# NEW JERSEY SCHOOLS DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY BOARD OF DIRECTORS TELECONFERENCE MEETING WEDNESDAY, JUNE 2, 2021

A teleconference meeting of the Board of Directors of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority (SDA or the Authority) was held on Wednesday, June 2, 2021 at 9:00 A.M.

At the Chairman's request, Manuel Da Silva, chief executive officer; Andrew Yosha, vice president; Jane F. Kelly, vice president and assistant secretary; Donald Guarriello, vice president and chief financial officer; and Albert Barnes, chief counsel, of the SDA, participated in the meeting by teleconference. Joy Johnson of the Governor's Authorities Unit (GAU) also participated in the meeting by teleconference.

The meeting was called to order by Mr. Nixon, the Chairman of the Board. The Chairman asked Ms. Kelly to read the requisite notice of the meeting. Ms. Kelly announced that the meeting notice had been sent to the *Trenton Times* and *Star-Ledger* at least 48 hours prior to the

meeting. She said that a call-in number was provided on the SDA Website so that members of the public could participate in the meeting by teleconference. She also advised the Members that the call-in number for the meeting was posted at the SDA offices earlier in the morning. Ms. Kelly then conducted a roll call and indicated that a quorum of the Members of the Board was present.

# Approval of Meeting Minutes

The Chairman presented for consideration and approval the minutes of the Board's May 5, 2021 Open Session meeting. A copy of the meeting minutes and a resolution had been provided to the Members for review in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas and seconded by Ms. Lemelle, the Open Session minutes of the May 5, 2021 SDA Board meeting were approved by the Board with the Members' unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Resolution 3a*.

Next, Mr. Nixon presented for consideration and approval the minutes of the Board's May 5, 2021 Executive Session meeting. A copy of the meeting minutes and a resolution had been provided to the Members for review in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas and seconded by Ms. Lemelle, the Executive Session minutes of the May 5, 2021 SDA Board meeting were approved by the Board with the Members' unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as *Resolution 3b*.

# **Authority Matters**

# CEO Report

The Chairman then asked Mr. Da Silva for the Report of the CEO. Mr. Da Silva began his report with an update on design-build projects in construction. He said that the first three projects he will be discussing are scheduled for delivery this fall. He advised that for the Camden

HS project, interior mechanical, electrical, and plumbing finish work is ongoing. He added that interior finish work continues and final inspections have begun on the project. Mr. Da Silva said that he had the opportunity to tour the school yesterday and the school is looking amazing. He reported that Phase III is currently underway for the Millville HS addition and renovation project where Hall Construction continues with finish work. He added that final inspections have begun on Phase III of the project---the facility's North Addition that will deliver in September 2021 and includes science classrooms, a gymnasium and a dance studio, among other spaces. He advised that for the Paterson Union Avenue MS project, permanent power to the building has been connected, gas connection is underway, and interior finish and site work are ongoing. He noted that work has begun on sidewalk installation there along with the preparation of outdoor physical education areas.

In continuing, Mr. Da Silva reported that for the Perth Amboy HS project, production piles installation work has commenced and is underway. For the Plainfield Woodland ES project, he said that footings and foundations have begun and underground utilities work is expected to start next month.

Turning to design-bid-build projects in the construction stage, Mr. Da Silva reported that final inspections of the addition to the Orange HS have begun. He added that the addition is scheduled to be delivered this fall.

With respect to projects in the programming/pre-design/in-house design stages, Mr. Da Silva reported that for the Union City New Grade 7 to 9 School project, a demolition and early site preparation package was advertised the previous month. He added that bids are due and will be opened on July 14.

Turning to non-project related matters, Mr. Da Silva provided the Board with an update regarding the SDA-owned Astor Place property in Jersey City. He reported that on May 18,

2021, the SDA forwarded the Jersey City District's General Counsel drafts of proposed License and Sublicense Agreements. He advised that on May 19, 2021, the District's General Counsel responded requesting minor revisions and indicating that the matter would be presented to the Jersey City Board of Education (JCBOE) on May 27. He said that on May 20, the SDA provided revised drafts of the proposed License and Sublicense Agreements that incorporated all changes requested by the District's General Counsel. He noted that the Authority has not heard from the District regarding either the outcome of last Thursday's hearing by the JCBOE or the advancement of the licensing arrangement.

Upon the conclusion of Mr. Da Silva's report, Mr. Nixon said that he wanted to be very clear that the SDA has done everything it can do and management has giving the approvals and now the only thing left is for the JCBOE to approve the contract which the JCBOE has had for a few weeks now. He said that this is no longer an SDA matter and it is now up to the JCBOE to finalize the contract. He added that once the JCBOE finalizes the contract, the Astor Place project can go back to serving the public again.

# Audit Committee

# **Approval of 2020 Financial Statements**

Mr. Nixon, as Audit Committee Chairman, reported that the Audit Committee met on May 17, 2021 at which time management provided the Committee with the April 2021 New Funding Allocation and Capital Plan Update. He advised that there was a \$2.6 million decrease in the 2011 Emergent Projects Reserve balance following the Board-approved release of funds for the Newark Ivy Hill ES and Roberto Clemente ES boiler room water infiltration and structural repair projects. He said that there were no changes in any of the other reserve balances for the SDA Districts during the reporting period.

Mr. Nixon then advised the Board that the reserve balance for the Regular Operating Districts (RODs) increased by \$200,000 during the reporting period due to a reduction in state share for grant projects nearing completion.

Next, Mr. Nixon provided the April 2021 Monthly Financial Report. Mr. Nixon advised the Members that the Authority's operating expenses (Actual vs. Budget) for the year-to-date period totaled \$6.6 million, down \$917,000 as compared to the budget for the corresponding period. He explained that this decrease is mainly attributable to 6 fewer FTEs than budgeted, partially offset by lower than projected payroll allocations to project expenditures. Mr. Nixon then reported that school facilities project expenditures (Actual vs. Forecast) for the year-to-date period total approximately \$74.3 million, approximately \$29.8 million lower as compared to the capital spending forecast for the corresponding period. He advised the Members that this variance is the result of lower than forecasted expenditures for construction activity, grant activity, project insurance, school furniture purchases, property acquisition and payroll expense allocation to project expenditures. Mr. Nixon then said that project expenditures (Actual vs. Prior Year Actual), at approximately \$74.3 million, are lower by \$16.7 million when compared to the corresponding prior year period. He explained that the variance is due to decreased grant activity, project insurance, construction activity, school furniture purchases and design services. Mr. Nixon said that, since program inception, 89.7% of the funds authorized for the SDA districts have been disbursed. Additionally, he noted that 96% of all SDA disbursements relate to school facilities projects, while 4% relate to operating expenses. He advised that the estimated value of active school facilities capital projects, along with emergent and regular operating district grant projects, is approximately \$2 billion.

Next, Mr. Nixon advised that, in compliance with the 2019 changes to the SDA Bylaws and Audit Committee Charter, the CEO reported to the Committee in May regarding Authority personnel matters and changes.

In continuing, Mr. Nixon said that the Board is being requested to consider management's recommendation to approve the SDA's 2020 Financial Statements (the Statements). He said that Ernst & Young LLP (EY), SDA's independent auditor, presented their audit results and required communications in connection with EY's audit of the Authority's 2020 Financial Statements. He explained that while EY's audit of the 2020 Financial Statements is mostly complete, the audit cannot be finalized until receipt of the June 30, 2020 Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 68 pension information for the Public Employees' Retirement System. He said that this information is expected to be available on the New Jersey Department of the Treasury, Division of Pensions & Benefits web site this month (June 2021). Mr. Nixon then outlined the areas of emphasis and the thought process EY utilized in the development of the audit plan. He said that EY confirmed that the audit was performed consistent with the audit plan; reported that the financial statements contained no corrected misstatements or material uncorrected misstatements; and reported that EY did not find any matters that would rise to the level of either a material weakness or significant deficiency. He advised the Board that EY expressed its intent to issue an "unmodified" opinion on the 2020 Financial Statements, the highest level of assurance that an auditor can give in a financial statement audit. He added that, upon receipt of the GASB Statement No. 68 pension information, the 2020 Financial Statements will be updated as needed and EY will finalize the audit and issue their report. Mr. Nixon explained that the Audit Committee agreed to advance the draft 2020 Financial Statements to the Board for final approval. However, he emphasized that the Financial Statements, upon an affirmative vote by the Members, will be deemed approved on the condition that there is no material change to the draft Financial Statements unrelated to the recording of the GASB Statement No. 68 pension information. He advised the Board that, should there be an unforeseen material change to the draft financial statements unrelated to the recording of the GASB Statement No. 68 pension information, management will advise the Audit Committee and the Committee will determine whether to: (1) notify the Board of the change or changes; or (2) request that the Board take action to re-approve the 2020 Financial Statements as revised.

Staff had provided the Members with a resolution pertaining to the matter for review in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas and seconded by Mr. Luckie, the Authority's 2020 Financial Statements were approved by the Board upon its unanimous vote in favor of the resolution attached hereto as **Resolution 5a**.

Lastly, Mr. Nixon reported that, in accordance with Executive Order No. 122, at the conclusion of the Audit Committee Meeting, the Committee met with EY without Management present.

# School Review Committee

Release of Funds from Program Reserve, Award of Task Order, and Approval of Final Project Charter – Newark Public Schools District – Technology High School Boiler Room Vault and Façade Repair Emergent Project

Mr. Nixon asked Mr. Luckie to provide the report of the School Review Committee. Mr. Luckie reported that the School Review Committee met on May 17, 2021 at which time two items were discussed. He advised the Board that management is seeking approval of a release of funds from the program reserve, a task order award and a final project charter for the Newark Technology HS (High School or School) emergent project (Project). He explained that in 2008 and 2011, the SDA Board approved a total of \$197 million to fund emergent project work in SDA Districts; and, in July 2020, an additional \$55.6 million was made available through the

reallocation of funds from the SDA's Unforeseen Events Reserve to the Emergent Projects Reserve.

Mr. Luckie reported that the Newark Technology HS was built in 1912 and includes an addition built in 1971. He added that the School is approximately 169,000 square feet in size and educates approximately 610 students in grades 9 through 12. Mr. Luckie said that SDA confirmed the existence of emergent boiler room vault conditions at the High School. He noted that staff also identified the need to repair and/or replace a limited portion of the distressed and displaced brick veneer on the south façade of the 1971 addition. He said that the Authority engaged STV Architects in October 2018 to perform pre-design services limited to the boiler room vault conditions. He advised that, at the conclusion of those pre-design phase services, management determined to advance the project through the engagement of a general contractor (GC) utilizing the general construction services task order contract. He added that, as part of the engagement, the GC was required to engage the services of a design consultant to complete needed design services.

Mr. Luckie explained that after several unsuccessful attempts to identify, negotiate with, and engage a GC, the SDA determined to unify the work into a single engagement to address both the boiler room vault conditions and the brick veneer conditions. He said that on March 15, 2021 Hall Building Corporation (HBC) confirmed its acceptance of the GCTO assignment. He advised that the recommendation that the work be performed on a time and material (T&M) basis for the not-to-exceed (NTE) amount of \$1,999,000 represents HBC's cost proposal for the most extensive solution for most of the scope elements. He reported that upon completion of field investigative activities it will be determined if replacement rather than repair of the boiler room vault plaza roof slab is required and, until completion of such field investigative activities, HBC cannot present a reasonable and well-considered price proposal for replacement of the roof

slab such that the NTE value for the engagement is based upon its repair. He said that upon completion of design, the SDA will review and validate the final projected cost and schedule for the scope of work. Mr. Luckie explained that this review will result in a determination to either advance the construction work on a T&M basis for the NTE amount, or establish a fixed cost for the scope of work defined in the construction documents.

Mr. Luckie said that staff has reviewed Hall's cost proposal in the NTE amount of \$1,999,000, inclusive of SDA established allowances totaling \$265,000, and determined it to be reasonable for the elements included in the scope of work. He advised that, upon review, management determined that HBC has included all Project scope work in its bid and has confirmed that its price proposal is inclusive of all scope elements contained in the contract documents. He said that management and the Committee recommend the award of a task order contract to HBC. He also said that management and the Committee are recommending that the Board approve the Project's final charter and the release of \$2,667,335 from the Program Reserve for the Project. He noted that funding for the project is available within the established reserves for emergent projects. Finally, he advised the Board that SDA staff will provide construction management oversight for the project.

A resolution pertaining to this matter was provided to the Board in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Vargas and seconded by Mr. Nuse, and with Mr. Lewis-Powder recused and abstaining, a release of funds from the program reserve, contract award and final charter for the Newark Technology HS emergent project were approved with the Board's unanimous vote in favor of *Resolution 6a*.

In concluding his report, Mr. Luckie said that management discussed the SDA's Proposed New Rules for Disposition of SDA Surplus Property with the Committee for informational purposes. He said that this matter will be presented for Board consideration by the

Chairman of the Real Estate Committee.

# Real Estate Committee

Approval of Promulgation and Publication of New Rules for Disposition of SDA Surplus Real and Personal Property N.J.A.C. 19:35.

At the Chairman's request, Mr. Vargas provided the report of the Real Estate Committee. Referencing materials that previously were provided for Committee review, Mr. Vargas said that the Committee met on May 17, 2021, at which time management requested and the Committee is recommending, that the Members approve the promulgation and publication of New Rules for Disposition of SDA Surplus Real and Personal Property, N.J.A.C. 19:35 (New Rules). He said that the New Rules establish requirements and procedures for the disposition of real property and personal property owned by the SDA if the property is deemed surplus---that is, it is no longer needed for school facilities projects or SDA operations. He said that the New Rules are intended to replace the SDA's expired surplus property rules, while improving and expanding upon those rules. He explained that the New Rules would allow SDA to employ various methodologies in disposing of its surplus property so that a disposition can proceed in a way that is of the greatest benefit to the SDA, i.e. maximizing the amount of funds that would be made available for use in connection with other SDA projects. He advised that, upon adoption, the New Rules would be effective for 7 years. Mr. Vargas said that management is recommending that the Board approve the promulgation and publication of the proposed New Rules along with the issuance of the Notice of Proposal, and filing of the Notice with the Office of Administrative Law. He then said that Cecelia Haney was available to provide any additional details or to respond to any questions that the Members might have.

A resolution pertaining to this matter was provided to the Board for review in advance of the meeting. Upon motion duly made by Mr. Elbert and seconded by Mr. Luckie, the Board approved the recommended promulgation and publication of the proposed New Rules, as well as the issuance of the Notice of Proposal, and filing of the Notice with the Office of Administrative Law upon its unanimous vote in favor of *Resolution 7a*.

Lastly, Mr. Vargas reported that, for informational purposes, management provided the Committee with a brief update on certain SDA-owned surplus properties in Irvington Township.

# **Public Comments**

The Chairman then opened the Public Comments portion of the meeting. At the Chairman's request Ms. Kelly called upon the public speakers.

Ms. Kelly invited Bishop Militinia Bland to address the Board. Bishop Bland said that at a recent JCBOE Meeting the Black Interest Team Enterprise Corporation (B.I.T.E.) was informed that the SDA had forwarded (to the JCBOE) not the approximately 6 lines which they expected but a 14-page contract with a term of one year. She said that this is a problem because of the work B.I.T.E. does. She said that SDA comes into a project that is fluid, not costing any money and helping out the children and assisting the community and now bureaucracy closed it and sends a contract asking for things that are unreasonable. Bishop Bland then gave some examples of the unreasonable requests: no portable lavatories; a one year lease; a \$5 million insurance policy; workman's compensation; and, she added, the list goes on for 14 pages. She said that the garden was created from an unkempt, unwanted garbage lot. She expressed her concern that the property is now reverting back to its previous poor condition that B.I.T.E. worked hard to correct. She said that the (past) issues were not handled by the police but rather by community intervention and participation. She said that she hopes the SDA cares about the families and their children that attend the schools. She said that she wants this done as collabrative partners in order to help the community benefit. Bishop Bland said that she would hope that in an election year the Administration would be willing to work with community

organizations. She said that when they are told to cancel it, they need to speak up until the program is open and running again. She said that the children will soon be out of school and thanked the JCBOE because even with Covid-19, there will be a 2021 Resource Fair (Fair) where many of these problems will be addressed. Bishop Bland then listed some of the services to be provided at the Fair. She said that the JCBOE and SDA need to get together and work through the bureaucracy. She said that she hopes the children are safe and that she wants the SDA to help the children to be safe and thrive. She thanked Mr. Da Silva and said "you have a cordial invitation from the President to come and see what this Fair will do". She advised that the Fair will be held this Saturday 10:00 AM-3:00 PM at the Lincoln High School open air area. She asked that Mr. Da Silva attend as her personal guest.

At the Chairman's request, Ms. Kelly invited several additional speakers to address the Board but none responded. Bishop Bland said that the callers were advising her that they believed they were muted. Ms. Kelly advised that no one was muted and asked that each caller unmute themselves or they could call back into the meeting to try and correct the apparent phone issues.

Next, Mr. Alejandro Perez addressed the Board. Mr. Perez said that he was a recipient of and is a volunteer helper with Reverend Bland's organization. He said that the SDA must intervene because the JCBOE's conduct is that of bandits, gangsters and terrorists. He said that they are using this situation to hurt the people that are right now food insecure. He said that Reverend Bland's staff, including himself, have been though the worst weather to keep everything going at the garden. He said that now that the garden has been shut down it is reverting back to a disaster area with the wrong people coming in. He said this has to be stopped by the SDA and JCBOE. He said that right now the JCBOE's behavior is that of terrorists. Mr. Perez said that food insecurity is horrible and does not take holidays. He stressed that the garden

takes care of people from all walks of life. He said that the JCBOE is using this to hurt Reverend Bland and he implored the SDA to take over and stop this conduct of the JCBOE because they don't care because they are home warm while the lines of people for food and help are long. Mr. Perez asked Mr. Da Silva to accept the invitation to attend the Fair and also to come when it rains to see people lined up, with no one ever turned away. He said that Reverend Bland has stayed after 3pm to give out food to people who came late.

Ms. Kelly asked Ms. Vera Bland to address the Board. Ms. Bland said that she is very concerned as a recipient of the food pantry that a small non-profit organization has been tasked to read a 14-page legal document to do work which they do for free and that was never their intent. She advised that the group came together and tried to do a good deed and now they are so engrossed in this kind of bureaucracy that they cannot see their way clear. She said that the document that she read with an untrained eye had blatant things in it that are totally unrealistic. She asked "how do we raise the funds to do something that is free". She added that they work this land, toil and now are asked to pay for free labor. Ms. Bland said that if she were to work on a job, she would be protected but now she works for free and (SDA is) asking her to pay as a citizen, who already pays taxes, to do a good deed. She added that this is not the way it should happen. She said that she has to ask the SDA to take a look and come up with a compromise to allow citizens to come together and do good deeds and still be protected. She said that the amount of labor that B.I.T.E. puts in every season for a one year contract that could be eliminated at any time goes back to the days of slavery. She added that this is what share croppers did-- they were unprotected, worked the land and hoped for the best. Ms. Bland said that the group wants something that is sincere and the contracts that were sent are not. She added that, if you take a look at the devastation that is now happening in that area--the group of undesirables that is there with their liquor bottles and the drug paraphilia that is all around the

garden, it just breaks your heart because we can do so much better as a community. She said that B.I.T.E. comes to the SDA and asks if there is anything else that can be done. She said that she hopes the SDA comes down to see. Ms. Bland quoted Maya Angelou saying "and still we rise, we have not given up" adding that she hopes the SDA doesn't give up on them.

Ms. Kelly asked Ms. Deborah Alston to offer comments. Ms. Alston said that she wanted to elaborate on what everyone was saying today. She said that the neighbors and the shop owners in the surrounding area who are supporting B.I.T.E. are complaining about the problems at the garden. She said that they don't want this to happen and want the children safe for the summer because the garden is a safe place for their children to have their reading programs, summer programs, internships and to do volunteer work. She referenced the invitation of Bishop Bland to the SDA to please come down and see the garden. She said the SDA needs to come and see what Bishop Bland is doing for the community.

The following individuals had indicated an interest in offering public comments in support of B.I.T.E. and the Astor Place Community Garden: Joy Viallad, Bishop Merino, Shazia Raqui, Reverend Dr. Curtis, Minister Rosa Roney and Reverend Webb. However, due to apparent technical difficulties, the source of which could not be determined, the Board was unable to receive their comments. Their participation and support for Community Garden and B.I.T.E. are noted for the meeting record.

# Adjournment

There being no further business to come before the Board, upon motion by the Chairman and with unanimous consent, the meeting was adjourned.

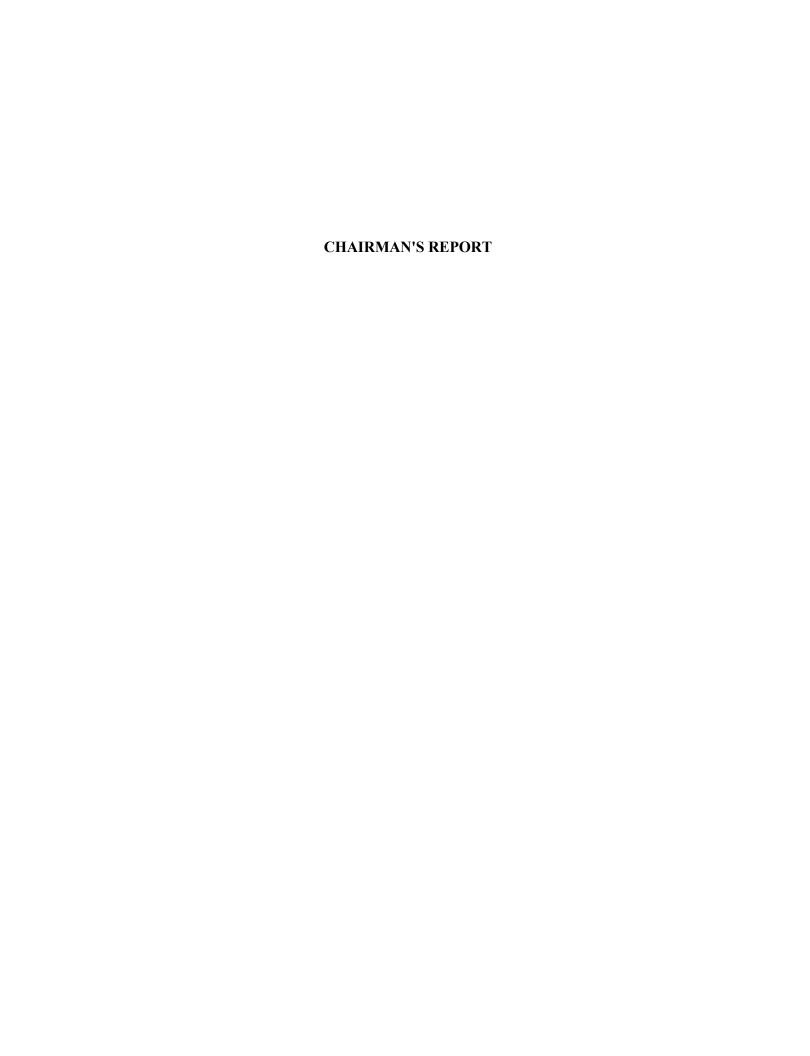

# INTRODUCTION

We are writing to recommend approval by the Members of the Authority for three related actions to address emergent conditions at the Cleveland Elementary School in the Newark Public Schools District:

- 1. The release of funds from the NJSDA Program Reserve maintained for emergent projects;
- 2. The award of a task order to Integrated Construction Enterprises, Inc. in the Not-To-Exceed (N.T.E.) amount of \$1,235,291.00; and
- 3. The Final Charter (copy attached) representing the project budget inclusive of the N.T.E. dollar value for the award of the task order, appropriate contingency, allowances, NJSDA staff costs and other costs.

As discussed below, the recommended actions represent N.T.E values to support development and implementation of the most appropriate, efficient and timely action to address the emergent conditions.

Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended on March 7, 2012, Board approval is required for the release of monies from the Program Reserve for emergent projects or emergency situations exceeding \$500,000.00. Further, the Operating Authority requires Board approval of the award of construction contracts greater than \$500,000.00 as well as approval of a Final Project Charter. Both the construction award and the release of funds from the reserve exceed \$500,000.00.

At the July 2008 Board meeting, the Members approved the 2008 New Funding Allocation and Capital Plan which allocated \$97 million to fund emergent projects in the 31 NJSDA Districts.

Additionally, at the March 2, 2011 Board meeting, the Members approved the 2011 Capital Program which allocated an additional \$100 Million to fund emergent projects creating a total reserve of \$197 million to address emergent projects throughout the SDA Districts. Most recently, at the July 1, 2020 Board meeting, the Members approved a reallocation of funds from the Unforeseen Events Reserve to the Emergent Projects Reserve, providing an additional \$55.6 million to support the advancement of emergent projects. Funding for the projects is available within the established reserves for emergent projects.

NJSDA staff shall provide Construction Management oversight for the project.

# **BACKGROUND**

The Cleveland Elementary School (Cleveland ES), built in 1912, is an approximately 76,500 square foot facility in the Newark Public Schools District educating approximately 440 students in grades Pre-Kindergarten through 8.

Upon confirmation of the existence of emergent Boiler Room Vault conditions at the school, the NJSDA engaged STV Architects, Inc. (STV), on October 3, 2018, for the performance of Pre-Design Services for the Boiler Room Vault conditions.

At the conclusion of those Pre-Design Phase services, the NJSDA determined to advance the project through the engagement of a General Contractor utilizing the NJSDA's General Construction Services Task Order Contract, and to require the General Contractor to engage the services of a Design Consultant to complete needed Design Services.

## PROCUREMENT PROCESS

The construction task order assignment recommended for this project results from utilization of the NJSDA's General Construction Services Task Order (GC Task Order) Contract.

At the September 4, 2019 Board Meeting, the Members of the Authority approved the use of the GC Task Order Contract. The GC Task Order Contract has been structured so that the Authority has a pool of contractors to perform certain work. Overall, no individual task order can exceed \$3 million and no individual firm can receive more than \$5 million of work per region during the duration of the Contract. Bidders were required to select a region (North, South, or both) for job order assignments and accept the defined cost multiplier of 1.15, as decided by the Authority, for use in establishing compensation for those task order assignments to be performed on a time and materials basis. GC Task Order Contract work may also be assigned on a lump sum basis after competitive bidding among Task Order Contractors.

NJSDA determined to advance the Cleveland ES Project utilizing a rotational task order assignment.

On March 4, 2021, Procurement staff contacted Integrated Construction Enterprises, Inc. (ICE), the next firm in the contractor rotational list, and on March 12, 2021, the firm confirmed acceptance of the Task Order assignment.

This package will be awarded on a Time and Material (T&M) basis for a Not-to-Exceed (N.T.E.) value representing the most extensive scope of work pursuant to the NJSDA's existing GCTO Contract.

## SCOPE OF WORK

A site visit was held with ICE on March 30, 2021 at Cleveland ES to review and assess the condition of the Boiler Room vault emergent work. NJSDA staff instructed ICE to engage a design consultant and any sub-consultants necessary for developing a proposal, cost estimate, and schedule that recognizes an approach to implementing appropriate action(s) to address the emergent conditions related to repair of the Cleveland ES Main Boiler Room Vault and removal of the Sidewalk Vault.

The scope of work for this engagement includes:

- 1. Design Services:
  - Performance of field investigative activities necessary to confirm the conditions and the appropriate course of action for:
    - o Relocation of Gas Service into Main Boiler Room Vault;
    - o Removal of Sidewalk Vault;
    - o Removal and replacement of Plaza deck waterproofing and Plaza deck;
    - o Repair or replacement of Main Boiler Room Vault roof slab;
    - o Performance of foundation wall waterproofing;
    - o Repair raised Plaza stone retaining wall; and
    - o Replacement of light fixtures.
  - Preparation of necessary plans, specifications and construction documents representing construction activities, inclusive of modifications to the existing structures;
  - Preparation of documents to secure construction permits; and
  - Preparation of record set drawings and plans at completion of the project.
- 2. Construction Services:
  - Implementation of the repair and/or replacement scope of work to address:
    - o Relocation of Gas Service into Main Boiler Room Vault;
    - o Removal of Sidewalk Vault;
    - o Removal and replacement of Plaza deck waterproofing and Plaza deck;
    - o Repair or replacement of Main Boiler Room Vault roof slab;
    - o Performance of foundation wall waterproofing;
    - o Repair raised Plaza stone retaining wall; and
    - o Replacement of lighting fixtures.
- 3. Performance of hazardous materials abatement activities as necessary to implement the above described scope of work; and
- 4. Performance of any code or regulatory improvements which are necessitated by implementation of the above-described scope of work.

An allowance of \$215,000.00 has been established for impacted and unsuitable soils; hazardous materials and related activities; additional investigative and design activities including special inspections; and temporary utilities disconnections/connection.

On June 23, 2021, ICE provided the NJSDA with a cost estimate to complete the entirety of the work, inclusive of the assessment, design services and implementation of the most extensive scope of work to remedy the emergent conditions. The recommended award for the work to be performed on a Time and Material (T&M) basis at the

Not-to-Exceed (N.T.E.) amount of \$1,235,291.00 represents ICE's cost proposal for the most extensive solution for most of the scope elements including:

- Relocation of Gas Service into Main Boiler Room Vault;
- Removal of Sidewalk Vault;
- Removal and replacement of Plaza deck waterproofing and Plaza deck;
- Repair Main Boiler Room Vault roof slab;
- Performance of foundation wall waterproofing;
- Repair raised Plaza stone retaining wall;
- Replacement of lighting fixtures; and
- Any anticipated code improvements necessary to implement the above scope.

Field investigative activities will determine if replacement rather than repair of the Boiler Room Vault Plaza roof slab is required. Until completion of field investigative activities, ICE cannot present a reasonable and well-considered price proposal for replacement of the roof slab and therefore the NTE value for the engagement is based upon its repair.

Upon completion of design, the NJSDA shall review and validate the final projected cost and schedule for the scope of work. This review shall result in a determination to either advance the construction work on a Time and Materials (T&M) basis, for the Not-to-Exceed (N.T.E.) amount, or to establish a fixed cost for the scope of work defined in the construction documents.

Financial Operations and Construction Operations reviewed ICE's cost proposal in the amount of \$1,235,291.00 and determined it was reasonable for the elements included in the Scope of Work. The Construction Operations Director and the Financial Operations Director recommend the award of a task order to ICE.

# **PROJECT BUDGETS**

ICE's cost estimate for the most extensive scope of work to address the emergent project is \$1,235,291.00. The total funding, including design costs, construction costs, contingencies, allowances, and NJSDA staff costs is estimated at a value in the amount of \$1,897,173.00. The funding for the total project costs are available within the NJSDA Program Reserve maintained for emergent projects.

#### INTRODUCTION

I am writing to recommend approval by the Members of the Authority of Amendment No. 4 for a lump sum value of \$ 174,340.00 for additional Design and Construction Phase Services for modification of the Smoke Control makeup air velocity system at the Science Park High School in the Newark Public School District (NPS). The additional services are required to support additional construction services that are needed in order to obtain the Certificate of Occupancy for this facility that was delivered to NPS in 2006.

Pursuant to the NJSDA Operating Authority adopted by the Board on December 1, 2010, as amended March 7, 2012, an Amendment which singularly exceeds \$100,000.00 or 10% of the Contract value requires approval by the Members of the Authority. This amendment exceeds \$100,000.00 and 10% of the current contract value.

Funding for Amendment No. 4 is available within the Project Budget.

#### **BACKGROUND**

#### **Initial Project History**

Science Park High School is an approximately 275,000 square foot technology magnet high school educating 1,200 students in grades Seven (7) to Twelve (12). The New Jersey Economic Development Authority (NJEDA) initiated delivery of Science Park High School in 2002. The NJEDA assumed the design contract with Einhorn Yaffee Prescott Architecture & Engineering, P.C. (EYP) from NPS. The construction contract for the new school was awarded to Hunt Construction and a Notice to Proceed was issued in December 2004. The project achieved Substantial Completion and received a Temporary Certificate of Occupancy (TCO) on November 13, 2006.

During the construction of the school, the NJ Department of Community Affairs (DCA) realized that the Smoke Control System (SCS) was not in compliance with the International Building Code (IBC).

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Consequently, a TCO was issued by DCA, allowing the school to be occupied with District Security Personnel providing fire watch patrol services. A Certificate of Occupancy will not be issued until modifications are implemented and all identified DCA deficiencies are remedied.

Modification of the school's SCS is necessary for the completion of the Science Park High School project, issuance of the Certificate of Occupancy and final transfer of the school facility to Newark Public Schools.

#### Pursuit of Certificate of Occupancy

Remedial work to address the entirety of the SCS functionality has required the NJSDA to resolve several interrelated issues, each one revealed after correction of the prior one:

#### Retrofit of the SCS to Address Deficiencies

Following the test of the SCS performed in the fall of 2006, the NJSDA directed EYP to design a retrofit for the SCS to address deficiencies. There were several design iterations necessary in order to achieve release of the plans and specifications by the DCA in 2011.

Based on the EYP-developed construction documents, a construction contract was awarded to Grafas Painting Contractors, Incorporated (GPC) and a Notice to Proceed was issued on June 29, 2011 to retrofit the SCS.

Following completion of the SCS retrofit, the NJSDA engaged Triad Fire Protection Engineering Corporation (Triad) on September 11, 2011 to perform an inspection and determine functionality of the SCS and compliance with applicable codes. Triad reported that the retrofit to the SCS did not fully comply with the International Building Code (IBC) requirements.

The contract with GPC was terminated for convenience. The NJSDA determined that development of a design solution by a different design consultant was at this point the best approach to deliver an appropriate retrofit of the SCS that would fully comply with code requirements and remedy the deficiencies.

On March 26, 2014, a Limited Notice to Proceed was issued to USA Architects for Pre-Design Services, authorizing USA Architects to conduct detailed investigations and provide a complete definition of scope of work and associated budget necessary to address code compliance and operational deficiencies. Upon completion of Pre-Design activities, USA Architects was authorized to proceed with Design Services on July 30, 2015. USA's Design and Construction Administration Services are ongoing.

Triad has provided additional required consulting services, including additional testing and inspections needed to certify modification of the existing Smoke Control System, fire alarm system, emergency power supply system, electrical system, and fire protection system at the Newark Science Park High School. Triad remains involved with the project.

On June 2, 2017 Precision Building and Construction (PBC) was awarded a construction contract to address required corrective work related to Smoke Control System Modifications, MEP and Other Repairs identified through USA Architects' design efforts.

#### Ductwork Pressure Test Issues – Smoke Damper Replacement

Following PBC's repairs to the ductwork, it was determined that the repairs would not fully address the required ductwork system pressurization issues. During the ongoing investigation and repairs to the ductwork system, thirty one (31) dampers were inspected. It was identified that the control dampers did not meet code conformance because they lacked required approved UL rating.

Additional scope to remedy the control damper issue was the basis of Change Order No. 3 issued to PBC after approval by the NJSDA Board at its April 4, 2018, Board Meeting. The scope of work in CO No. 3

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Newark Public Schools - Science Park High School
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included removal and replacement of sixty eight (68) smoke dampers necessary to provide a fully operational, code compliant SCS and interactive components inclusive of the smoke dampers. The CO required that the corrective work satisfactorily pass final SCS Special Inspection in order to obtain a Certificate of Occupancy.

From December 2018 thru February 2019, final special inspections were conducted by the Special Inspection company, Triad Fire Protection Engineering Corporation, in order to prepare the Final Smoke Control System Special Inspection Acceptance Report required to obtain a Certificate of Occupancy from the DCA at the Newark Science Park High School project.

All tests passed inspections except for the makeup air velocity system test performed at the main entrance front doors conducted on February 18, 2019. Investigation of the make-up air system revealed that the original make up air duct assembly on the second and third floors is undersized.

#### Make-Up Air Velocity System

Through several prior actions, the NJSDA has authorized USA Architects to perform work in order to address the undersized make-up air velocity system. Prior actions relevant to the recommendation for approval of Amendment No. 4 have included the following:

• On April 25, 2018, the Vice President of Construction Operations and the Executive Vice President of Program Operations and Strategic Planning approved Amendment No. 1 for a Not-to-Exceed (N.T.E.) value of \$27,372.00 for additional design services which included: verification of smoke damper type, locations and operational requirements to insure code compliance; survey and identification of additional ductwork repairs; pressurization testing and special inspections needed to certify to the DCA that the SCS is satisfactory, fully operational and code compliant.

The survey, inspection and testing of the smoke control system was completed but, as stated above, the required special inspection of the SCS revealed that the originally installed SCS make-up air ductwork was undersized and provided insufficient make up air to meet code requirements.

- On August 7, 2019, the Members of the Authority approved Amendment No. 2 for a Not-to-Exceed (N.T.E.) value of \$79,000.00, for additional design services inclusive of investigation, operational analysis and development of re-design recommendations in order to identify corrective solutions to resolve the insufficient makeup air issue USA Architects and Sub-Consultants French & Parrello and Code Consultants Inc. performed the following additional phased design services:
  - Phase I Building & Fire Code Review and Consultation, Analysis of existing Smoke Control System, review of existing ductwork pressure drop calculations; and
  - Phase II: Analysis of existing Smoke Control System and recommendations of conceptual design changes.

Analysis of the existing SCS found that the system was not code compliant and it was determined that additional design investigation was warranted.

• On February 9, 2021, the Chief Executive Officer, and Vice President, Program Operations and Strategic Planning approved Amendment No. 3 for a Not-to-Exceed value of \$40,160.00, for additional design services to investigate multiple options to provide additional make-up air and identify the most efficient and cost effective corrective work to make the SCS code compliant.

A Smoke Control Make-up Air Assessment Report was submitted and recommended a solution to provide additional SCS make-up air from combined multiple sources and locations as the most efficient and cost effective solution, in order to address the issue and to obtain the Certificate of Occupancy.

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#### **REASON FOR CHANGE**

Based on the work completed from Amendments No.2 and No.3, Amendment No. 4 will authorize USA Architects, Planners + Interior Designs, P.A. to perform additional design services including the development of Construction Documents for the most efficient and cost effective corrective work to resolve the issue of providing additional SCS make-up air and to provide Construction Phase Services during the performance of that work, in order to address the issue and obtain the Certificate of Occupancy at the Science Park High School in the Newark Public Schools District. The design required to provide the needed additional make-up air is anticipated to be completed in the spring of 2022. The construction is anticipated to be performed in the summer of 2022 when the students are not present.

All documents supporting this Amendment have been reviewed by the associated NJSDA project Team Members and the Program Director for adherence to current NJSDA policy and procedures. All reviewing NJSDA staff members, including Financial Operations, have determined that the items in Amendment No. 4 are justified and the amount is reasonable and appropriate.

#### Resolution

WHEREAS, the Operating Authority of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority (SDA or the Authority) requires that the Members of the Authority authorize and approve contract amendments in an amount exceeding \$100,000 or 10% of the contract value; and

WHEREAS, Science Park High School (the High School) in the Newark Public Schools District, is an approximately 275,000 square foot technology magnet high school educating 1,200 students in grades 7 to 12; and

WHEREAS, prior to the statutory establishment of the SDA, the New Jersey Economic Development Authority, which previously administered the state's school construction program, initiated delivery of the Newark Science Park High School project (Project) in 2002 and a notice-to-proceed was issued in December 2004; and

WHEREAS, the Project achieved substantial completion and received a temporary certificate of occupancy in November 2006, excluding the smoke control system (SCS) which was determined to be non-compliant with code requirements; and

WHEREAS, modification of the non-compliant SCS (SCS project) is the primary element necessary for completion of the Project, the issuance of the certificate of occupancy (CO) and final transfer of the school facility to the District; and

WHEREAS, a construction package for the SCS project was advertised in 2017 and a construction contract to address required corrective work related to SCS modifications, mechanical, electrical and plumbing (MEP) and other repairs was awarded to Precision Building and Construction, LLC (PBC); and

WHEREAS, while PBC completed the scope of corrective work for the SCS, MEP and other repairs, the existing ductwork which interacts with the SCS did not pass the required pressure test due to factors involving the original project, unrelated to PBC's scope of work; and

WHEREAS, change order No. 1 was issued to PBC to investigate and repair the issue that resulted in the failure of the existing SCS ductwork pressure test; and

WHEREAS, following PBC's repairs to the ductwork, it was determined that the repairs would not fully address the required ductwork system pressurization issues, and additional scope to remedy the control damper issue was the basis of change order No. 3 issued to PBC in April 2018; and

WHEREAS, from December 2018 thru February 2019, final special inspections were conducted in order to prepare the report required to obtain a CO from the Department of Community Affairs for the Project; and

WHEREAS, all tests passed inspections except that in February 2019, a makeup air velocity system test performed at the main entrance front doors and a related investigation revealed that the original make up air duct assembly on the second and third floors is undersized; and

WHEREAS, on August 7, 2019, the SDA Board approved Amendment No. 2, for a not-to-exceed value of \$79,000.00, authorizing USA Architects, Planners + Interior Designs, P.A. (USA) to perform additional design services to identify corrective solutions to resolve the makeup air velocity system issue in compliance with the 2000 IBC Code and obtain the CO for the Project; and

WHEREAS, USA submitted its atrium smoke control analysis report in January 2020, recommending proposed changes to the smoke control system duct work; and

WHEREAS, thereafter, Amendment No. 3 authorized USA to provide additional design services including design development and construction documents to resolve the issue of providing additional make-up air into the atrium, in order to permit the use of the Atrium as originally intended in compliance with the 2000 IBC Code, and in pursuit of issuance of CO for the High School; and

WHEREAS, based on the work completed following Amendments No. 2 and No. 3, Amendment No. 4 will authorize USA to perform additional design services including the development of construction documents for the most efficient and cost effective corrective work to resolve the issue of providing additional SCS make-up air and to provide construction phase services during the performance of that work, in order to address the issue and obtain the CO at the High School; and

WHEREAS, the design required to provide the needed additional make-up air is anticipated to be completed in the spring of 2022, and the construction is anticipated to be performed in the summer of 2022 when the students are not present; and

WHEREAS, all documents supporting Amendment No. 4 have been reviewed by the associated SDA project team members and the program director for adherence to current SDA policy and procedures and all reviewing SDA staff members, including financial operations, have determined that the items in this Amendment are justified and the amount is reasonable and appropriate.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Members of the Authority hereby authorize and approve Amendment No. 4 for a lump sum value of \$ 174,340.00 for the purposes fully detailed in the memorandum presented to the Board on this date and incorporated herein for the Science Park High School project in the Newark Public Schools District.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution shall take effect immediately, but no action authorized herein shall have force and effect until 10 days, Saturdays, Sundays and public holidays excepted, after a copy of the minutes of the Authority meeting at which this resolution was adopted has been delivered to the Governor for his approval, unless during such 10-day period, the Governor shall approve same, in which case such action shall become effective upon such approval.

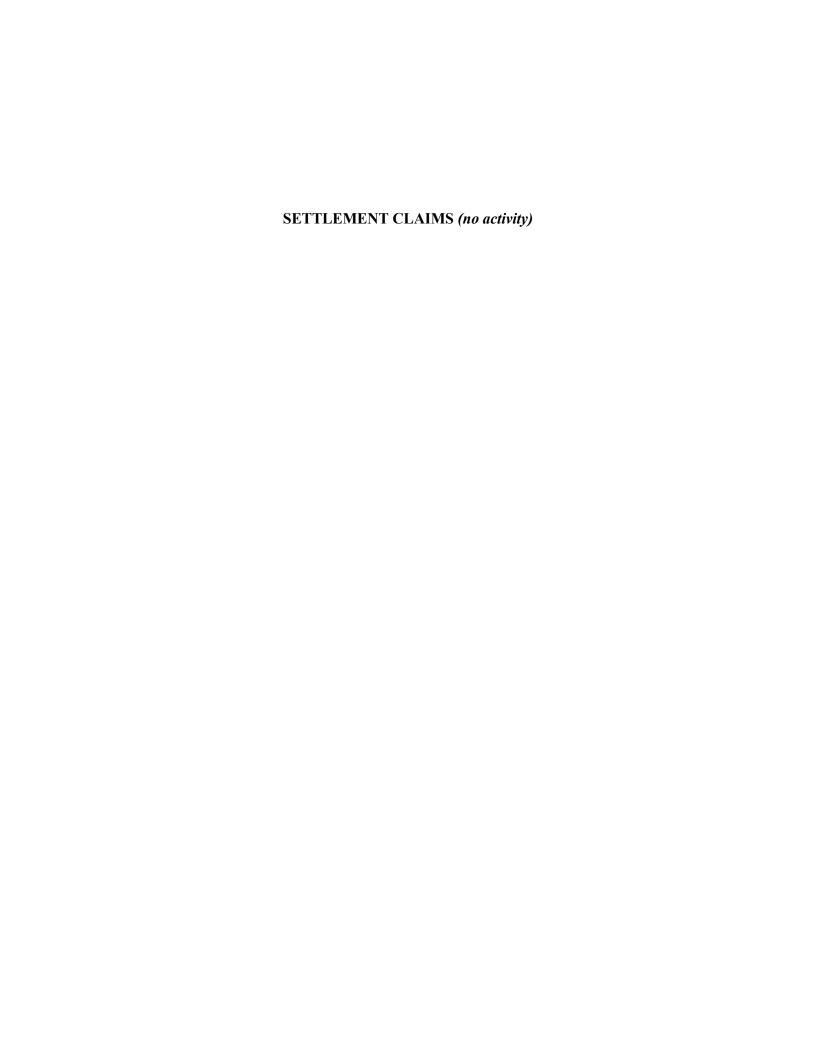

- SBE subcontracting goal of 25% of all contracts
- County workforce goals for minorities and females
- Local county workforce goals for minorities and females
- Detailed process procedures to monitor and track the progress made toward these goals throughout the life cycle of each project

At these meetings, vendors are strongly encouraged to identify and hire minority-owned and womenowned firms, as well as locally-based enterprises, for diverse business participation on all school building projects. Additional outreach strategies are discussed and utilized.

#### SMALL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE ATTAINMENT

The SDA regularly exceeds the State-mandated 25% SBE goal. The total SDA contract dollars awarded through April 30, 2021 was \$278,117,000. The total contract dollars awarded to all SBE contractors was \$10,674,340 (including minorities, women and veterans). This represents an initial participation of 3.84% of all SDA contracts awarded in 2021. Participation will continue to increase as the Prime contractor continues to hire additional subcontractors/subconsultants through the lifecycle of the construction project.

#### Fund Reporting Operating Expenses (Year-to-Date Actual vs. Budget)

For May 2021 year to date, Authority operating expenses, **\$7.5M**, are **\$1.2M** lower than budget for the corresponding period. This variance is primarily related to lower year to date personnel costs, **\$948K**, resulting primarily from the Authority having 9 fewer FTEs than budgeted, partially offset by a lower than projected payroll allocation to project expenditures, **\$511K**. The budget variance is also attributable to lower spending for professional & other contracted services, **\$250K**, facilities and general office related expenses, **\$241K**, information systems, **\$134K** and SDA-owned automobiles, **\$69K**.

#### Fund Reporting Operating Expenses (Year-to-Date Actual vs. Prior Year Actual)

For May 2021 year to date, Authority operating expenses, **\$7.5M**, are **\$138K** higher when compared to the corresponding prior year.

#### School Facilities Project Expenditures (Year-to-Date Actual vs. Forecast)

For May 2021 year to date, project expenditures, **\$96.3M**, are **\$37.4M** lower than the capital spending forecast for the corresponding period. This variance is due to lower than forecasted construction activity **\$15.9M**, grant activity **\$12.9M**, furniture and fixture purchases **\$4.7M**, project insurance **\$1.7M**, property acquisition **\$547K**, design services **\$515K**, and payroll expense allocation to project expenditures **\$511K**.

#### School Facilities Project Expenditures (Year-to-Date Actual vs. Prior Year Actual)

For May 2021 year to date, project expenditures, **\$96.3M**, are lower by **\$16.9M** when compared to the corresponding prior year. This variance is attributable mainly to decreases in grant activity **\$11.2M**, project insurance **\$3.1M**, furniture and fixture purchases **\$768K**, design services **\$559K**, and construction activity **\$542K**.

#### Other

Since program inception, 89.9% of the funds authorized for the SDA Districts have been disbursed. Additionally, since program inception, 96% of all SDA disbursements relate to school facility projects and 4% relate to operating expense.

Depreciation on capital assets is generally calculated using the straight-line method over the life of each asset. For the year to date, Capital Expenditures are \$56,620 and Depreciation Expense is \$232,831.
