint. He advised the Board that, using the Design Consultant Services Task Order Contract, SDA issued a limited NTP on June 18, 2015 to EI Associates, Architects & Engineers, PA (EI) to perform a power quality study to verify the cause of the power fluctuations and recommend corrective action. Mr. Luckie said that, based on the EI report, SDA determined that the most appropriate approach for addressing the conditions at the School, given the School's calendar, is to advance the project through the SDA's General Construction Task Order (GCTO) Contract. He informed the Members that the package would be awarded on a time and materials basis by way of a rotational assignment to TCI Construction & Management Company, Inc. (TCI) who has confirmed its interest in the project. He said that the proposed final project charter represents the project budget inclusive of all not-to-exceed (NTE) dollar values for the award for construction, appropriate contingency, allowances, SDA staff costs, other costs, and prior allotment of funds. Mr. Luckie added that SDA staff has reviewed TCI's cost proposal for this most extensive solution, in the NTE amount of \$1,755,475, and determined that it is reasonable for the elements included in the scope of work. He added that \$2,486,344 would be released from the program reserve maintained for emergent projects. Ms. Milsted then provided the Members with additional project background details.

A resolution pertaining to this matter had been provided to the Board in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Nixon and seconded by Mr. Vargas, the release of funds from the program reserve, contract award and final project charter for the Paterson New Roberto Clemente ES emergent project were approved with the Board's unanimous vote in favor of *Resolution 6b*.

At the Chairman's request, Mr. Luckie discussed management's recommendation for a release of funds from the program reserve, contract award and final project charter for the Salem MS emergent project. He reported that the Salem MS (the School) in the Salem City School District is a 101,800 square foot facility educating 432 students in grades 3 through 8. He said that in September 2016, a suspended acoustical panel ceiling at the School collapsed along with the lighting fixtures attached to it and the original plaster ceiling above it. He informed the Members that following a review by the district's Architect of Record and the DCA, the building was declared an unsafe structure and the district was required to vacate the building and relocate the students. Mr. Luckie advised the Board that, in October 2016, DOE, SDA and district staff

along with their consultants conducted an inspection and DOE subsequently issued preconstruction approval for an emergent project to address the ceiling conditions. He said that,
based on this review and the results of additional site visits, SDA has determined that the most
appropriate, efficient and timely way to address the emergent condition is to advance the project
utilizing the SDA's GCTO Contract. He added that this GCTO engagement would provide
design services, including development of architectural and structural details and documents and
construction services. Mr. Luckie advised that the package would be awarded on a time and
materials basis by way of a rotational assignment to Santorini Construction, Inc. (Santorini) who
has confirmed its interest in the project. He said that SDA staff reviewed the cost proposal in the
NTE amount of \$1,684,660, and determined that it was reasonable for the elements included in
the scope of work. He said that management recommends that SDA proceed with the issuance of
a task order to Santorini. Mr. Luckie reported that the final charter presented to the Board
represents the project budget inclusive of NTE dollar values for the award for construction,
appropriate contingency, allowances, SDA staff costs and other costs. He said that \$2,330,169
would be released from the program reserve maintained for emergent projects.

Mr. Luckie advised the Board that, after selection of the appropriate solution to address the emergent condition, the SDA program operations division will inform the Board of that selection and provide updated project cost information within the approved NTE value.

A resolution pertaining to this matter had been provided to the Board in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas and seconded by Mr. Maloney, the release of funds from the program reserve, contract award and final project charter for the Salem MS emergent project were approved with the Board's unanimous vote in favor of *Resolution 6c*.

Public Comments

The Chairman then opened the Public Comments portion of the meeting. The Chairman called on Mr. Frank Faras, a resident of the City of Trenton, to address the Board. Mr. Faras advised the Board that he lives across the street from the TCHS site. He said that since no feasibility study was performed in connection with the cost of refurbishing TCHS vs. new school construction, he did some research into this issue in other jurisdictions. He said that he reviewed the American Institute of Architects (AIA) and the Bureau of Labor Statistics materials and focused on projects constructed in an area geographically similar to New Jersey and with a similar construction cost structure, namely Pennsylvania. He said that the AIA sent him information regarding 24 different schools that had been renovated in Pennsylvania in recent years, at a cost 10% to 50% less than what the cost of building a new school would have been. He said that some of these schools were originally built in the late 1800s and 1920s, similar to TCHS. He said that some of the schools also had water infiltration problems and were in worse condition than (the old) TCHS was. Mr. Faras said that, as a taxpayer, he believes that SDA is not spending his money properly. He said that, since there is no feasibility study, SDA is wasting taxpayer dollars. He said that he can only conclude that the reason for this is either incompetence or malfeasance.

The Chairman then asked Mr. Jerell Blakeley to address the Board. Mr. Blakeley said that he is a campaign organizer with the Healthy Schools Now Coalition and the NJ Work Environment Council. He stated that, as he has said previously, he believes that every student deserves access to healthy, safe and modern school facilities. He said that the Coalition agrees with the construction of the new TCHS. He thanked the Board and the SDA for building the new TCHS and expressed the appreciation of the Healthy Schools Now Coalition as well. He

then implored the Board to consider new construction for the Trenton Central HS West campus. Additionally, he expressed his appreciation for the upcoming work at the Salem MS, advising that the Coalition has been working closely with the unions and community in Salem to facilitate a swift remediation there. Mr. Blakeley said that he is before the Board today to inquire about the results of the latest round of emergent project requests. He asked when the list would be released and when work on the successful requests would begin. Additionally, Mr. Blakeley inquired as to what percentage of projects has been approved vs. all submitted requests and information as to why the number approved is lower than the total number of projects submitted. Mr. Yosha said that the DOE is close to finalizing its determination regarding the submitted requests for potential new emergent projects. He said that the percentage approved cannot be addressed until after the list has been finalized and that this is expected to happen in the near future. He explained that, once the list is finalized, letters will go out to the districts notifying them which projects have been approved and which projects have not been approved for advancement. Mr. Yosha then offered some general comments as to why certain projects might not advance, i.e. they involve maintenance issues and are not emergent in nature or are capital projects. In closing, Mr. Blakeley asked to be notified when the emergent project results are finalized. Mr. Yosha agreed.

Ms. Kelly then announced that the Board would be adjourning into Executive Session to discuss a contractual matter pertaining to the New Brunswick Paul Robeson ES project and issues pertaining to the Salem MS project. She said that neither matter will require Board action today.

Thereafter, upon motion by the Chairman and with unanimous consent, the meeting adjourned into Executive Session.

Following discussion in Executive Session, the Board returned to Open Session.

Adjournment

There being no further business to come before the Board, Mr. Walsh asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting. Upon motion by the Chairman and with unanimous consent, the meeting was adjourned.

Contract Extension for 2017 and 2018 Financial Statement Audits

The Members of the Authority are recommended to approve a two-year extension of the contract with Ernst & Young LLP ("EY" or "Consultant") for independent auditor services. All services for the initial three-year term of the agreement have been performed by EY covering the annual financial statement audits for calendar years 2014 through 2016. The contract also provides for, at the sole option of the Authority, two one-year extensions covering the 2017 and 2018 calendar year audits.

Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended on March 7, 2012, Board approval is required for the exercise of contract options requesting extension(s) to the original contract term for Board-approved contracts. The Board previously approved the EY contract in September 2014.

Background

By way of background, pursuant to Executive Order No. 122 ("EO 122"), the Audit Committee shall assist the Board in retaining an independent auditor to conduct an audit of the Authority's financial statements by making a recommendation to the Board after engaging in the auditor selection process delineated in EO 122. In accordance with EO 122, the auditor selection process shall take place no less than once every five years, and shall be based upon public, competitive bidding principles.

In 2014, the Audit Committee engaged in a competitive procurement process, which resulted in the Audit Committee recommending to the Board the award of a contract to EY for independent auditor services. In September 2014, by and through the Audit Committee, the Board ratified the Audit Committee's recommendation by approving the award of a contract to EY.

¹ In order to ensure the independence of the auditor selection process, an evaluation committee, consisting of no less than three Board members, shall be established by the Board to conduct the solicitation and evaluation of eligible auditors. The role of staff of the Authority shall be limited to providing assistance with the RFP design.

The scope of services set forth in the contract provides that the Consultant conduct an annual audit of the Authority's financial statements and shall review the results of such financial statement audit with the Authority's management and the Audit Committee. Additionally, as set forth in the agreement, the independent auditor shall review with the Audit Committee the annual management letter discussing, among other things, any audit issues or internal control weaknesses identified during the audit.

INTRODUCTION

At the March 7, 2012 NJSDA Board Meeting, the Members approved the Authority's 2012 Capital Plan. That Plan identified a project to address facilities conditions deficiencies at the Hoboken School District's Thomas G. Connors Elementary School (Connors School). Working with representatives of the Hoboken School District, the City of Hoboken and the New Jersey Department of Education (DOE), SDA's staff and Site Consultant (SC) have reviewed and validated District needs and we have identified an alternative solution to best address those needs. We are writing to advise the Members of the SDA staff's recommendation for advancement of a project at the A.J. Demarest School (Demarest School) which shall serve as an alternative to advancement of a project at the Connors School.

BACKGROUND

The Connors School is a 64,170 square foot facility, built in 1908, educating 314 students in grades PK-6. The A.J. Demarest School is a 79,691 square foot facility, built in 1910, with a capacity of 450 students.

Working Group Activities

A Working Group comprised of District, DOE and SDA staff was convened to review and validate current District needs and review the proposed Connors School project. Significantly, the validation process has included a review of the flooding history at the Connors School, the effects of weather events upon the facility and current Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) classification.

During the course of project validation it was determined that the Connors School is located entirely within a 100 year floodplain area designated by FEMA as a "Special Flood Hazard Area - High Risk". The Connors School experienced basement flooding and extensive damage during Super Storm Sandy and is prone to other flooding events based upon discussion with the District. Due to regulatory limitations imposed by virtue of the facility's location within a "Special Flood Hazard Area - High Risk," the value and extent of renovations that may be completed at the facility are greatly diminished and would result in a reduction of the facility's educational capacity. The reduction in capacity is due to the need to relocate existing mechanical equipment contained within the basement of the facility to a higher floor to mitigate against potential future flooding events.

Due to the impact resulting from the regulatory limitations affecting the Connors School, as well as the general concerns of investing in a building that is prone to flooding, the Working Group conducted an assessment of the Demarest School, which is located within close proximity to the Connors School and currently houses District administrative offices and space leased to a Pre-K community provider and a Charter School operator. The Working Group review preliminarily determined that the Demarest School

is capable of being utilized as a replacement for the Connors School based upon capacity, core group spaces, facility conditions, cost and FEMA floodplain classification.

The majority of the Demarest School is located within the 500 year floodplain defined by FEMA as an area of minimal flood hazard. During Super Storm Sandy the Demarest School experienced no flooding and incurred no damage. However, based upon current mapping a small portion of the Demarest School site is located within the 100 year floodplain. In February 2016 SDA staff informed Members of the School Review Committee of factors related to the Connors and Demarest facilities and in June 2016 engaged a Site Consultant to undertake a series of focused investigations at the Demarest School to determine the ability to mitigate against any impacts of a portion of the property being located within the 100 year floodplain.

Based upon the results of the Site Consultant's investigations and in consultation with the District and the City's local flood hazard administrator it has been determined that a limited scope of dry flood proofing of the Demarest School, in accordance with Federal, State and Local regulations would serve to mitigate the impacts of the portion of the property located within the 100 year floodplain. Doing so will render reasonable the advancement of a comprehensive facility condition deficiency project at the facility.

It is expected that a project at the Demarest School may include work on the building's mechanical systems, work to address other facility conditions, as well as work necessary to implement the District's educational programs. The scope of work will be more fully developed following the engagement of a design consultant and the completion of pre-design services. The estimated funding necessary to implement the anticipated work at the facility is consistent with the estimated costs that had been allocated for work at the Connors School.

AMENDMENT TO CAPITAL PLAN - PROJECT SUBSTITUTION

For the reasons described above, we recommend advancement of a project at the Demarest School to serve as a substitution for the previously identified project at the Connors School.

RECOMMENDATION

The Members of the Authority are requested to approve the amendment to the NJSDA's Capital Plan to substitute the Demarest School for advancement in place of the previously identified Connors School. In so doing, the Board is providing the Authority with approval to procure necessary professional services in relationship to this project. The Operating Authority will govern the award of all professional services contracts.

INTRODUCTION:

I am writing to recommend approval of the release of funds from the Program Reserve maintained for emergent projects and emergency situations to address an emergent condition at the Hawthorne Avenue School in Newark. This project is being advanced pursuant to NJSDA delegation for District management consistent with statutory and regulatory provisions. The release of funding requested is \$1,758,000.

Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010 as amended on March 7, 2012, Board approval is required for the release of funds from the Program Reserve for emergent projects or emergency situations exceeding \$500,000. The funding requested to address the emergent project at this school exceeds \$500,000.

BACKGROUND:

The Hawthorne Avenue School, built in 1895, is an approximately 81,000 square foot facility that educates 390 students in grades Pre-K to 8. As a result of joint NJSDA and NJDOE site visits conducted in the Newark School District to review potential emergent conditions within the district, the NJDOE issued Pre-Construction Approval on July 18, 2012 for an emergent project to address conditions related to the building's exterior masonry and roofing system. Considerations supporting the decision to delegate included the District's successful prior management of similar emergent projects and recognition of the lack of complexity of this project.

After receipt of Pre-Construction Approval from the NJDOE, the NJSDA issued a grant offer to the District to allow for the advancement of the project. Upon receipt of necessary documentation from the District the grant agreement was executed on March 18, 2013. Subsequent to the execution of the grant the project was placed on hold pending the District resolution of the planned future use for the facility as it undertook District-wide assessment of its buildings and potential consolidation of facilities. Upon the

completion of that review the District informed SDA in May, 2016 that the Hawthorne Avenue Elementary School would continue to be utilized as a school facility for the foreseeable future and the masonry and roof needed to be addressed for the continued operation of the school.

The District engaged CTS Group Architecture and Planning to review the emergent condition and develop a scope of work to address the exterior masonry and roofing system. Due to the age and deteriorated condition of the building's exterior masonry and roof, the architect's recommended scope calls for extensive repairs to the exterior masonry over the entire building, repairs to brick parapet walls, and selective lintel repairs and re-pointing of mortar joints. The scope of work also includes replacement of the existing roofing system. The scope has been reviewed by NJSDA staff to ensure it adequately addresses the identified condition and does not include work above that required to remedy the condition. Based upon the construction cost estimate and estimated costs for professional services and other costs that have been reviewed by the NJSDA, the cost of the project including appropriate contingency is \$1,758,000:

INTRODUCTION

I am writing to recommend approval by the Members of the Authority of Change Order No. 1 in the amount of \$160,213.49 to address a modification to the scope of work necessary to address a condensation condition at the Egg Harbor Township High School in the Egg Harbor Township School District (District). Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended March 7, 2012, a change order which singularly exceeds \$500,000 or singularly or in the aggregate is greater than 10% of the contract value requires approval by the Members of the Authority. Change Order No. 1 exceeds 10% of the contract value.

I am also requesting approval from the Members of the Authority to establish the adjusted construction contract value as the baseline construction contract value for the purpose of the application of ongoing Operating Authority requirements. The reestablished value for this purpose shall be the contract value inclusive of Change Order No. 1.

BACKGROUND

In May 2012, Sambe Construction Inc. (Sambe) completed a 115,000 square foot addition to the existing Egg Harbor Township High School located in Egg Harbor Township. The addition included the construction and installation of a standing seam metal roof. The ceilings of upper floor classrooms and other locations have exhibited moisture damage due to condensation.

NJSDA believes the condensation problems are the result of a combination of design errors and omissions and construction defects related to the standing seam metal roof design and installation. Litigation with Sambe and, separately, the Project's design consultant is addressing responsibility for the condensation condition and for the payment of the costs of design and construction required to remedy the condition.

To effectively address the condition, the NJSDA engaged a contractor through the NJSDA General Construction Services Task Order (GCTO) procurement process to delineate the existing facilities conditions, to develop and assess corrective options and to advance the most appropriate scope of work for the correction of the deficiencies identified.

GC Task Order and Task Order Issuance

At the August 3, 2016 Board Meeting, the Members of the Authority approved the use of the GCTO Contract. The GCTO Contract has been structured so that the Authority has a pool of contractors to perform certain work. Overall, no individual task order can exceed \$3 million and no individual firm can receive more than \$5 million of work per region during the duration of the pool. Bidders were required to select a region (North, South, or both) for task order assignments and accept the defined cost multiplier of 1.10, as decided by the Authority, for use in establishing compensation for those task order assignments to be performed, at least for the initial phases, on a time and materials basis. GCTO work may also be assigned on a lump sum basis after competitive bidding among Task Order Contractors.

NJSDA determined to advance the remedial work by way of a GCTO rotational assignment. Procurement staff contacted Delric Construction Company, Inc. (Delric) on December 7, 2016, and confirmed its interest in the project.

On March 1, 2017, the Members of the Authority approved the award of the construction contract to Delric for a N.T.E. value in the amount of \$1,141,371.00.

SCOPE OF WORK

Beginning December 15, 2016 through January 31, 2017 site visits were conducted with Delric to review the school building's roof and other conditions, and discuss appropriate options to perform the corrective work to address and fully remedy the condensation condition that currently exists. NJSDA staff instructed Delric to engage a design consultant necessary for

developing a proposal, cost estimate and schedule that recognizes an approach to first defining and then implementing the appropriate action(s) to address the non-compliant conditions, as follows:

- Review the existing facility conditions and plans to evaluate potential appropriate solutions for corrective work;
- Perform a conditions assessment and provide a conditions assessment report;
- Develop up to three (3) alternate solutions for NJSDA review and consideration to remedy the conditions and corresponding cost and schedule estimates;
- Deliver to NJSDA a Draft Report, providing recommended corrective action and a construction cost proposal inclusive of all specified services and deliverables related to:
 - 1. Investigation Activities
 - 2. Reports
 - 3. Design Activities
 - 4. Construction Services, and
 - 5. Schedule
- Perform Construction Services consistent with NJSDA-selected solution;
- Prepare plans and specifications to secure construction permits and prepare record set drawings/plans at the completion of the project.

REASON FOR CHANGE

After review by the NJSDA of Delric's Conditions Report, the NJSDA initially selected a construction solution that included:

- Removal of the existing standing seam metal roof panels and insulation;
- Installation of a new single four (4) inch layer of rigid insulation board;
- Installation of a continuous vapor barrier; and
- Installation of a new standing seam metal roof.

After further consideration, and for preventive purposes, we believe the following additional scope items are an appropriate adjustment:

- Installation of new roofing board over existing metal deck with continuous vapor barrier;
- Installation of a second layer of rigid insulation board, chemically bonded to the first layer with joints staggered to eliminate air infiltration

All documents supporting this change order have been reviewed by the associated NJSDA Project Team members as well as the Program Director, Deputy Program Director of Program Operations and Contract Management Division (CMD) for adherence to current NJSDA policy and procedures. All reviewing NJSDA staff members, including CMD, have determined that the change order is justified and that the amount is reasonable and appropriate.

WHEREAS, the Operating Authority of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority (SDA or the Authority) provides that change orders that singularly exceed \$500,000 or singularly or in the aggregate are greater than 10% of the contract value requires approval by the Members of the Authority; and

WHEREAS, in May 2012, Sambe Construction Inc. (Sambe) completed a 115,000 square foot addition to the existing Egg Harbor Township High School (EHTHS) in the Egg Harbor Township School District which included the construction and installation of a standing seam metal roof; and

WHEREAS, the ceilings of upper floor classrooms and other locations at EHTHS exhibited moisture damage due to condensation; and

WHEREAS, such condensation problems were determined to be the result of design errors and omissions and construction defects with the result that litigation was filed in connection with the matter; and

WHEREAS, during the pendency of the litigation, it was determined imperative that the underlying condensation condition be addressed (the Project); and

WHEREAS, in August 2016, the SDA Board approved the Authority's use of its General Construction Services Task Order (GCTO) contract to delineate the existing facilities conditions at EHTHS, to develop and assess corrective options and to advance the most appropriate scope of work for the correction of the deficiencies identified; and

WHEREAS, on December 7, 2016, Delric Construction Company, Inc. (Delric), the next contractor in the GCTO rotation, confirmed its interest in the project; and

WHEREAS, between December 15, 2016 and January 31, 2017, site visits were conducted to review the building's roof and other conditions and to discuss appropriate options to perform the corrective work; and

WHEREAS, on February 3, 2017, Delric provided the SDA with a cost estimate to complete the entirety of the scope of work; and

WHEREAS, the recommended award in the not-to-exceed amount of \$1,141,371 and approved by the Members of the Authority on March 1, 2017, represented Delric's cost proposal for the most extensive solution for the required corrective work to address the non-compliant condition related to the metal roof; and

WHEREAS, on May 25, 2017, the SDA received the final emergent conditions report from Delric outlining three (3) corrective options to remedy the existing roof condition per Delric's scope of work; and

WHEREAS, SDA determined that Option No. 2 was the best option to address the roof work; and

WHEREAS, this final recommended and accepted option includes additional scope of work above and beyond the option that Delric had used as the basis for the Project cost proposal; and

WHEREAS, it is therefore necessary to revise the Project's scope and to authorize the issuance of Change Order No. 1 in order to provide additional funds in the amount of \$160,213.49 to advance the Project; and

WHEREAS, Change Order No. 1, in the amount of \$160,213.49, is greater than 10% of the contract value and thus requires Board approval; and

WHEREAS, all documents supporting this change order have been reviewed by the associated SDA project team members as well as the associated program operations director and deputy director and the contract management division for adherence to current SDA policy and procedures and all reviewing SDA staff members have determined that the change order is justified and that the amount is reasonable and appropriate; and

WHEREAS, management further recommends that the Board authorize and approve establishment of the adjusted construction contract value as the baseline construction contract value for the purpose of the application of ongoing operating authority requirements, with such reestablished value equaling the contract value inclusive of Change Order No. 1; and

WHEREAS, the Project background, Project scope and reason for the change are described in detail in the memorandum presented to the Board on this date and incorporated herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Members of the Authority hereby authorize and approve Change Order No. 1 in the amount of \$160,213.49 to modify the scope of remedial work to address a roof condition at the Egg Harbor Township High School in the Egg Harbor Township School District consistent with the memorandum presented to the Board on this date and incorporated herein.

Vendor Services staff continues to participate at mandatory pre-bid and pre-construction meetings to instruct and inform bidders regarding SDA's SBE goals, policies and procedures, including:

- Small Business Enterprise subcontracting goal of 25% of all contracts
- County workforce goals for minorities and females
- Detailed process procedures to monitor and track the progress made toward these goals throughout the life cycle of each project

At these meetings, vendors are strongly encouraged to identify and hire minority-owned and womenowned firms, as well as locally-based enterprises, for diverse business participation on all school building projects. Additional outreach strategies are discussed and utilized.

SMALL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (SBE) COMPLIANCE MONITORING

The SDA regularly exceeds the State-mandated 25% SBE goal. The total SDA contract dollars awarded through April 30, 2017 was \$68,490,221. The figures below demonstrate compliance with this requirement.

On June 13, the SDA hosted a community meeting to discuss the upcoming construction work associated with the new Seaman Avenue Elementary School in Perth Amboy.

SDA staff also attended community meetings in Camden on June 21, 2017 to provide an update on the new Camden High School project.

Salem City Tour

CEO Charles McKenna joined Senator Steve Sweeney and local officials on a tour of the St. Mary's School, a former parochial school in Salem City. This facility is being considered as potential swing space to accommodate some of the students who were displaced following a ceiling collapse at the Salem Middle School.

SUBJECT: Monthly Financial Report - May 2017

The Office of the Chief Financial Officer is providing the attached monthly financial report to the Members of the Authority for their information. Included on pages 1 and 2 of this report is a "Financial Summary" of the Authority's activities for the year. On pages, 3 and 4 of the report is a summary of the Authority's operating expenditures. Page 5 contains a breakdown of the Authority's headcount information by department/division. The basic financial statements follow on pages 6 and 7.

Year-to-Date <u>Authority Operating Expenses</u> (Actual vs. Budget)

For May 2017 year to date, Authority operating expenses, **\$9.7 million**, are **down \$1.0 million as** compared to the operating budget for the *corresponding period*. The deviation of actual expenses versus budget is due to:

- Lower salary & benefit costs **\$884K.** The Authority is currently 19 FTEs under budget. This variance is offset by the year to date allocation of payroll expense to project cost that is lower than projected, **(\$391K)**;
- Lower MIS spending for system hardware and MIS projects \$189K.

Year-to-Date Authority Operating Expenses (Actual vs. Prior Year Actual)

For May 2017 year to date, Authority operating expenses, **\$9.7 million**, are **\$954K** higher as compared to the corresponding prior year. This variance is primarily due to the impact of a non-cash accrual for pension expense recorded for GASB 68.

Year-to-Date School Facilities Project Expenditures (Actual vs. Forecast)

For May 2017 year to date, project expenditures, \$157.5 million, are higher by \$17.4 million as compared to the capital-spending forecast for the *corresponding period*. The variance is due to increased activity in construction work \$2.9M, school furniture, fixtures and equipment \$4.6M, and grants \$14.7M. The variance is offset by decreased spending in property acquisitions \$1.6M and other project related costs \$3.2M.

Year-to-Date School Facilities Project Expenditures (Actual vs. Prior Year Actual)

For May 2017 year to date, project expenditures, \$157.5 million, have increased by \$2.2 million as compared to the *corresponding prior year*. This variance is primarily due to spending increases in grants \$24M. Offsetting these cost increases are spending reductions in construction \$18M and other project related costs \$3.8M.

Other

Since program inception, 78.4% of the funds authorized for the SDA Districts have been disbursed. Additionally, since program inception 96% of all SDA disbursements relate to school facilities projects and 4% relate to operating expense.

The estimated value of active school facilities projects is approximately \$2.2B.
