## APPROVAL OF MEETING MINUTES

# SEPTEMBER 6, 2017 OPEN SESSION

## NEW JERSEY SCHOOLS DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 6, 2017

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority (SDA or the Authority) was held on Wednesday, September 6, 2017 at 9:00 A.M. at the offices of the Authority at 32 East Front Street, Trenton, New Jersey.

being a quorum of the Board. Mr. Egan, Ms. Lemelle, Mr. Piaia and Mr. Rijksen participated in the meeting by teleconference.

At the Chairman's request, Charles McKenna, chief executive officer (by teleconference), Andrew Yosha, executive vice president; Jane F. Kelly, vice president and assistant secretary; Donald Guarriello, vice president and chief financial officer; Manuel Da Silva, vice president; Albert Barnes, chief counsel; Sean Murphy, director; and Karon Simmonds, director of the SDA, participated in the meeting. Thomas Huth of the Governor's Authorities Unit also participated in the meeting by teleconference.

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman of the Board, Mr. Walsh, who requested that Ms. Kelly read the requisite notice of the meeting. Ms. Kelly announced that the meeting notice had been sent to the *Trenton Times* and *Star-Ledger* at least 48 hours prior to the meeting, and had been duly posted on the Secretary of State's bulletin board at 33 West State Street in Trenton, New Jersey. Ms. Kelly then conducted a roll call and indicated that a quorum of the Members was present.

## **Approval of Meeting Minutes**

Mr. Walsh presented for consideration and approval the minutes of the Board's August 2, 2017 Open and Executive Session meetings. A copy of both meetings' minutes and a resolution had been provided to the Members for review in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas and seconded by Mr. Luckie, the August 2, 2017 Open and Executive Session meeting minutes were approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Resolution 3a/3b*.

#### **Authority Matters**

## CEO Report

At the Chairman's request, Mr. Yosha provided the Members with the report of the CEO. Mr. Yosha began his report with an update on the Trenton Central HS (TCHS) project. He said that structural steel installation is nearly complete, and roofing, exterior sheathing and concrete masonry unit installation work is ongoing. He reported that SDA staff has submitted the final building design, incorporating prior Department of Community Affairs (DCA) comments, to DCA. He noted that SDA staff would discuss potential project schedule changes later in the meeting.

With respect to the Bridgeton Buckshutem Road ES and Quarter Mile Lane ES projects, Mr. Yosha said that SDA staff has completed both projects and is currently closing them out. With regard to the Camden HS project, he reminded the Members that the Board approved a demolition services award at the August Board meeting. He said that SDA staff issued a final determination addressing a protest received from another bidder, and issued a notice of award this past Friday (September 1) to USA Environmental Management Inc.

Mr. Yosha reported that the design-builder has initiated the design phase for the East Orange George Washington Carver ES project. With respect to the Elizabeth New ES project, he said that the school would open pursuant to a temporary certificate of occupancy (TCO). He added that the exact date is tied into TCO issuance and that this is expected this week. He noted that the auditorium and three music rooms would be excluded from the TCO and that work will be completed in those spaces by the end of the month.

Next, Mr. Yosha gave an update on the Garfield James Madison ES No. 10 project. He reported that exterior veneer work, mechanical, electrical and plumbing rough-in work and exterior grading work are all approximately 65% complete. He said that preparation work has begun for the installation of the vapor mitigation system and concrete slab on grade. He added that roofing work is scheduled to begin this month.

With respect to the Harrison New ES project, Mr. Yosha informed the Members that Brockwell & Carrington's design for footings and foundation work is under review by DCA. He said that the design for the remainder of the project is under review by the SDA prior to its submission to DCA. With regard to the Irvington Madison Avenue ES project, he reported that design phase services continue. He said that the general contractor has begun construction activities associated with the building's foundation.

Mr. Yosha said that design development phase services are ongoing for the Keansburg Port Monmouth Road ES project. For the addition and renovations project at the Millville HS, he reported that Hall Construction (Hall), the design-builder, continues with on-site investigations to confirm existing conditions. He said that a recommendation of award for construction management (CM) services is on today's agenda.

In continuing, Mr. Yosha reported that, for the New Brunswick Paul Robeson ES project, masonry, HVAC, electrical and plumbing work is ongoing and window installation in the addition is approximately 90% complete. For the Newark South Street ES project, he said that rooftop HVAC, rough electrical and plumbing, roofing, windows and exterior brick installation work is ongoing.

Turning to projects in the Orange School District, Mr. Yosha reported that, for the Cleveland ES project, the design consultant is finalizing the design development phase. He said that the site improvements contractor has completed abatement and demolition work. He noted that remaining site work is ongoing and staff expects it to be complete by the end of the month. He said that the design consultant continues design development work for the Orange HS project.

Next, Mr. Yosha gave an update on projects in the Passaic School District. He reported that, for the Leonard Place ES project, review of final design is nearing completion and SDA staff expects to issue the notice-to-proceed (NTP) for remaining building construction this month. He advised the Board that SDA staff advertised the design-build services package in mid-June for the Dayton Avenue Educational Campus project, adding that interested bidders are submitting questions. Mr. Yosha informed the Members that SDA staff adjusted the due date for

receipt of technical and price proposals to October 5, 2017, an adjustment suited to the complexity of the project.

Mr. Yosha reported that the demolition contractor has begun abatement work for the Paterson Union Avenue MS project (former site of Don Bosco Academy). For the Pemberton Denbo Crichton ES project, he said that temporary space is being readied for the upcoming school year and abatement work has begun. He noted that SDA staff expects to advertise a solicitation for design-build services later this month.

Mr. Yosha informed the Members that, for the Perth Amboy Seaman Avenue ES project, design phase services, site utility, curb installation and dynamic compaction work is ongoing. He added that footings and foundation work is scheduled to start this month. For the Vineland New MS project, he said that masonry, steel erection, roofing, electrical, plumbing, HVAC and site work is ongoing. He added that window installation work has commenced. He said that the West New York Harry L. Bain PS No. 6 project is substantially complete and that SDA staff participated in a ribbon-cutting ceremony the previous day to mark the reopening of the school.

Turning next to ongoing procurement activity, Mr. Yosha said that, later in the meeting, procurement staff would be presenting a construction management services award for the Millville HS project, along with site consultant services task order contract awards, and an OCIP IV broker services award. He said that other activity currently underway includes procurements for design-build services for the Passaic Dayton Avenue Educational Campus project, legal services, and business, real estate property & casualty insurance broker services.

Reporting on events, outreach and other SDA activities, Mr. Yosha again reported that, on September 5, SDA joined the West New York School District for a school re-opening ribbon

cutting ceremony for the Harry L. Bain ES. He said that SDA completed significant rehabilitation work at the school.

Mr. Yosha informed the Members that SDA staff expects to join Jersey City School District officials and students for a ribbon cutting ceremony to celebrate the opening of the new Patricia M. Noonan ES. He said that staff would advise the Members when that event is scheduled. He added that Communications staff is also working to schedule a ribbon cutting ceremony for the new Halloran ES in Elizabeth as well as groundbreaking ceremonies for the Perth Amboy Seaman Avenue School and Irvington Madison Avenue ES.

#### Audit Committee

The Chairman then requested that Mr. Nixon provide the report of the Audit Committee. Mr. Nixon reported that the Audit Committee met on August 21, 2017. He said that management provided the Committee with the June-July 2017 New Funding Allocation and Capital Plan Update. He advised the Board that the only SDA District Reserve Balance that experienced a change was the 2011 Emergent Projects Reserve Balance which decreased by \$6.9 million due to the release of funds for the Salem City MS structural ceiling repair project and emergent projects at the Paterson New Roberto Clemente ES, Newark Hawthorne Avenue ES, and Plainfield Cook ES. Additionally, he reported that the reserve balance for the Regular Operating Districts (RODs) increased by \$2 million during the reporting period due to reductions in state share for grant projects nearing completion.

Next, Mr. Nixon advised the Members that the Board will be asked to consider and act with respect to one item—a contract award for Owner Controlled Insurance Program (OCIP IV) Broker Services. Mr. Nixon referenced material that previously had been distributed for Board review. He advised that the current OCIP III is due to expire on March 1, 2018. He described

the full range of broker services to be provided as part of the new OCIP program. He said that, if approved, the marketing results and cost of OCIP IV would be presented separately to the Members, and the Authority would then direct the broker to purchase the insurance policies and perform the policy and claim services. Mr. Nixon explained that the RFP was advertised beginning on June 1, 2017 and was based on approximately 13 capital projects with an aggregate construction cost estimate (CCE) of \$845 million, plus another \$25-\$50 million in emergent project work. He reported that the top ranked firm at the completion of the process was Willis Towers Watson/Willis of New York, Inc. (Willis). He said that the award is for the not-toexceed amount of \$398,315. He said that the Members are requested to approve the contract award to Willis with the engagement to begin upon issuance of the initial NTP for marketing services. He said that the engagement would extend for a period of three (3) additional years from the effective date of the various new OCIP policies or until all obligations of the consultant to deliver services have been performed, whichever occurs later. Mr. Nixon said that if the actual enrolled CCE proves to be 10% greater up to \$1 billion, a negotiated compensation fee has been determined. Accordingly, he said that the Members also are requested to approve a cost not-to-exceed \$40,000 for a policy administration contingency. Ms. Simmonds said that she was pleased with the procurement process and outcome. Mr. Vargas asked if the Authority has ever worked with Willis before. Ms. Simmonds responded that Willis was the broker for the Authority's OCIP I program and that the team servicing this contract is the same team that has been handling the New York construction program for approximately the last fifteen years.

A resolution pertaining to this matter had been provided to the Board in advance of the meeting. After discussion, upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas and seconded by Mr. Hassett,

the contract award for OCIP IV Broker Services to Willis Towers Watson/Willis of New York, Inc. was approved with the Board's unanimous vote in favor of *Resolution 5a*.

Mr. Nixon reported that, at the Committee's meeting, the Authority's internal auditing unit had presented one audit to the Committee. He then provided the July 2017 Monthly Financial Report. He advised that the Authority's operating expenses (Actual vs. Budget) for the year-to-date period totaled \$12.3 million, which is down \$1.8 million as compared to the budget for the corresponding period. He explained that the decrease is mainly attributable to lower salary and benefit costs. He said that school facilities project expenditures (Actual vs. Forecast) for the year-to-date period total \$215.2 million and are \$14.9 million higher as compared to the capital-spending forecast for the corresponding period. Mr. Nixon then reported that project expenditures (Actual vs. Prior Year Actual), at \$215.2 million, are \$6 million lower as compared to the corresponding prior year period. He explained that the variance is due to decreased spending on construction-related activity (\$18.7 million), school furniture and equipment (\$2.2 million) and other project related costs (\$2.3 million), offset by an increase in grants (\$19.3 million). Mr. Nixon then reported that, since program inception, approximately 78.4% of the funds allocated for SDA districts have been disbursed. Additionally, he said that, since program inception, 96% of all SDA disbursements relate to school facilities projects, while 4% relate to operating expenses. He advised that the estimated value of current school facilities project activity is approximately \$2.2 billion.

Finally, Mr. Nixon said that management had advised the Committee that the 2017 Budget Reforecast shows a negligible change from the \$22.9 million budget as compared to the approved 2017 Annual Budget. He explained that the two material variances are that: 1) employee salary projections are lower than budgeted due to headcount; and 2) employee benefits

are higher than budgeted due to the accrual portion of future pension expenses necessitated by General Accounting Standards Board (GASB) No. 68.

#### School Review Committee

Construction Manager Award and Approval of Revised Final Project Charter – Millville School District - Millville High School; Approval of Awards - Site Consultant Services – GP-0243-L01; Change Order: Terminal Construction Corporation

Mr. Walsh asked Mr. Luckie to provide the report of the School Review Committee. Mr. Luckie said that the Committee met on August 21, 2017. He said that the first matter for Board consideration involves a construction manager award and revised final project charter in connection with the Millville HS project. He advised the Members that the Millville HS project (the Project) includes additions and renovations to the existing Millville HS. He reminded the Members that, on April 5, 2017, the Board had approved the project's final charter and the award of an \$114,453,000 design-build construction contract to Hall. He said that on May 24, 2017 SDA issued Hall a NTP with design phase services. Mr. Luckie said that management now is seeking Board approval to enter into a contract for CM services. He said that the package for CM services was advertised as a "40% price" and "60% other factors" solicitation beginning June 27, 2017. He advised the Board that, upon completion of the procurement process, management recommends award of a contract in the amount of \$3,255,000 for CM services for the Project to GREYHAWK North America (GREYHAWK). He added that management also is seeking approval of a revision to the final project charter to reflect the actual dollar amount of the CM contract and appropriate contingency. He advised that GREYHAWK has confirmed that its price proposal is inclusive of all scope elements contained in the contract documents.

A resolution pertaining to the CM services procurement had been provided to the Board in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas and seconded by Mr. Nixon,

the construction manager award and revised final charter for the Millville HS project was approved with the Board's unanimous vote in favor of *Resolution 6a*.

Next, at the Chairman's request, Mr. Luckie discussed the recommended awards for site consultant services. He advised the Board that the current task order contracts are due to expire in October 2017. He said that management is seeking Board approval to award contracts to 12 firms, creating a new pool of firms with the experience and qualifications to perform the site consultant services. He noted that each contract would have a three-year term and a not-to-exceed limit of \$3 million. Mr. Luckie said that management's recommendation follows a competitive procurement process, which was described in the memorandum that staff had shared with the Board prior to the meeting. Mr. Murphy briefly discussed the procurement process used and the negotiations that took place with the 12 proposed firms.

A resolution pertaining to the site consultant services procurement had been provided to the Board in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas and seconded by Mr. Walsh, the awards for site consultant services were approved with the Board's unanimous vote in favor of *Resolution 6b*.

Mr. Luckie then discussed a proposed change order for Terminal Construction Corporation (Terminal) in connection with the TCHS project. He said that the new TCHS would be an approximately 374,000 square-foot facility that will educate 1,850 students in grades ten through twelve. He reminded the Members that, in March 2016, the Board approved the project's final charter and the award of a design-build construction contract to Terminal in the amount of \$115,950,000. He said that the contractual substantial completion date for the project was set at June 2, 2019. Mr. Luckie informed the Members that Change Order No. 3 would support delivery of the high school a full year earlier than originally planned by modifying the

contractual substantial completion date by 291 calendar days. He said that this would adjust the June 2, 2019 substantial completion date to August 15, 2018. He advised the Members that, with Board approval, SDA will provide additional compensation in the amount of \$1 million to Terminal to facilitate this schedule adjustment. Mr. Luckie said that SDA executive leadership (chief executive officer) has advised that acceleration of the construction schedule would allow the TCHS students to occupy the new school earlier than originally planned and learn in an environment that is more conducive to the small learning community structure established by the district. He said that executive leadership has also advised that earlier student occupation of the new facility would result in a favorable impact to the project budget through avoidance of temporary facility lease and CM services costs. Mr. Luckie noted that, prior to final approval of Change Order No. 3, SDA will conduct additional due diligence in an effort to ensure the designbuilder's ability to meet the aggressive construction schedule. Mr. McKenna said that the change order would result in savings of approximately \$650,000 through avoidance of swing space lease costs and additional savings through avoidance of CM services costs and furniture storage costs. In terms of potential risk, he said that in February of 2018 the Authority would need to decide whether to renew its swing space leases. He said that if the Authority chooses to go forward with the change order, does not renew the lease and the contractor is late, then SDA will have a high school that is not ready and nowhere to send the children. He also advised the Board that there exists some concern that Hurricane Harvey and the massive Houston rebuilding effort could affect the availability of building materials in a general sense. He also said that staff must engage in additional discussions with the contractor, Terminal, in order to validate its ability to achieve the earlier substantial completion date. He said that such discussions have been held but additional due diligence is required. Mr. Vargas suggested including contingencies or

verbiage about the issues that the Board has discussed in the resolution. Mr. McKenna said that the verbiage should convey that the Authority would relook at this in January 2018 at which time it will be obvious whether sufficient progress has been made such that it can be determined that the earlier substantial completion date truly can be achieved. He said that if Terminal has not met the benchmarks that SDA staff thinks must be met, then the Authority could terminate the change order.

**Resolution 6c.** pertaining to the TCHS schedule adjustment matter had been provided to the Board in advance of the meeting. With an expectation of revisions to that form of resolution to reflect the Board's discussion of the matter and upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas and seconded by Mr. Nixon, Change Order No. 3 for Terminal Construction Corporation was approved upon the Board's unanimous vote.

#### **Public Comments**

The Chairman asked Mr. Billie Hayes, a Trenton resident, to address the Board. Mr. Hayes said that, while he has not appeared before the Board in some time, something has been bothering him about the TCHS project that he would like to bring to the Board's attention.

He said that he recently had occasion to go the TCHS site and observed dust blowing in the parking lot as kids were leaving football practice. In addition, he said that he had observed rocks in the school parking lot, despite the fact that, during the planning phases, the community was told that the parking lot would not be part of the construction site. He also advised the Board that there is a "bump" in Greenwood Avenue, a street adjacent to the project site, which was not there prior to the start of the project. He also expressed concerns with the weeds he observed growing around the perimeter of the trailers located on the construction site, noting the

potential for ticks and bugs as a result. He said that he is present to ask SDA to address these issues.

Specifically, he said that he is asking that SDA install a gate cover around the entire site, pick up the rocks in the parking lot, have the weeds trimmed and pave the Greenwood Avenue bump.

Mr. McKenna (who was participating in the meeting telephonically) responded that, upon his return to New Jersey, he would go to the project site. He assured Mr. Hayes that he would address those issues that can be addressed and provide an explanation for those issues that cannot be addressed.

Mr. Hayes said that he also is concerned about the change order that the Board had approved earlier in the meeting for the TCHS project. He said that he is not in favor of the new TCHS opening with a TCO but, rather, SDA should stick to the original plan. He said that he supports a smooth transition to the new facility and is encouraging the Board to rescind its approval of the change order. Mr. Walsh said that the change order approved by the Board was simply to move things forward. Mr. Hayes again stated his disagreement.

The Chairman then asked Mr. Frank Faras, a resident of the City of Trenton, to come to the podium. Mr. Faras said that he had recently provided a series of links to YouTube videos. He said that he shared these videos with the Members so that they could view the clouds emanating from the TCHS project site and coming across the street every twenty minutes at least five days per week. He described the content of the videos, noting that even when it rains the particulates are so fine that they travel into the neighborhood. He said that, with the tarp in place, the particulates shoot up higher and come into the neighborhood. He said that the manufacturer of the product has indicated that it is carcinogenic and dangerous. He advised that he is living

across from a place that is trying to make him sick. He suggested that SDA staff move the mixers inside the gym or another enclosed space so that the emissions would not come into his neighborhood. He offered to answer any questions the Board might have regarding the videos.

The Chairman then called upon Jerrell Blakeley of the Healthy Schools Now/Work Environment Council to address the Board. Mr. Blakeley said that the Healthy Schools Now Coalition believes that all students deserve a healthy, safe school environment. He said that, also as a TCHS graduate himself, he believes that the current TCHS students have been split up for too long and denied the normal high school experience, so the sooner that the students are in the new TCHS facility, the better. He expressed his support for an August 2018 substantial completion date. Mr. McKenna expressed again his intent to look into the concerns raised by Mr. Hayes.

## Adjournment

There being no further business to come before the Board, Mr. Walsh asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting. Upon motion by the Chairman and with unanimous consent, the meeting was adjourned.

#### INTRODUCTION

The NJSDA previously procured legal services in 2008, 2011, 2013 and 2015 to complement legal support provided to the NJSDA through its Division of Chief Counsel and through the Division of Law in the Office of the Attorney General. Since the current task order contracts will expire in December 2017, the Members of the Authority are requested to approve the retention of a new group of sixteen (16) law firms with legal expertise in the following specific areas: (1) Insurance Coverage and Suretyship; (2) Bankruptcy and Insolvency Proceedings; (3) Environmental Law; (4) Employment Law; (5) Government Contracting, Bid Protests and Procurement; (6) Professional Errors and Omissions and Cost Recovery; (7) Construction Litigation; and (8) Real Estate Law. Specific work assignments under the contracts will be made by way of "task order" on an as needed basis. The term of agreement for these contracts is two (2) years. For any assignment(s) accepted during the term of the agreement, the firm(s) will be allowed to complete the particular assignment(s), even if extending beyond the term of the agreement.

The selected law firms may be tasked, on an as needed basis, to assist the NJSDA's Division of Chief Counsel and to provide legal advice, consultative services, and, when required, formal representation of the NJSDA. Selection of a firm, however, does not guarantee that the firm will be assigned work. Task order assignments will be made on a rotating basis within the eight (8) specialty areas and multiple matters may be included as part of a single task order assignment. Assignments will be made subject to firm availability and a conflict of interest check. Firms will be required to submit a proposed budget for each task order assignment. The budget shall be subject to the NJSDA's approval and acceptance prior to commencement of services under the task order assignment.

Additionally, as described in the Request for Proposals ("RFP"), each selected firm must comply with the NJSDA Legal Services Management Guidelines and agree to provide its services at a blended hourly rate of \$200 for attorney services and an hourly rate of \$90 for paralegal services. These rates are the same as those utilized for the 2008, 2011, 2013 and 2015 legal services task order contracts. Total compensation to an individual Firm, regardless of whether it is engaged in one or more of the specialty areas, shall not exceed \$1,500,000 for the two (2) year term.

#### PROCUREMENT PROCESS

In accordance with NJSDA regulations, the NJSDA employed a two-step process for this procurement. The first step was the issuance of an RFP and evaluation of all responsive submissions. The second step was to interview all firms submitting responsive proposals.

The RFP was advertised beginning on June 2, 2017 on the NJSDA website, on the New Jersey State website, in the New Jersey Law Journal, and in selected newspapers for interested firms to participate in the bidding process.

A Selection Committee consisting of four (4) NJSDA staff members was established.

Firms interested in submitting a proposal were required to send an e-mail giving Notice of Intent to Participate (NOI) by June 20, 2017. NOIs were received from thirty-four (34) firms. Responsive proposals were received from twenty-two (22) firms by July 12, 2017. Proposals were evaluated by the Selection Committee. Evaluations were based upon the information provided by the firms in response to the RFP for this project. The four (4) committee members independently evaluated the proposals per legal specialty area based on the following criteria:

- Understanding of the Purposes of the Engagement
- Firm Experience Case Studies
- Team Structure/Key Team Member Experience and Qualifications
- Approach to Providing the Scope of Services/Control of Schedule

Each Selection Committee member evaluated each proposal per legal specialty area, assigning a raw score for each criterion on a scale of 0 to 10 as follows:

- Outstanding (9-10): depth and quality of response offers significant advantages.
- Superior (7-8): exceeds RFP requirements with no deficiencies.
- Sufficient (5-6): meets RFP requirements with no significant deficiencies.
- Minimal (3-4): meets RFP requirements but contains some significant deficiencies.
- Marginal (1-2): comprehends intent of RFP but contains many significant deficiencies.
- Unsatisfactory (0): requirements not addressed and lack of detail precludes adequate evaluation.

Weighting factors were applied to each of the Selection Committee member's raw scores for each criterion to arrive at a total weighted score as indicated in Table 2 below:

For each firm's proposal, the individual criteria scores awarded by a particular Selection Committee member for each legal specialty area were added together to calculate a Proposal Score for that legal specialty area. Each firm could receive a maximum of 100 points per evaluator per legal specialty area.

The firms participated in interviews with the Selection Committee from August 21, 2017 through September 6, 2017, as applicable. The interviews allowed the firms to expand and detail their team experience and approach with respect to each legal specialty area. The Selection Committee interviewed each of the firms and evaluated each firm on Interview Criteria and Weighting Factors that were the same as those used in the evaluation of the proposals, as detailed above.

The individual criteria scores awarded by a particular Selection Committee member for each legal specialty area were added together to calculate an Interview Score for that legal specialty area. Each firm could receive a maximum of 100 points per evaluator per legal specialty area.

The Proposal Score and the Interview Score assigned each firm were added together to obtain the firm's Final Combined Score. The Final Combined Scores and Final Rankings are listed in Tables 3-10 below:

#### **INTRODUCTION**

I am writing to recommend approval by the Members of the Authority of a Construction Change Order (CO) to resolve Construction Change Directive (CCD) No. 1, issued for \$0.00 (zero dollars), on June 15, 2017. The CCD and this Resolving Change Order (RCO) No. 1 represent scope associated with additional design and construction activities, and various components of compensation for such scope, for a total value of \$2,180,000.

A CCD is a contractual mechanism reserved for use when the work at issue has been verified to be a change to the base scope, and one of the following two conditions are met: either the work is so urgent that it requires a directive for immediate action by the General Contractor (GC), or negotiations for a change order have failed to come to a resolution, thereby placing the work in the critical path requiring immediate direction to avoid construction delays impacting a schedule milestone, e.g. school turn-over to the district. A resolving change order is the mechanism by which the final dollar value of the CCD is determined. It is the combined value of the CCD and the resolving CO that determines the required level of approval for the resolving change order.

Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended March 7, 2012, a construction change order which singularly exceeds \$500,000, or singularly and/or in the aggregate is greater than 10% of the contract value, requires approval by the Members of the Authority. This change order warrants Board review and approval in that it exceeds \$500,000.

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#### **BACKGROUND**

The Paul Robeson Community Theme School for the Arts (Robeson School) Addition and Renovation project consists of a 59,400 square foot renovation and a 60,500 square foot addition to the facility that is designed to educate 823 students in grades Pre-K to Five in the New Brunswick School District. The addition and renovation project at the Robeson School is included in the NJSDA Capital Plan. The Design-Build award for this project to Hall Construction Company, Inc. (Hall) was approved by the Members of the Authority at the September 2, 2015 Board Meeting along with the Final project Charter.

The Robeson School students and staff have been relocated to a NJSDA-leased facility for the duration of the construction.

Following Hall's engagement but before construction work had begun, cracking was identified in interior and exterior wall jambs of the existing Robeson School building, but neither visual inspection nor preliminary exploratory investigation identified the structural condition that is the cause of this Change Order. In March 2017, Hall's removal of the existing windows and selective demolition around the windows revealed that the building's exterior walls were inadequately anchored to the existing building structure, and this structural deficiency had caused the masonry walls to shift laterally. Further invasive and destructive investigation by Hall confirmed that the condition existed throughout the building's exterior walls.

In order to mitigate the potentially significant delay attributable to the work required to address this structural condition, the NJSDA issued a CCD directing Hall to: 1) develop alternative design solutions to address the condition for NJSDA's review and selection, and 2) subsequently perform the work as described in the NJSDA-selected solution, with such work to be advanced concurrently with the performance of the base contract scope, in support of anticipated school opening in September 2018.

#### DESCRIPTION OF THE CHANGE ORDER SCOPE

The corrective action selected by NJSDA after review by NJSDA staff and an engaged third party structural engineer consists of a two methodologies: installation of new structural steel connected to the existing structure, or the installation of structural bracing walls comprised of cold-formed metal framing, used in various locations as appropriate, as described in plans reviewed and released by the Division of Community Affairs, Codes and Standards Division (hereafter, the "Corrective Work").

The Corrective Work consists of the installation of structural steel and structural bracing walls as described above, as well as all necessary coordination and relocation/rerouting of mechanical, electrical, plumbing (MEP) and data infrastructure; all required electrical work in the Mechanical Room; lead paint abatement

of existing steel members in areas where welding will be performed along the building's perimeter; any other work required to implement the selected design solution, and all necessary design services.

This Change Order also serves to extend the Contract Time by 112 calendar days and to change the Substantial Completion date under the Contract from April 4, 2018 to July 25, 2018 and the Contract Final Completion date from June 28, 2018 to September 27, 2018 (the "Contract Time Change"). Notwithstanding the Contract Time Change, the Change Order serves to memorialize a phased delivery of the Project, recognizing that the addition to the Paul Robeson Community Theme School must be delivered to the NJSDA on or before April 4, 2018 to facilitate the delivery and installation of furniture, fixtures and equipment by the NJSDA.

The Change Order's final value of \$2,180,000 represents a negotiated lump sum fee to perform the Corrective Work, including but not limited to: general conditions and extended general conditions; general conditions and extended general conditions of all sub-consultants and sub-contractors; resequencing and/or acceleration of performance to facilitate schedule recovery (including additional labor hours, additional crews and premium shifts) to maintain the overall Project timeline; and escalation costs for materials and labor.

#### SUMMARY OF CHANGE

This change order will resolve CCD No. 1, which was issued to address structural conditions in the original building that were revealed during renovation activities, as well as the prior authorization of \$80,000 under CCD No. 1 for design services to develop the design solution for the Corrective Work.

This Change Order will support the delivery of the Robeson School facility to the District as originally forecasted for September, 2018.

The Change order shall modify the Contractual Substantial Completion date by 112 calendar days, adjusting from the current, original date of April 4, 2018 to a revised Contractual Substantial Completion date of July 25, 2018. In order to accomplish the Corrective Work within this revised Schedule, the Design-Builder, Hall, shall increase the Labor Hours of the trade workforce and shall provide such workforce during alternate, premium shifts as necessary. The additional cost includes performance of the work by a labor force working additional hours and within a timeframe that maintains the anticipated school opening date of September 2018. The Change Order represents compensation to Hall for these adjustments.

The documents supporting the above change order, inclusive of the adjusted schedule have been reviewed by the associated NJSDA project team members, as well as the Design Studio Managing Director, Program Director, Deputy Director, and CMD for adherence to current NJSDA policy and procedures. All reviewing NJSDA staff members, including CMD, have determined that these change orders are justified and that the amounts are reasonable and appropriate.

#### INTRODUCTION

At the March 7, 2012 NJSDA Board Meeting, the Members of the Authority approved the Authority's 2012 Capital Plan. That Plan identified a project to address facility conditions deficiencies at the Orange High School in the Orange Public Schools District (District).

We are writing to recommend approval by the Members of the attached Preliminary Charter, created by Program Operations staff, which details project advancement recommendations including estimated project costs for project completion.

Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended March 7, 2012, Preliminary Project Charters require approval by the Members of the Authority.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Orange High School is a 111,314 square foot facility currently educating 804 students in grades 10 through 12. The project being advanced by the Authority will include renovations to address facility conditions deficiencies and will provide an addition which will allow for a District-wide change in grade alignment, consistent with the District's approved Long Range Facilities Plan (LRFP) to address district-wide overcrowding at all grade levels identified by the Department of Education based upon its 2013 Educational Facilities Needs Assessment.

Through a competitive process, and with Board approval, the Authority engaged Kliment Halsband Architects, LLP (KHA) to provide Design Consultant Services for the project. The Authority's Design Consultant Services agreement with KHA includes performance of both 1) Predesign Phase Services and 2) Design and Construction Administration Phase Services.

On May 5, 2015 NJSDA issued to KHA a Notice-to-Proceed (NTP) for Predesign Phase Services. The purpose of the Predesign Phase was to develop and analyze options for delivery of the project scope to most effectively and efficiently address the identified facilities conditions deficiencies and educational program needs.

Services also included development of a viable solution to provide a closed, connecting circulation link between Orange High School and the adjacent Orange Preparatory Academy (OPA) to allow safe and secure passage between the two Schools for student use of shared facilities, most notably the existing auditorium which is located in OPA. The SDA-accepted solution developed by KHA is an enclosed elevated connecting link and installation of new elevators on either end of the elevated connecting link.

On January 4, 2017 the Members provided approval for KHA to proceed with Design and Construction Phase Services and approved a Planning Charter detailing project advancement recommendations as well as negotiated costs for the remaining Design and Construction Phase Services. On January 26, 2017, the NJSDA issued a NTP to KHA for advancement of Schematic Design Phase Services including the development of:

- Educational Specifications;
- Schematic Design Documents; and
- Updated Construction Cost Estimate (CCE).

KHA has completed all elements of the Schematic Design Phase and the NJSDA issued to KHA a NTP for Design Development Phase Services on July 14, 2017.

#### **PROJECT SCOPE**

The project scope remains consistent with the scope identified at the time the Planning Charter was approved by the Members in January 2017:

- An approximately 50,000 square foot two-story addition to the existing Orange High School facility including (15) general classrooms, (3) art classrooms, (1) drama classroom, (2) technology labs, (1) robotics lab, (1) auxiliary gymnasium, (1) media center, (2) administrative offices.
- An enclosed elevated connecting link between Orange High School and OPA including installation of new elevators on either end of the elevated connecting link;
- Conversion of the existing Orange High School media center to an auxiliary dining facility;
- Selective renovations and systems upgrades at Orange High School including: science rooms renovations, replacement of interior and exterior doors, flooring replacement, roofing replacement, restroom upgrades, replacement in kind of existing HVAC systems, and provision of a new hot water boiler plant in the Orange High School facility;
- Site improvements including necessary site utility work and replacement of existing parking being displaced by the addition to Orange High School; and
- Demolition of four temporary classroom units currently being utilized to deliver instruction in the Arts, as well as site restoration following demolition.

Based upon completion of schematic design, the project will also provide:

- Replacement of the electrical service switchgear and feeder equipment;
- Replacement of a greater number of unit ventilators than originally anticipated; and
- New burners in the steam boilers located in OPA, necessary for the successful separation of the heating system currently shared with Orange High School.

#### **PROJECT BUDGET**

As detailed in the attached Preliminary Charter, the estimated cost of \$46.2 million for the project is inclusive of all prior expenditures including Predesign and Schematic Design Services performed, as well as estimated future costs necessary for advancement of the current project scope including Design Phase Services by KHA, and NJSDA staff costs. The budget is based upon the revised construction cost estimate provided by KHA and the application of planning estimates to the current anticipated project scope. The increased estimated construction costs are based upon the detailed schematic design for the addition, renovation and necessary site work to support the project. The increased costs will be addressed utilizing existing project contingency funds in the amount of \$823,000 and as such there is no increase to the Preliminary Charter Budget from the Planning Charter approved by the Members in January 2017.

#### RECOMMENDATION

The Members are requested to approve the Preliminary Charter for the Orange High School Project for Orange Public Schools District.

The Operating Authority will govern the award of all professional services and construction contracts and notification to the Board of the use of contingency monies.

The budget is based upon the reconciled construction cost estimate provided by KHA and the application of planning estimates to the current anticipated project scope. The increased estimated construction costs are based upon the detailed schematic design for the addition, renovation and necessary site work to support the project. The increased costs will be addressed utilizing existing project contingency funds in the amount of \$823,000 and as such there is no increase to the Preliminary Charter Budget from the Revised Planning Charter approved by the Members in January 2017.

#### Resolution

WHEREAS, the Operating Authority of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority (SDA or the Authority) requires that the Members of the Authority approve preliminary project charters; and

WHEREAS, Orange High School (High School) in the Orange Public Schools District (District) is a 111,314 square foot facility currently educating 804 students in grades 10 through 12 (project); and

WHEREAS, the project being advanced by the Authority will include renovations to address facility conditions deficiencies at the High School and provide an addition, allowing for a District-wide change in grade alignment, consistent with the District's approved Long Range Facilities Plan (LRFP) to address district-wide overcrowding at all grade levels; and

WHEREAS, through a competitive process, and with Board approval, the Authority engaged Kliment Halsband Architects, LLP (KHA) to provide design consultant services for the project; and

WHEREAS, in May 2015 SDA issued to KHA a Notice-to-Proceed (NTP) with predesign phase services and to develop and analyze options for delivery of the project scope to most effectively and efficiently address the identified facilities conditions deficiencies and educational program needs; and

WHEREAS, in January 2017 the Members provided approval for KHA to proceed with design and construction phase services and approved a planning charter detailing project advancement recommendations as well as negotiated costs for the remaining design and construction phase services; and

WHEREAS, that same month, SDA issued KHA a NTP with advancement of schematic design phase services as described in the memorandum presented to the Board on this date; and

**WHEREAS**, KHA has completed all elements of the schematic design phase and in July 2017 SDA issued KHA a NTP with design development phase services; and

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WHEREAS, management recommends that the Members of the Authority approve the project's preliminary charter, presented to the Board on this date, which details project advancement recommendations including estimated project costs for project completion; and

WHEREAS, the project's background, recommended scope and budget are set forth in detail in the memorandum presented to the Board on this date and incorporated herein.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Members of the Authority hereby authorize and approve the preliminary charter for the Orange High School Project in the Orange Public Schools District consistent with the memorandum presented to the Board on this date and incorporated herein.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that the SDA Operating Authority will govern the award of all professional services and construction contracts and notification to the Board of the use of contingency monies.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that this resolution shall take effect immediately, but no action authorized herein shall have force and effect until 10 days, Saturdays, Sundays and public holidays excepted, after a copy of the minutes of the Authority meeting at which this resolution was adopted has been delivered to the Governor for his approval, unless during such 10-day period, the Governor shall approve same, in which case such action shall become effective upon approval.

Vendor Services staff continues to participate at mandatory pre-bid and pre-construction meetings to instruct and inform bidders regarding SDA's SBE goals, policies and procedures, including:

- Small Business Enterprise subcontracting goal of 25% of all contracts
- County workforce goals for minorities and females
- Detailed process procedures to monitor and track the progress made toward these goals throughout the life cycle of each project

At these meetings, vendors are strongly encouraged to identify and hire minority-owned and womenowned firms, as well as locally-based enterprises, for diverse business participation on all school building projects. Additional outreach strategies are discussed and utilized.

## SMALL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (SBE) COMPLIANCE MONITORING

The SDA regularly exceeds the State-mandated 25% SBE goal. The total SDA contract dollars awarded through July 31, 2017 was \$91,483,504. The figures below demonstrate compliance with this requirement.

On September 5, SDA Executive Vice President of Program Operations and Strategic Planning Andrew Yosha joined West New York School District and local officials to celebrate the re-opening of the rehabilitated Harry L. Bain Elementary School in West New York. The Harry L. Bain Elementary School project included improvements to the building envelope and interior systems of the existing school that educates approximately 800 students in grades pre-kindergarten through six. The exterior renovations included removal and replacement of the building façade, brick front and windows, as well as installation of a water-resistant exterior insulation and finish wall system. The interior work included replacement of classroom HVAC units, lighting systems upgrades, ceiling tile replacements in coordination with the HVAC & lighting work, and repairs to water infiltration-damaged interior spaces.

Included on pages 1 and 2 of this report is a "Financial Summary" of the Authority's activities for the year. On pages, 3 and 4 of the report is a summary of the Authority's operating expenditures. Page 5 contains a breakdown of the Authority's headcount information by department/division. The basic financial statements follow on pages 6 and 7.

#### Year-to-Date <u>Authority Operating Expenses</u> (Actual vs. Budget)

For August 2017 year to date, Authority operating expenses, **\$14 million**, are **down \$1.9 million** as compared to the operating budget for the *corresponding period*. The deviation of actual expenses versus budget is due to:

- Lower salary & benefit costs **\$1.7M**. The Authority is currently 32 FTEs under budget. This variance is offset by the year to date allocation of payroll expense to project cost that is lower than projected, **(\$667K)**;
- Lower spending for MIS \$243K;
- Lower spending for capital expenditures \$131K.

#### Year-to-Date <u>Authority Operating Expenses</u> (Actual vs. Prior Year Actual)

For August 2017 year to date, Authority operating expenses, **\$14 million**, are **\$1.3M** higher as compared to the corresponding prior year:

- Higher employee benefit costs **\$935K**, primarily due to the impact of a non-cash accrual for pension expense recorded for GASB 68;
- Increases in Common Area Maintenance (CAM) fees \$76K.

#### Year-to-Date School Facilities Project Expenditures (Actual vs. Forecast)

For August 2017 year to date, project expenditures, \$241.5 million, are higher by \$9.9 million as compared to the capital-spending forecast for the *corresponding period*. The variance is due to increased activity in construction work \$7.6M, grant activity \$7.8M and school, furniture, fixtures and equipment \$2.5M. This variance is offset by decreased spending in property acquisitions \$3.9M and other project related costs \$4.1M.

## Year-to-Date School Facilities Project Expenditures (Actual vs. Prior Year Actual)

For August 2017 year to date, project expenditures, **\$241.5 million**, have **decreased** by **\$15 million** as compared to the *corresponding prior year*. The variance is primarily due to decreased spending in construction related activity **\$16.6M**, school furniture, fixtures and equipment **\$9M**, property acquisitions **\$1.4M** and other project related costs **\$4.3M**. Offsetting these cost reductions are spending increases in grants **\$16.3M**.

#### Other

Since program inception, 79.1% of the funds authorized for the SDA Districts have been disbursed. Additionally, since program inception 96% of all SDA disbursements relate to school facilities projects and 4% relate to operating expense.

The estimated value of active school facilities projects is approximately \$2.2B.

The information contained in this monthly financial report is for the period as of, and for the year-to-date ending, August 31, 2017.

- ▶ **Prepaid Expenses** total \$458,475 as follows:
  - Prepaid insurance of \$177,711.
  - Prepaid rents of \$122,431 for the Authority's leased office space in Trenton and Newark.
  - Prepaid MIS maintenance service contracts of \$124,791.
  - Other prepaids of \$33,542.
- ▶ Capital Assets total \$574,892 (net of accumulated depreciation of \$6,868,938), consisting of leasehold improvements (SDA offices), and capitalized software, equipment, furniture and fixtures in support of SDA operations. Depreciation on capital assets is generally calculated using the straight-line method over the life of each asset. For the year to date, Capital Expenditures are \$6,180 and Depreciation Expense is \$138,392.
- ▶ **Accrued Liabilities** total \$134.8 million, as follows:
  - Accrued project costs of \$23.7 million consisting of unpaid invoices (\$7.8 million); and retainage (\$15.9 million).
  - Accrued net pension liability of \$73.6 million.
  - Pollution remediation obligations (PRO) under GASB 49 net to \$3.2 million (PRO liability \$5.1 million, offset by expected cost recoveries of \$1.9 million).
  - Estimated liability for loss contingencies totaling \$2.1 million (contractor claims \$2.1 million).
  - Estimated liability for loss contingencies totaling \$4.3 million (Cumberland HS \$4.3 million).
  - Payroll related liabilities of \$1.9 million.
  - Post-employment benefits obligation of \$25.9 million.
  - Other accrued liabilities of \$0.1 million.
- ▶ **Deposits** total \$2.9 million, as follows:
  - \$2.8 million is held for local share agreements (pass-through item).
- ▶ The Authority's **Net Position** at month end is \$186.4 million.
