APPROVAL OF MEETING MINUTES

JULY 1, 2019 OPEN SESSION MINUTES

NEW JERSEY SCHOOLS DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING MONDAY, JULY 1, 2019

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority (SDA or the Authority) was held on Monday, July 1, 2019 at 9:00 A.M. at the offices of the Authority at 32 East Front Street, Trenton, New Jersey.

Participating were:

Robert Nixon, Chairman Michael Kanef (Treasury) Bernard Piaia (DOE) Donna Sullivan (EDA) Kevin Luckie (DCA) Kevin Egan Richard Elbert Loren Lemelle Michael Maloney Mario Vargas

being a quorum of the Members of the Board. Mr. Egan, Mr. Elbert, Ms. Lemelle, and Mr. Piaia participated in the meeting by teleconference.

At the Chairman's request, Manuel Da Silva, interim chief executive officer; Andrew Yosha, chief operating officer; Jane F. Kelly, vice president and assistant secretary; Donald Guarriello, vice president and chief financial officer; Thomas Schrum, vice president; Albert Barnes, chief counsel; and Cecelia Haney, administrative practice officer and deputy chief counsel of the SDA, participated in the meeting. Adam Sternbach of the Governor's Authorities Unit also participated in the meeting.

The meeting was called to order by Mr. Nixon, who requested that Ms. Kelly read the requisite notice of the meeting. Ms. Kelly announced that the meeting notice had been sent to the *Trenton Times* and *Star-Ledger* at least 48 hours prior to the meeting, and had been duly posted on the Secretary of State's bulletin board at 20 West State Street in Trenton, New Jersey. Ms. Kelly then conducted a roll call and indicated that a quorum of the Members was present.

Pledge of Allegiance

Led by the Chairman, the Members and all assembled stood and recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

Approval of Meeting Minutes

The Chairman then presented for consideration and approval the Minutes of the June 5, 2019 Open and Executive Session meetings. Staff had provided a copy of both sets of minutes and a resolution to the Members for review in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas and seconded by Ms. Lemelle the Board approved the Open and Executive Session minutes of the June 5, 2019 SDA Board meeting with the Members' unanimous vote in favor of *Resolution 4a/4b*.

Authority Matters

CEO Report

Mr. Nixon asked Interim Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Manuel Da Silva for the Report of the CEO. Mr. Da Silva provided an update on September 2019 school openings. He reported that for the Irvington Madison Avenue ES project, staff anticipates applying for a temporary certificate of occupancy (TCO) in the current month. With respect to the Passaic Leonard Place ES project, Mr. Da Silva reported that staff anticipates issuance of a certificate of occupancy (CO) this month. He said that the school will be occupied by summer school students next week.

Mr. Da Silva reported that for the Perth Amboy Seaman Avenue ES project, staff anticipates applying for a TCO this month. He added that furniture and IT deliveries are currently in process.

Mr. Da Silva said that for the Trenton Central HS project, staff anticipates applying for a TCO this month. He added that furniture and IT deliveries are currently in process.

Next, Mr. Da Silva gave an update on projects in design. He said that for the Keansburg Port Monmouth Road ES project, staff advertised for general contracting services in June and proposals are due in September. For the Paterson Union Avenue MS project (former site of Don Bosco Academy), he reported that design phase services are ongoing. He advised that the designbuilder has initiated site preparation activities that do not require a permit issuance. He added that staff has issued a notice of award for construction management services.

Turning to projects with early site packages, Mr. Da Silva informed the Members that for the Plainfield Woodland ES project, building demolition is complete and final site grading work is being completed. He noted that staff anticipates advertising for design-build services in August.

Turning to projects in the procurement stage, Mr. Da Silva reported that for the Perth Amboy HS project, design-build services proposals are due in July. For the Keansburg Port Monmouth Road School project, he said that staff advertised for design-bid-build services last month (June) and proposals are due in September.

Next, Mr. Da Silva gave an update on projects in the constructability review stage. He advised that the Orange Cleveland Street ES and Orange HS projects are both under

constructability review, a process that is scheduled to be completed next month. Mr. Da Silva advised the Members that for the Orange HS project, the SDA's design consultant has completed field investigation of facilities condition deficiencies regarding water infiltration at the Orange Preparatory Academy and will provide a report for SDA review.

With respect to design-build projects in construction, Mr. Da Silva reported that for the Camden HS project, structural steel work has begun in the core of the building and footings, foundation, underground utilities and slab work is being finalized. For the East Orange George Washington Carver ES project, he said that masonry and cold form metal steel framing installation is complete. He added that interior mechanical, electrical and plumbing (MEP) rough-in is ongoing. Turning to the Harrison new ES project, Mr. Da Silva reported that MEP rough-in and building enclosure work is ongoing, as is exterior masonry veneer construction.

In continuing, Mr. Da Silva reported that for the Millville HS addition and renovation project, Phase II renovation work is complete, as is structural steel work. For the Passaic Dayton Avenue Educational Campus project, Terminal Construction is in the process of completing concrete slab, site utility construction and structural steel construction work. He added that masonry and site work is underway. He advised that for the Pemberton Denbo Crichton ES project, Ernest Bock & Sons, Inc. is completing exterior walls in preparation for building enclosure prior to winter weather. He added that MEP interior work is underway.

In continuing, Mr. Da Silva gave an update on operational procurements. He said that a recommendation of a contract award for Property Management & Maintenance Services is on today's agenda. He reported that the procurement to engage a pool of contractors to provide General Construction Services was advertised in June and proposals are due this month. He added that the procurement to engage a pool of law firms to provide Legal Services was advertised in June and proposals are due next week.

Reporting on events, outreach and other SDA activities, Mr. Da Silva reported that on Wednesday, June 19, the SDA held a groundbreaking event at the site of the new Camden HS project. He reported that the event was very well attended by approximately 80 school officials, elected officials, students and SDA staff.

Mr. Da Silva informed the Members that staff is currently working on scheduling a number of project-related events in July including a Time Capsule opening at the Plainfield Woodland Avenue ES and a brick signing in at the Pemberton Denbo Crichton ES.

In continuing, Mr. Da Silva said that the Passaic Sonia Sotomayor ES (formally known as the Leonard Place ES) is opening for summer school this week and staff is working with the district to schedule a soft opening event.

Audit Committee

Approval of Builders Risk (Property) Insurance Contract No. 2 – GP-0208-R01

Mr. Nixon, in his capacity as Audit Committee Chairman, reported that the Audit Committee met on June 17 at which time management provided the Committee with the May 2019 New Funding Allocation and Capital Plan Update. He advised that there were no changes in any of the reserve balances during the reporting period. Mr. Nixon noted that the reserve balance for the Regular Operating Districts (RODs) increased by \$1 million during the reporting period due to a reduction in state share for grant projects nearing completion.

Next, Mr. Nixon reported that management and the Audit Committee are recommending Amendment No. 2 to the Authority's Builders Risk (Property) Insurance Contact (Policy) for unanticipated changes in construction values and duration on current enrolled projects. He said that in December 2013, the Authority purchased a 3 year term Policy for a not-to-exceed (NTE) value of \$485,000. He noted that at the August 2016 Board Meeting the Members approved Amendment No. 1 to the policy in the amount of \$215,000 increasing the NTE to \$700,000. Mr. Nixon explained that, at that time, the increase in the premium was the result of additional projects and project scope increases that were advancing into construction. He said that, during the term of the Policy, seventeen (17) capital projects and various emergent projects began construction. He reported that only one project has not yet reached substantial completion, i.e. the Trenton HS project which is scheduled for completion this month. He reported that the policy's total insured value is currently projected to be \$610 million. He said that Amendment No. 2 is necessary due to the approximate 4.8% increase above the 2016 projection. He explained that the premium cost has risen from \$700,000 to \$715,000 representing a \$15,000 increase. Mr. Nixon explained that Board approval is required as the proposed amendment to the contract is greater than 10% of the original contract value. He added that the proposed increase includes contingency for unanticipated changes in construction values and durations for the one remaining project.

Following discussion, Mr. Nixon said that the Committee recommends that the Board approve Amendment No. 2 to the Builders Risk (Property) Insurance in the amount of \$15,000. By motion duly made by Mr. Vargas and seconded by Mr. Kanef the Board approved Amendment No. 2 as proposed upon its unanimous vote in favor of *Resolution 6a*.

Mr. Nixon then provided the May 2019 Monthly Financial Report. He advised that the Authority's operating expenses (Actual vs. Budget) for the year-to-date period totaled \$9 million, \$730,000 lower as compared to the operating budget for the corresponding year. He said that the variance is attributable to 15 fewer than budgeted full time employees on staff. He said that Year-to-Date Authority Operating Expenses (Actual vs. Prior Year Actual) are \$837,000 higher as compared to the operating budget for the corresponding prior year period. He advised that this is largely attributable to the 2018 restructuring and expenses associated with the fit-out of the Newark office space. He said that school facilities project expenditures (Actual vs. Forecast)

for the year-to-date period, at \$116.8 million, are \$11.4 million lower as compared to the capital spending forecast for the corresponding period. He explained that this variance is due to spending reductions in grant activity, design services – net of cost recovery settlement and school furniture purchase. He advised the Board that this variance is offset by spending increases in construction activity expenditures. He reported that (Actual vs. Prior Year Actual) expenditures are lower by \$17.8 million as compared to the corresponding prior year. He said that this variance is due to increased spending in grant activity, project insurance costs and design services, offset by a spending increase in construction work.

In conclusion, Mr. Nixon reported that, since program inception, the Authority has disbursed approximately 84% of the funds authorized for SDA districts. Additionally, he said that, since program inception, 96% of all SDA disbursements relate to school facilities projects, while 4% relate to operating expenses. He advised that the estimated value of current school facilities project activity is over \$1 billion.

School Review Committee

Approval of Proposed Memorandum of Understanding Between the State Treasurer and the SDA for Project Review in Support of the Public-Private Partnership Program

Mr. Nixon asked Mr. Luckie to provide the report of the School Review Committee. Mr. Luckie reported that the School Review Committee met on June 17, 2019 at which time one item was discussed in Open Session. He reported that in August 2018, a Public-Private Partnership Program (P3 Program) was established by statute. He said that the P3 Program allows State government entities, among others, to enter into public-private partnership agreements under which a private entity assumes responsibility for certain projects of, or for the benefit of, the government entity, provided that the project is financed in whole or in part by the private entity. He explained that the Act requires that each proposed P3 Project be submitted to the State

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Treasurer for review and approval, and also requires that certain state entities participate in the review process to provide advice and guidance for the Treasurer's review. Mr. Luckie said that in June 2019 the State Treasurer proposed new rules to implement the P3 Program, and establish procedures for the submission and review of P3 Projects. He added that the proposed new rules require that Treasury's Office of Public Finance convene a Project Review Committee for each proposed P3 Project. He advised that the rules further provide that when a proposed P3 Project includes a school facility aspect, SDA must provide a representative to participate in the Project Review Committee to evaluate the viability and advisability of the Project. Mr. Luckie said that the State Treasurer has requested that State Agencies and Authorities that are to participate in the Project Review Committee process memorialize their commitment of personnel and resources in the form of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). He explained that the MOU that is presented for Board approval provides for an exchange of obligations with respect to the commitment of resources to the P3 Program Project Review Committee process as described in the Board memorandum. Ms. Haney advised that when participation in a P3 involves a non SDA district project, the SDA would be required to provide a staff member to help in the review of the project containing an educational aspect. She advised that if a P3 project involves an SDA district project, it would be delegated to another P3 Committee.

A resolution pertaining to this matter was provided to the Board for review in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas and seconded by Mr. Nixon, the Memorandum of Understanding between the State Treasurer and the SDA was approved with the Board's unanimous vote in favor of *Resolution 7a*.

At this time Mr. Maloney joined the meeting.

Real Estate Committee

Approval of State-Wide Property Management and Maintenance Services – GP-0257-R02

At the Chairman's request, Mr. Vargas discussed a proposed contract award for State-Wide Property Management and Maintenance Services. Referencing materials that were provided for Board review in advance of the meeting, he reported that the Authority had previously procured property management and maintenance services in 2008, 2011 and 2015 and that the SDA's current contract, as extended by one year for these services, expires August 31, 2019. He explained that these services are required for properties acquired and owned by the SDA. He noted that the inventory currently includes thirteen (13) real property sites consisting of vacant lots and occupied and unoccupied commercial and residential spaces. He advised that, upon completion of the competitive procurement process, management is recommending award of an agreement for state-wide property management and maintenance services to Bluegrass Hydro-Seed LLC, the incumbent provider. He said that the negotiated total compensation for the three-year agreement is \$2,018,000. Mr. Vargas noted that the agreement will commence September 1, 2019 with an option by SDA to extend it for one additional year on such terms as the SDA and Bluegrass may then agree. He advised that, prior to execution of the contract, the contract and all related documentation will be reviewed and approved by the Division of Chief Counsel. Mr. Vargas said that management and the Committee recommend approval of the proposed contract award by the full Board.

A resolution pertaining to this matter had been provided to the Board in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Ms. Lemelle and seconded by Mr. Nixon, the contract award to Bluegrass Hydro-Seed LLC for State-Wide Property Management and Maintenance Services was approved with the Board's unanimous vote in favor of *Resolution 8a*.

Public Comments

The Chairman then opened the Public Comments portion of the meeting. He invited Heather Sorge to the podium. Ms. Sorge advised the Board that she is the campaign organizer for Healthy Schools Now (HSN) and the New Jersey Work Environment Counsel (WEC). She said that she is before the Board today to thank interim CEO Manny Da Silva, the Board Members and the entire SDA staff for requiring additional certifications from manufacturers when considering future installation of rubberized or urethane flooring for SDA projects. She then described the mercury issues that have been found in school floorings causing them to emit neurotoxins that are affecting students and staff. Ms. Sorge listed the dangers associated with mercury vapors. She noted that the toxic flooring is found throughout school structures. She said that the only way to detect the mercury levels is by sending samples to an accredited laboratory. She said that this problem is not limited to school facilities, nor is it limited to the state of New Jersey. She identified other states that have been confronted with the issue as well. She advised that flooring containing mercury has been installed in many buildings other than school facilities. She advised that HSN has contacted the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry (ATSDR) requesting that they issue a national alert to warn the general public about this health issue. She stressed that the floors must be identified, tested and dealt with in a timely fashion. Ms. Sorge said that HSN is extremely grateful to the Authority for taking the lead and working to insure no future hazardous flooring is installed in SDA projects.

Adjournment

There being no further business to come before the Board, upon motion by the Chairman and with unanimous consent, the meeting was adjourned. **Certification**: The foregoing represents a true and complete summary of the actions taken by the Board of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority at its July 1, 2019 meeting.

Pursuant to the Open Public Records Act (N.J.S.A. 47:1A-1 et seq.), requests by members of the public for public documents shall be handled by a public entity's "Records Custodian". The Act defines "Records Custodian as the "...officer officially designated by formal action of that agency's director or governing body..." to perform this function.

In a meeting held May 1, 2019, the Board designated an Interim Records Custodian for the Authority. However, as the Interim Records Custodian is no longer with the Authority, it is necessary that the Members of the Authority designate another individual to assume these responsibilities on an interim basis. Management recommends that SDA Ethics Manager Jane Folmer-Kelleher be elected by the Members to assume this role.

From June 2006 through June 2008, Ms. Folmer-Kelleher managed the Authority's OPRA function and is thus well qualified to serve as Interim Records Custodian for the Authority.

INTRODUCTION

I am writing to recommend approval by the Members of the Authority of Resolving Change Order No. 1 to resolve Construction Change Directive (CCD) No. 1 issued for \$0.00 (zero dollars) on July 19, 2019. Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended March 7, 2012, an Emergent Project change order which singularly exceeds \$250,000 or singularly is greater than 10% of the contract value requires approval by the Members of the Authority. The Not-to-Exceed (NTE) value of Resolving Change Order No. 1 exceeds 10% of the contract value.

CCDs are typically only used when the work has been verified to be a change to the base scope and one of the following two conditions are met: either the work is so urgent that it requires a directive for immediate action by the General Contractor (GC) or negotiations for a change order have failed to come to a resolution, thereby placing the work in the critical path requiring immediate direction to avoid construction delays impacting a schedule milestone, e.g. school turn-over to the district. A resolving change order is the mechanism by which the final dollar value of the CCD is determined. It is the combined value of the CCD and the resolving CO that determines the required level of approval for the resolving change order.

The Emergent Project to address stairway structural conditions at Plainfield High School (PHS) must be completed this summer. The NJSDA issued the CCD to ensure that necessary additional scope would be performed to remedy the entirety of the emergent condition prior to school opening in September. As described more fully below, the CCD and Resolving Change Order No. 1 represent scope associated with

the creation of beam pockets in the stairway landings. The additional work is to be performed on a Time & Material basis, for a NTE value of \$125,000.

BACKGROUND

PHS, built in 1916 with several additions, is an approximately 365,000 square foot facility in the Plainfield School District educating approximately 1,600 students in grades 9 through 12.

In July 2016 the New Jersey Department Of Education (NJDOE) and NJSDA launched a statewide effort to identify and evaluate potential emergent projects throughout the NJSDA Districts. This effort resulted in the identification of conditions at PHS for advancement as an emergent project: structural repairs or replacement stairs located in the 1916 portion of the building.

Following approval by the Members of the Authority, the NJSDA engaged Catcord Construction Co., Inc. (Catcord) in September 2018 to perform scope necessary to address the condition for a NTE value of \$897,774. The NTE value represented costs associated with the most extensive potential solution to address the conditions, specifically limited repairs to stairwell number 2 and complete replacement of stairwells number 4 and 6.

The scope of the engagement included the performance of field investigative activities, development of options for resolution of the condition, preparation of plans representing needed construction activities inclusive of modifications to the existing structure, and performance of construction services to implement the option selected by the NJSDA. The selected option included complete replacement of stairwells 4 and 6.

REASON FOR CHANGE ORDER

Resolving Change Order No. 1, in the NTE amount of \$125,000 resolves CCD No. 1 which was issued on July 19, 2019 to provide labor and equipment to create steel beam pockets at the landings in stair towers 4 & 6. This additional scope is necessary to structurally support the replaced stairwells.

The original design intended for steel to be bolted into the existing stairwell walls. However, demolition of the existing stairs revealed that the existing walls would be unable to support the bolts to secure the steel landings. After review of the condition and the approved steel stair shop drawings, the engineer determined that the most appropriate and structurally sound solution to support the steel beams was to create beam pockets on both sides of the landing.

The CCD was issued to ensure that all necessary work proceeds within a schedule to support project completion consistent with school opening in September.

The contractor submitted a proposal for the additional scope at the NTE value of \$125,000. The proposal includes projections of cost for premium time and over time to be potentially expended to assure completion of the work for school opening in September.

NJSDA staff inclusive of Program Operations and Financial Operations reviewed the value of this additional scope. All documents supporting this Resolving Change Order have been reviewed by the associated Project Team Members and the Program Director for adherence to current NJSDA policy and procedures. All reviewing NJSDA staff members including Financial Operations have determined that the items included in Resolving Change Order No. 1 are justified and the amount is reasonable and appropriate. The Project Team will closely monitor all work with tickets for the work being submitted daily.

WHEREAS, after demolition of the landings, it was determined that the landing concrete, as installed, was partially bearing on the masonry construction of the wall and was not substantial enough to structurally support the work required to support the new landings; and

WHEREAS, following review, it was determined that the most practical and structurally sound way to support the steel beams was to create beam pockets on both sides of the landing to bear the new channels; and

WHEREAS, Catcord submitted a cost proposal in the not-to-exceed amount of \$125,000 for the additional scope of work; and

WHEREAS, management issued Construction Change Directive (CCD) No. 1 in the amount of \$0.00 on July 19, 2019 so that the work might proceed and to avoid impacts on the anticipated project completion date and September 2019 school opening; and

WHEREAS, SDA financial operations staff reviewed Catcord's \$125,000 cost proposal and determined that it was the most practical and economic approach to the work; and

WHEREAS, management recommends Board approval of Change Order No. 1 in the amount of \$125,000 to resolve CCD No. 1 for the labor, material and equipment needed to create beam pockets to support the stair landing steel channels; and

INTRODUCTION

I am writing to recommend approval by the Members of the Authority of Amendment No. 2 for a Notto-Exceed (NTE) value of \$79,000.00, for additional design services inclusive of Investigation, Operational Analysis and Development of Re-Design Recommendations (if required) of the makeup air velocity system in order to obtain the Certificate of Occupancy at the Science Park High School in the Newark Public Schools.

Pursuant to the Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended March 7, 2012, an Amendment which exceeds \$100,000.00 or 10% of the contract value requires approval by the Members of the Authority. Amendment No. 2 exceeds 10% of the contract value.

Funding for the amendment for design services related to Smoke Control System (SCS) Modifications is available within the Project Budget.

BACKGROUND

Initial Project History

Science Park High School is an approximately 275,000 square foot technology magnet high school educating 1,200 students in grades Seven (7) to Twelve (12). The New Jersey Economic Development

Authority (NJEDA) initiated delivery of Science Park High School in 2002. The NJEDA assumed the design contract with Einhorn Yaffee Prescott Architecture & Engineering, P.C. (EYP) from NPS. The construction contract for the new school was awarded to Hunt Construction and a Notice to Proceed was issued in December 2004. The project achieved Substantial Completion and received a Temporary Certificate of Occupancy (TCO) on November 13, 2006.

During the construction of the school, the DCA realized that the SCS was not in compliance with the International Building Code (IBC). Consequently, a TCO was issued by DCA, allowing the school to be occupied. A Certificate of Occupancy (CO) will not be issued until modifications are implemented and all identified DCA deficiencies are remedied.

Modification of the school's SCS is the primary element necessary for the completion of the Science Park High School project, issuance of the CO and final transfer of the school facility to Newark Public Schools.

Pursuit of Certificate of Occupancy

Following the test of the SCS performed in the fall of 2006, the NJSDA directed EYP to design a retrofit for the SCS to address deficiencies. There were several design iterations necessary in order to achieve release of the plans and specifications by the DCA in 2011.

Based on the EYP-developed construction documents, a construction contract was awarded to Grafas Painting Contractors, Incorporated (GPC) and a Notice to Proceed was issued on June 29, 2011 to retrofit the SCS.

Following completion of the SCS retrofit, the NJSDA engaged Triad Fire Protection Engineering Corporation (Triad) on September 11, 2011 to perform an inspection and determine functionality of the SCS and compliance with applicable codes. Triad reported that the retrofit to the SCS did not fully comply with the International Building Code (IBC) requirements.

The contract with GPC was terminated for convenience. The NJSDA determined that development of a design solution by a different design consultant was at this point the best approach to deliver an appropriate retrofit of the SCS that would fully comply with code requirements and remedy the deficiencies.

On March 26, 2014, a Limited Notice to Proceed was issued to USA Architects for Pre-Design Services, authorizing USA Architects to conduct detailed investigations and provide a complete definition of scope of work and associated budget necessary to address code compliance and operational deficiencies. Upon completion of Pre-Design activities, USA Architects was authorized to proceed with Design Services on July 30, 2015. USA's Design and Construction Administration Services are ongoing.

Triad has continued to provide additional required consulting services, including additional testing and inspections needed to certify modification of the existing Smoke Control System, fire alarm system, emergency power supply system, electrical system, and fire protection system at the Newark Science Park High School.

On June 2, 2017 Precision Building and Construction (PBC) was awarded a construction contract to address required corrective work related to Smoke Control System Modifications, MEP and Other Repairs identified through USA Architects' design efforts.

PBC has completed the scope of corrective work for the SCS, MEP and other repairs. However, the existing ductwork which interacts with the SCS did not pass the required pressure test due to factors involving the original project, unrelated to PBC's scope of work. CO No. 1 was issued to PBC to investigate and repair the issue that resulted in the failure of the existing SCS ductwork pressure test.

Following PBC's repairs to the ductwork, it was determined that the repairs would not fully address the required ductwork system pressurization issues. During the ongoing investigation and repairs to the ductwork system, thirty one (31) dampers were inspected. It was identified that the control dampers did not meet code conformance because they lacked required approved UL rating.

Additional scope to remedy the control damper issue was the basis of Change Order No. 3 issued to PBC after approval by the NJSDA Board at its April 4, 2018, Board Meeting. The scope of work in CO No. 3 included removal and replacement of sixty eight (68) smoke dampers necessary to provide a fully operational, code compliant SCS and interactive components inclusive of the smoke dampers. The CO required that the corrective work satisfactorily pass final SCS Special Inspection in order to obtain a Certificate of Occupancy.

From December 2018 thru February 2019, final special inspections were conducted by the Special Inspection company, Triad Fire Protection Engineering Corporation, in order to prepare the Final Smoke Control System Special Inspection Acceptance Report required to obtain a Certificate of Occupancy from the DCA at the Newark Science Park High School project.

All tests passed inspections except for the makeup air velocity system test performed at the main entrance front doors conducted on February 18, 2019. Investigation of the make-up air system revealed that the original make up air duct assembly on the second and third floors is undersized.

REASON FOR CHANGE

Amendment No. 2 will authorize USA Architects, Planners + Interior Designs, P.A. to perform additional design services including Investigation, Operational Analysis and Development of Re-Design Recommendations (if required) in order to identify corrective solutions to resolve the makeup air velocity system issue in compliance with the 2000 IBC Code and obtain the Certificate of Occupancy at the Science Park High School in the Newark Public Schools.

All documents supporting this Amendment have been reviewed by the associated NJSDA project Team Members and the Program Director for adherence to current NJSDA policy and procedures. All reviewing NJSDA staff members, including Financial Operations, have determined that the items in Amendment No. 2 are justified and the amount is reasonable and appropriate.

The Business & Diversity Management staff continues to participate at mandatory pre-bid and preconstruction meetings to instruct and inform bidders regarding SDA's SBE goals, policies and procedures, including:

- Small Business Enterprise subcontracting goal of 25% of all contracts
- County workforce goals for minorities and females
- Detailed process procedures to monitor and track the progress made toward these goals throughout the life cycle of each project

At these meetings, vendors are strongly encouraged to identify and hire minority-owned and womenowned firms, as well as locally-based enterprises, for diverse business participation on all school building projects. Additional outreach strategies are discussed and utilized.

SMALL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (SBE) COMPLIANCE MONITORING

The SDA regularly exceeds the State-mandated 25% SBE goal. The total SDA contract dollars awarded through May 31, 2019 was \$24,640,156. The figures below demonstrate compliance with this requirement.

SBE Breakdown

The total contract dollars awarded to all SBE contractors was \$7,852,078 (including minorities, women and veterans). This represents 31.87% of all SDA contracts.

The Office of the Chief Financial Officer is providing the attached monthly financial report to the Members of the Authority for their information. Included on pages 1 and 2 of this report is a "Financial Summary" of the Authority's activities for the year. On pages 3, 3-1 and 4 of the report is a summary of the Authority's operating and capital expenditures. Page 5 contains a breakdown of the Authority's headcount information by department. The basic financial statements follow on pages 6 and 7.

Fund Reporting Operating Expenses (Year-to-Date Actual vs. Budget)

For June 2019 year to date, Authority operating expenses, **\$9.7 million**, are **\$1.2M** lower than budget for the *corresponding period*. The variance is primarily related to lower year to date personnel costs, **\$667K**, the largest portion of which decrease is attributable to lower payroll and benefits costs, net of amounts allocated to school facilities projects, due to the Authority having 17 fewer FTEs than budgeted. Additionally, lower than anticipated spending related to facilities & general office expenses **\$152K**, professional & contracted services **\$108K**, information systems **\$109K**, and SDA-owned automobiles **\$92K**, contributed to the variance.

Fund Reporting Operating Expenses (Year-to-Date Actual vs. Prior Year Actual)

For June 2019 year to date, Authority operating expenses, **\$9.7 million**, are **\$907K** higher when compared to the *corresponding prior year*. This variance is mainly attributable to an increase in personnel costs, **\$726K**, primarily due to the 2018 Authority restructuring. Additionally, spending related to the fit-out of the Newark space (removal and replacement of information systems wiring and cabling), computer system maintenance expenses, **\$128K**, as well as outside legal services **\$62K**, contributed to the variance.

School Facilities Project Expenditures (Year-to-Date Actual vs. Forecast)

For June 2019 year to date, project expenditures, **\$149.9 million**, are **\$6.7 million** lower than the capital spending forecast for the *corresponding period*. This variance is primarily a result of lower than forecasted expenditures for grant activity **\$19.7M**, design services (net of cost recovery settlement) **\$2.8M**, school furniture purchases **\$1.5M**, and property acquisitions, **\$1.3M**. These reductions are partially offset by an increase in construction activity **\$21.2M**.

School Facilities Project Expenditures (Year-to-Date Actual vs. Prior Year Actual)

For June 2019 year to date, project expenditures, **\$149.9 million**, are lower by **\$12.2 million** when compared to the *corresponding prior year*. The variance is attributable to decreases in grant activity **\$32.7M**, project insurance costs **\$4.4M**, and design services (net of cost recovery settlement) **\$3.3M**. These decreases are partially offset by increases in construction activity **\$24.2M** and school furniture purchases **\$6.1M**.

Other

Since program inception, 84% of the funds authorized for the SDA Districts have been disbursed. Additionally, since program inception, 96% of all SDA disbursements relate to school facility projects and 4% relate to operating expense.

The *estimated value* of active school facilities capital, emergent and ROD grant projects is approximately \$2B.
